

Whites Halt Cheque Payments After Closed "Open" Talks

GUELPH, Ont. (CP)—White students at the University of Guelph said they were barred from a three-day meeting of Negro students which reportedly attracted members of the Black Panthers.

Some of the white students who helped finance the meeting said they were turned away from the sessions in the university's chemistry-microbiology building although the sponsoring group had been promised the meetings would be open.

The program called for discussions on the political strategy of the black national liberation movement in North America and the strategy of urban guerrilla warfare.

At least 200 Negroes, many from other centres, attended the sessions.

David Ellen, treasurer of the sponsoring group, said he placed a stop-payment order on cheques issued for plane transportation and honorariums for speakers.

"We were promised that the meeting would be public," he said. "Instead everyone was barred."

"When I tried to enter, I was told I would have to register and when I tried to reg-

ister I was told registrations were only by invitation."

He said Dr. C. J. Mumford, a history teacher and an organizer of the meeting, refused him an invitation because he wasn't a member of a black group.

"We are not going to finance meetings which are closed to students," Mr. Ellen said.

Dr. W. A. Winegard, university president, said he

knew the meeting was being held but had not been told black power militants would be there.

Some of the speakers listed on the program were C. L. R. James of Federal City College, Washington, James Turner of Cornell University, Y. B. Sa-logie of the African National Congress, and Dr. George Hagar, who taught at Waterloo Lutheran University about two years ago.

Tasty Toast

Prepare some extra-delicious toast by cutting a loaf of unsliced raisin bread into squares, brushing the cut square surfaces, as well as the top and bottom, with melted butter, sprinkling with sugar and cinnamon, then baking at 375 degrees for about fifteen minutes, or until golden.

Another Consulate Is Closed

BERN (Reuters) — Switzerland announced today it is closing its consulate in Rhodesia.

This means that nine of the 12 countries which had official consular representation in Rhodesia before the African country declared itself a republic at midnight March 1 have closed their missions or have announced they will be shutting down.

They are the United States, Switzerland, France, West Germany, The Netherlands, Italy, Norway, Denmark and Belgium, as well as an "unofficial" Austrian office.

The three that remain are South Africa, Portugal and Greece.

'Purlie' Seen Richest Of All Black Musicals

NEW YORK — The new musical "Purlie" is victorious, or as near to victorious as it takes. The music is only adequate and the show could be cut, but the book is so strong, the performances so magnificent, that this musical should have you calling out: "Hallelujah!"

"Purlie," which is surely destined to make stars out of Melba Moore and Cleavon Little, is based on the Ossie Davis play of life way down on the old plantation, "Purlie Victorious." Now with a book by Davis himself, Philip Rose, who also produced and staged it, and Peter Udell, the lyricist, and with music by Gary Geld, Purlie is back in town.

Purlie Victorious is a black preacher—a new-style preacher, as he would be the first to admit, for he has not taken the precaution of going to college.

The cotton plantation of Cotchipee is ruled by Ol' Cap'n Cotchipee, who has Confederate blood in his veins, a bull-whip in his hand, and whose favorite song is "Ol' Black Joe."

How Purlie gets his church, with the help of Ol' Cap'n's

radical son Charlie, and wins Lutie Belle for his wife, is as well as the framework for a musical and from the opening number — a smashing crash of gospel singing and great jazz dancing — right to the end, the musical blends a fine mixture of humor and passion.

This is by far the most successful and richest of all black musicals, chiefly I think for the depth of the characterizations and the salty wit of the dialogue.

The performances I think would carry an even lesser show. Melba Moore has the timing of a superb comedian, and the God-given ability to walk straight into an audience's heart and hang around there.

Cleavon Little's Purlie is a strutting, gutsy-guy — part fake, part con-man, yet with his soul in the right place.

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Ivory Coast Announces New Club Mediterranean For Winter 1971

An agreement has been signed between the government of the Ivory Coast Republic and Club Mediterranee for the construction of a vacation village in the West African nation, Mr. Gaston Bouquety, North American general manager of Air Afrique, announced.

The new Club Mediterranee, to be built at Assinie, 50 miles from the capital of Abidjan, is scheduled to go into operation in the winter of 1971.

The 600-bed vacation village will include a restaurant and a theatre, and will offer all sports facilities.

Abidjan is one of the 33 destinations served from New York and Paris by Air Afrique, the airline that knows Africa best.

Air France is general agent in North America for Air Afrique.

Rhodesia

United Nations — Rhodesia faced further isolation from the world community following a UN Security Council order that all relations with the white minority government be severed.

Sixteen days after the declaration of a republic by Rhodesia, the Security Council ended its disagreement by reaching near-unanimous agreement on a compromise resolution by Finland cutting off all links with the government in Salisbury.
