LONG LIVE THEIR MAJESTIES!

On Wednesday, May 12th, 1937, the British Empire will make again the Coronation of their Majesties in Westminster Abbey. King George will be the first English Monarch to be crowned since the statute of Westminster set out in legal form the complete independence of the Dominions. The statute lays down that every member of the British Commonwealth has equal right in relation to the Crown, which is the symbol of free association.

Micriphones in the Abbey will carry to us and all parts of the world, the most solemn act of consecration ever taken.

In planning the Coronation, it is understood procedure dating back to the days of the Anglo-Saxon kings is followed. It is the oldest and most elaborate religious ceremony performed 38 times since William the Conqueror was crowned at Westminster on Christmas Day, 1066.

As we look about us in our City, a very small part of one of the links of our great Dominion, a great feeling of pride and a feeling of true patriotism is shown by the heads of the city the merchants and citizens in their display of banners, streamers and flags. It makes one and all feel that they must add their "God Bless the King and Queen, Long may they Reign."
