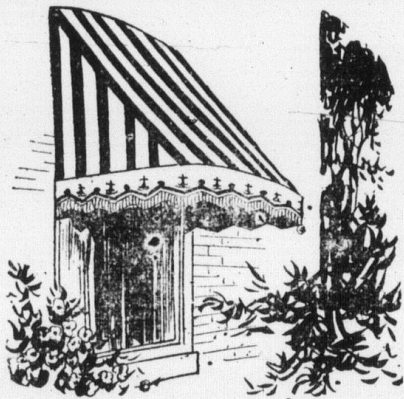

RACE CHURCHES PROTEST ACTIONS OF MAD ITALY

Protesting the utter disregard of Italy, the center of Christianity for the principles of the "Prince of Peace" outwardly professed, and the utilization of the age-old "Missionary Zeal," camouflage of imperialistic ambitions, religious organizations throughout the country are framing resolutions for united effort against Italy's aggression in Ethiopia.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 26—Our group, the world over, it still rejoicing over the outcome of a fistic battle between a veritable David and Goliath—Joe Louis and the mountainous Carnera.

The papers heralded the fact that we prayed for the success of our own splendid young man. He was a glorious victory. We feel that the prayers of his mother and those of the group played an important part in his gaining the victory.

From all news reports there is another battle to be waged in the near future. War is about to be declared against Abyssinia by the much larger and stronger country Italy. While the President, has asked that the 18th of August be a day that the United States pray that peace may be negotiated between these two countries, the Mis-

sionary Society of the Third Baptist church feels that our group should go a step further by adopting the following resolutions:

WHEREAS—Since seemingly war is inevitable against Abyssinia, the last independent nation of Africa, our sympathy goes out to her; and since Mussolini's desire is to subjugate and annihilate Abyssinia, we uncompromisingly condemn Italy's aggressive attitude and deplore the fact that any interference from other nations would no doubt draw the world into the contemplated conflict:

WHEREAS—Aside from extending Abyssinia our deepest sympathy, we shall assist by praying that God will deliver her from the hands of the oppressor.

Be it, therefore.

RESOLVED—That the Colored people of the United States go on record by setting aside one day the FIRST SUNDAY IN AUGUST, as a day in which prayers shall be offered in all churches and homes, for the deliverance of these people from the hands of Mussolini

Be it further

RESOLVED—That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the National church organizations throughout the United States, and they in turn, to their local churches. Also a copy be sent to the "Chicago Defender," the National Baptist Convention, Inc., and the National Baptist Convention, unincorporated, Nashville, Tenn., and a copy spread upon the minutes of the Missionary Society of the Third Baptist Church of San Francisco Calif.
