It was through the determination and the courage of the late Mr. Jenkins and yourself that you have been able to continue your paper under difficult circumstances until today. I have very pleasant recollections of meeting both Mr. Jenkins and yourself on occasions in my office.

The name of the paper was a forecast of things to come for colored people. "The Dawn of Tomorrow" is now with us when we look at the progress which has been made on this continent and in Africa and Asia in the past 40 years. Discrimination against colored people is disappearing, officially at least. The shackles have been broken.

The new nations of Asia and Africa have taken their place at the world organization, the United Nations. They are assuming responsibility along with the older free nations for making a new and better world.

The name of the paper was a prophecy of a world to come. The light of the dawn is beginning to shine. What we must look forward to is a day when all peoples in full light of a world of freedom
