NEW YORK-One hundred and sebenty-five youth councils and colchapters of the N.A.A.C.P. hioughout the country united in a nationwide series of youth mass meetngs against inequalities in public ducation Wednesday, November 10. This, is the day during American Education Week, November 7-13 which has been set aside for discussion of 'Our American Youth Problem' On this day youth councils and college chapters emphasized unequal education opportunities for Negro youth as a great problem. Walter White, executive secretary of the N.A. A.A.C.P. made a nationwide broadcast over the Columbia Broadcasting Systen from 3.15 to 3.30 p.m. E-S.T., emphasizing the work of the Association as it combats racial discrimination in public education.

In Boston, Mass., Dr. Clarence R. Skinner, dean of Tufts University, school of theology spoke for the Boston Youth Council mass meeting. His subject was "Prejudice and Its Effect on Negro Education." In Gary Ind. effort will be made to have discrimination abolished in Froebel, a high school which does not allow the Negro pupils to go in swimming, nor play in the band. Negro teams are not allowed to compete with the white in athletics because of the state Athletci Association, so they have been told.

Rev. E. Franklin Fisher spoke at the youth mass meeting in Detroit, Mich., pointing out the discriminations which Negro youth face in a unified school system.

#### RETAIL STORES

PERATEL BY NEGROES

New York City, with the largest Negro population (327,708 in 1930) of any city in the United States, reported 960 retail stores operated by Negro proprietors in 1935, according to Director Wm. L. Austin of the Bureau of the Census.

The number of retail stores had increased from 391 in 1930 to 960 in 1935; total value of sales increased from \$3,322,000 to \$3,805,000 during the same 5-year period and the total pay roll, which does not include compensation for the services of proprietors, increased from \$293,482 to over

\$472.186.

New York led all the other cities having 50,000 or more Negro inhabitants in the number or stores operated; in the value of sales and in the amount of wages paid to employees. The combined sales of the 449 food stores and the 172 eating and drinking places amounted to \$3,043,000 or approximately 80 per cent of the total sales, and with the exception of the \$397,000 sales reported by the mixed classification of "Other Retail Stores," no other group classification reported 5 per cent of the total sales.

The hghest average sale per store of \$21,600 was reported by the combination stores (groceries and meats) operating expenses of the 960 stores -followed by the drinking places, with average sales of \$16,350. Total constituted 30.8 per cent of total sales, and the pay roll represented 40 per cent of the operating expenses.

The average operating expense ratio in 1935 for all Negro retail dealers in the United States (23,490) was 23.2 per cent of the total sales and the pay an 80 pe cent emphasis on vocational roll was 44.2 per cent of the total operating expenses reported. The 960 retail stores in New York City gave employment to 1,801 person, including 793 employees and 1,008 active prostore amounted to \$3,964.
