Convention Builds Funds

A pair of dreams that are already coming true" is what Dr. J. H. Jackson calls the establishment by the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A., Inc., of a ministers retirement fund and an educational foundation. The retirement fund has grown within a few years to more than \$200,000, and Dr. Jackson says, hundreds of aged ministers are benefiting from investments. "We are supporting a number of our very old pastors, and we are paying death benefits to a number of widows," he says. "We hope that in the future no Baptist pastor will have to ask for public relief when he grows old. A man who gives his life to the ministry ought not to have to worry about old age.

The educational foundation is a Jackson-sponsored plan which seeks to build a \$10million fund for college scholarships, missionary education and capital improvements at Convention-supported seminaries and colleges. The Convention has already endowed a \$10,000 scholarship fund at Roosevelt University in Chicago, but plans are to expand the student-help program in-to one of the largest churchrelated programs in existence.

"We don't intend to compete with anyone in either the retirement insurance business or the student-help business," Dr. Jackson says. efforts are far too small for that. We simply feel that there is a need for further support of such programs, and as Baptists as well as concerned citizens, we are trying to make a contribu-
