EDITORIAL

THE FIFTEENTH ANNIVERSARY

Fifteen years have passed by since the late J. F. Jenkins first launched The Dawn of Tomorrow and today it constitutes one of the memorials of the work that he undertook and carried on during the remaining years of his life on behalf of the colored people of Canada. In days to come students of the history of Canada will delve through the files of this paper, as they have been preserved in a few larger libraries, and will gain therefrom a picture of social conditions among the colored people of this period and of their aspirations and achievements.

The Dawn of Tomorrow was not the first paper to be published in Canada by a member of the colored race. MOBS BURN 2 NEGROES

Georgia and Missippi Slayings Follow "No Lynching" Report

ROLLING FORKS, Miss, -(ANP)-Seven days after leaders praised the South for getting through the first six months of 1938 without a lynching, the first time this has happened since 1902, a mob of 300 slew a negro blacksmith in a 15 minute gun battle, set his body afire, then carried it to the city dump where it was burned again.

Tom Green, 48, was slain in a sharecropper's cabin after he had shot and killed his employer, R. Purdy Flanagan as he reached in his back seat for a shotgun, by 300 men led by Sheriff M. C. Ewing.

Members of the mob dragged the dead man's body from his cabin and doused it with gasoline and applied a torch. Later the body was tied behind an automobile and dragged sev-
