COMMUNITY DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL Windsor, Ontario

A very unique Community Daily Bible Vacation School was held in Windsor Ontario, at the B. M. E. Church, for three weeks from July eighth to July twenty-sixth. Bible Study, Hymns, memory work, woodcraft and handiwork were the main features of the school. This school has been sponsored for 3 years by Miss Jeannetta Woodcock in the city of Windsor for the benefit of the children of the colored group. This year the total enrollment was 165 children with an average attendance each day of 90 to 100.

The following programme was used each day.
8:30 to 9:00—Workers Conference.
9:00 to 9:15—Assembly and Worship
9:15 to 9:30—Hymn Memory Work
9:30 to 9:45—Bible dramatization
9:45 to 10:00—Bible Class work
10:00 to 10:15—Recreation
10:15 to 11:00—Handwork, Woodcraft
11:00 to 11:15—Programme
11:15 to 11:30—Assignments for next day, closing exercises.

On Friday evening of July 26, 1935 this school was closed with a very outstanding programme, the theme being, "Remember thy Creator." Certificates were awarded and the children were treated generously. A very large crowd was in attendance on that evening with Miss J. Woodcock presiding. Miss Woodcock is one of Windsor's very outstanding young women. A very great deal of credit should be given Miss Woodcock for her splendid work. She takes an active part in almost every phase of public life. She is a wonderful organizer, a beautiful character, has an ideal disposition and is loved by everyone.

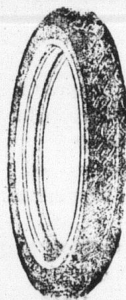
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
