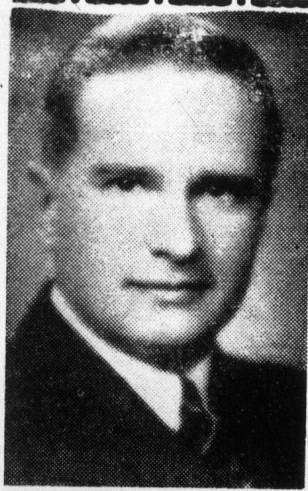

**BING CROSBY OF BRITAIN**  
Jamaica's Archie Lewis is Big Hit  
With English Radio Listeners

To the millions of English radio listeners who tune in their sets nightly to the somewhat stolid programs of the British Broadcasting Company, the soft, relaxed crooning of 28-year-old Archie Lewis singing popular jazz tunes comes as a welcome relief from dreary diatribes about the beastly barometer or never-ending Gilbert and Sullivan tra-la-tra-la.

Jamaica-born Lewis is the newest musical vogue of London. Considered by many as the Bing Crosby of Britain, Lewis over the air sounds much like "The Groaner," warbles in a similar style.

Lewis sings with Geraldo and his orchestra, an outfit with about the same status in England as Woody Herman or Benny Goodman in their prime in the States. He is the only Negro with the orchestra, one of four featured singers.

Britain's Bing came to England for the first time during the war. He left his Kingston home in the West Indies to take a war job as a fitter engineer with Metro Vickers in Manchester and London. His singing talent was soon discovered in the factory where he worked and he was included in plant concerts broadcast during 1942. When Geraldo heard his voice on the radio, he immediately offered him a contract and took him off a machine to go to France, Belgium and Holland entertaining troops. Lewis became an immediate hit and has been singing with the orchestra ever since. He has made 14 recordings which have been selling fast in English music shops.

**REFUGEES MAKE GOOD**

A kid glove business started near a depression-hit Ontario town, besides contributing to the industrial development of the town, has expanded to include goat-raising, the tanning of goat skins, the making of formerly-imported types of cheese from goat's milk.

A refugee business that fills a gap in Canada's woollen industry is a combing plant for the more rapid processing of wool. Prior to the establishment of this plant, Canadian wool was usually exported for combing, while Australian and New Zealand wool went to England for sorting, scouring and combing before being shipped here in the form of tops. Using home-grown and directly imported wools, this plant now produces about one third of the country's total consumption of wool tops.

In 1944 there were 56 refugee industries employing over 6,000 workers, the majority of whom are Canadians. The total number of refugees (including women and children) admitted to Canada during the war years has been estimated at only 3,500, a figure about half the number of workers in refugee established plants.

Going back to the pre-war years, the number of persons admitted from Nazi controlled countries between the years 1933 and 1945 totalled 17,969 men, women and children. Allowing at least two dependents for each worker, it will be seen that 56 industries (and this is by no means the total number of refugee industries established in Canada) were able to create enough work to take care of all the refugees permitted to come into this country.

Probably one of the finest things that could happen to this country would be the transfer from abroad of manufacturing plants, including key managerial and technical personnel and enough skilled workers to start the plant operating. Within a few years they would be solidly Canadian organizations. This is known in the language of the experts as "economically self-contained immigration."
