SAYS NEGRO STILL SEEKS HIS RIGHTS

Will Stand Ground, Speaker Declares

"Meetings such as this one, held under blue Canadian skies, will unite different peoples more than all the pacts and treaties which could be signed," Rev. Robert L. Bradby, jr., pastor of Greater King Solomon Baptist Church, Detroit, told thousands of Negroes who were in Jackson Park yesterday, celebrating the 114th anniversary of the emancipation of Negro slaves in Canada.

Paper Proclamation

"The Negroes of Canada and the United States are still seeking freedom and equality. They are doing it by standing their ground, not migrating, as our forefathers did a hundred years ago. The very fact that the British government issued a proclamation outlawing slavery years before the 'paper' proclamation of the United States, proves your government was giving to you the rights God intended for His people," Mr. Bradby continued.

There can never be universal peace until white men and negroes stand side by side and try to understand each other's problems. There must be equal opportunities for all people in the world before we can have complete and lasting peace.

Sing Freedom Songs.

"You and I as Negroes should have every right as all people in the United States of America. The man who wears the chains of slavery is better off dead. We no longer sing the songs to the banjo. Now we are singing songs of freedom. We don't ask favors from anyone. All we want is to live and be allowed to act as free men.

"In spite of the emancipation proclamation in America, the Negro in America is not free. No man is free, when the door to an auditorium is slammed in his face. If you think you're free, try and live in certain districts in Detroit. Negroes must go to court before they can live in certain communities.

Step to Front

"In every hour of danger and need, we have stepped to the front. It was a Negro regiment which stood before the British guns during the fight for independence; it was a Negro regiment which did so much god fighting during the Civil War; the Negroes had a regiment in World Wars I and II. They fought for liberty and equality for all people. Now there are over 13,000,000 Negroes in the United States still fighting for the same freedom and equality.

Slams Jefferies

Statements made by Mayor Edward J. Jeffries of Detroit during campaign speeches are exactly what cause wars and revolutions. The cause of all the race riots in Detroit can be laid at the feet of the mayor of that city, and his common council.

"We must have a new emancipation—not just a scrap of paper. The new emancipation bill must be protected by the federal government and not the state government. It must come to all men in all lands. Citizens of Canada and the United States this is your fight for freedom. Will you carry it on?"
