Overcame Handicap To Gain World Fame

At first, they simply called him "the man who plays three horns." It was back in 1960, before the jazz world began to take the magnificently talented young musician seriously.

They listened to him—they groped for words to describe the experience—the excitement they felt. Yet they concluded his wild, creative musical expression would not be accepted and recognized.

Maybe . . . some day."

By 1961, older musicians listened more closely. The jazz world stirred. The word began to spread of the virtually unknown blind instrumentalist whose musical freedom was bringing a new voice to jazz.

Finally, in 1962, the music world bowed in recognition. Roland Kirk, the daring young new musical genius was spotlighted in Downbeat Magazine—the "bible" of jazz critics and fans. An International Jazz Critics Poll and Downbeat Readers Poll chose the then 26-year-old musician first place winner in Miscellaneous Instruments for 1962.

Roland Kirk has come a long, long way since he began his struggle for recognition and understanding. Today, his phenomenal musicianship, his individuality; his creative achievements in sound, his self-penned extraordinary compositions and improvisations have stirred the very roots of jazz. Not only in America, but in England, in France, in Germany, Japan and countries in the remote regions of the globe, his name has been placed on the scroll of the great names of jazz.

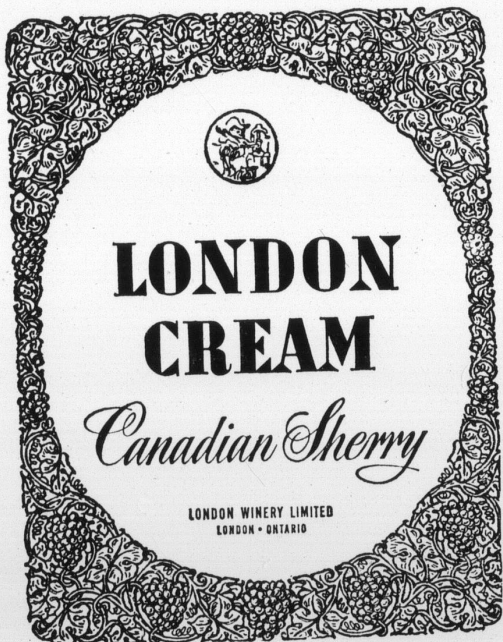
