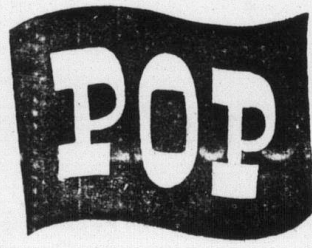

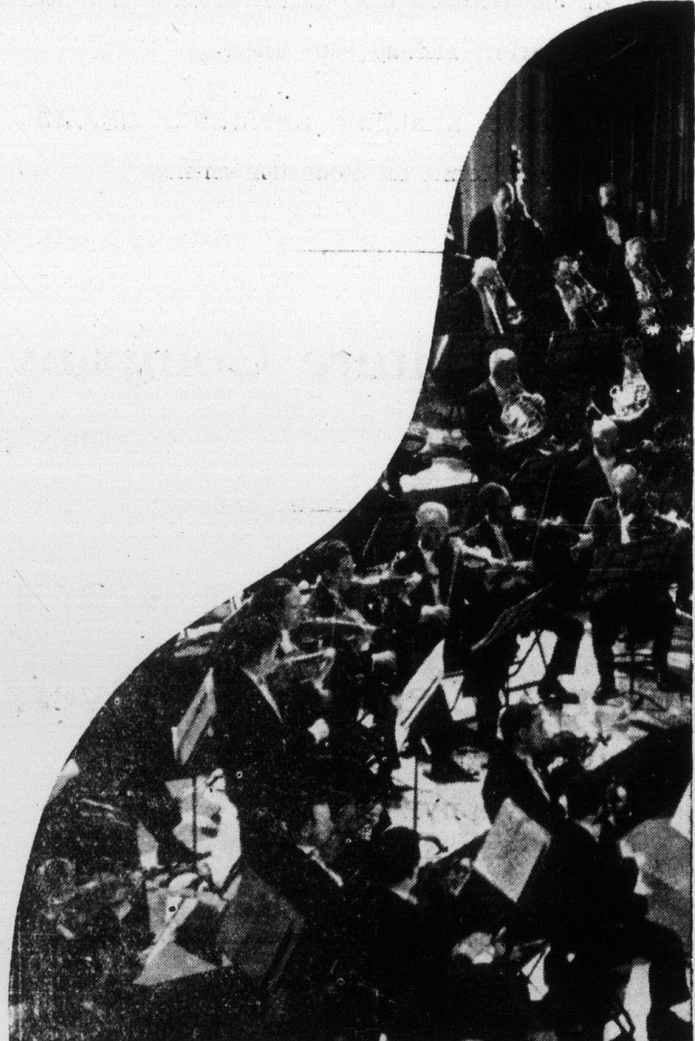

Few of the Negro knew in their twenties were at college or what jobs what their future would be. Still fewer realized that they were greatness. For they followed the formula by Shakespeare: "Some great, some achieve, some have greatness thrust upon them."
