The night before George C. Fields, 32, the nation's number one gentleman's gentleman left the White House to enter the Navy, President Roosevelt grasped his hand and said:

"Good luck to you George. I know you'll do just as good a job for the Navy as you've done for me."

That was last February. Recently, the Negro bluejacket lived up to the President's expectations when he was graduated from the Navy's Service Schools at the U.S. Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Ill., as honor man of his class group. He was advanced from seaman, second class, to storekeeper, third class.
