HALF MILLION GRANT BY UNCF ANNOUNCED

NEW YORK — The United Negro College Fund will distribute \$500,000 to 32 member colleges and universities in 11 southern states during the coming week, James R. Smothers Jr., vice president for development, announced Saturday.

This will be the fourth distribution of proceeds from the annual campaign this year.

The goal for the 1964 campaign is \$3,000,000. Money from annual funds is used for scholarships, faculty salaries and operating expenses.

Member colleges and universities in the states of Georgia, North Carolina, Virginia, Alabama, and Tennessee will receive the largest amounts from the distribution.

Seven institutions in Georgia will receive a total of \$109,176.25; six in North Carolina, \$83,532.50; three in Virginia, \$64,046.25; three in Alabama, \$62,626.25.

In addition, three colleges in Texas will receive a total of \$37,273.75; two in Louisiana, \$37,102.50; and one in Mississippi, \$13,806.25.
