Besides the regular business sessions, there will be a tour of UNB, a social evening, and a banquet in St. Mary's Hall. Highlighting the three-day agenda will be a series of group discussions conducted by the Rev. K.H.M. Creal from the diocese of Niagara. Mr. Creal, who is a graduate of U.B.C., U. of T., and Trinity College, Toronto, has a great deal of experience in Conference work with adults and students. He is especially familiar with the "Parish Life" type conference which the U.N.B. club is sponsoring this year.

The first conference at the University of Western Ontario in 1948 set up a co-ordination committee of Canterbury Clubs which was to meet annually. This is the first year that a conference has been held east of Montreal, and emphasis will be on the "Canterbury Club of the Anglican Church on Campus".

All Canterbury members, and Anglican students, are urged to attend a business meeting to be held in Cathedral Hall at 8:15 pm this Sunday, Feb. 9, when plans for the Conference will be finalized. Any wishing to register for the Conference as a delegate must be present at this meeting.

"University students have many concessions which need to be gained", Mr. Walter Tarnopolsky, National President of the National Federation of Canadian University Students told the SRC Wednesday evening.

Mr. Tarnopolsky outlined the functions of NFCUS as being threefold: To create national unity; to act as a voice for Canadian students; and to act as a vehicle by which Canadian students may communicate with students of other countries.

He went on to explain how the fee paid to NFCUS by the student is regained by the student in the form of reduction of travel fares and text book costs.

Mr. Tarnopolsky commented on the varied reception of NFCUS by the various universities across Canada. He stated that NFCUS was gaining in strength, but more activity is needed for the organization to become influential. The only major Canadian university which still has no NFCUS organization on its campus is McGill.

One method of reviving interest in NFCUS on the campus was by using "gimmicks" to lure the students into attending meetings.

Philip Bird was appointed Returning Officer for the oncoming SRC elections.

The regular SRC meeting will be held on Thursday, Feb. 13, at 7 PM. The reason for holding it at this time is that the question of class rings requires discussion, and that a representative from Henry Birks and Son will be in Fredericton and will attend the meeting.

The SRC is sponsoring another dance this Saturday night. Records will be played in the hope that some profit will be realized. The password is 35 cents per person.

UNB Have Unique Status

"The newly re-organized UNB Model Parliament is in a very favourable position in relation to Model Parliaments held at other Canadian Universities", reports Chairman of the Model Parliament steering Committee, Dick Steeves.

Mr. Steeves and George Bastin had the opportunity over the weekend of meeting and conversing with representatives from colleges and Universities situated in cities across Canada. The occasion was the YPC and PCSF held in Ottawa Jan. 31 to Feb. 2.

It was reported that the problems encountered by the joint-party Steering Committee here at UNB are almost negligible as compared with those faced by other Canadian University political clubs. Mr. Steeves states that the University of Montreal boasts the largest Mock Parliament in Canada, but that this is organized without proper permission from the authorities; that even the University of Toronto's political clubs are not sufficiently recognized by the administration and the student government; and that McMaster University has the dubious distinction of being the most uncondusive to student political activity.

In view of these facts Mr. Steeves urges that the warm regard and the co-operation which our Model Parliament receives from the University authorities and faculty be fully appreciated. "It is an unparalleled token of respect for the student body and a great honor for us to have the President of our university officiate in our Parliament as the Governor-General, and, in addition, U.N.B. shares with the University of Manitoba the distinction of being the only Universities in Canada using the provincial legislative chambers for their sessions", Mr. Steeves observed.

The University of New Brunswick is to participate in three intercollegiate debates within the next week and a half. Two of the debates will be held here; the third in Acadia. It is planned to hold the debates on the UNB Campus in the Students' Centre.

The first of the matches will be held next Thursday, Feb. 13. At that time Ron Manzer and Allison Trites of UNB will meet two St. Dunstan's debators. The topic of the evening will be: Resolved that the use of British and American texts in Canadian Schools, Universities and Colleges is endangering the growth of a distinctively Canadian Culture.

The next evening, Friday, Feb. 14, Pete Miles and Carl Wallace will be at Acadia where they will debate the affirmative of: Resolved that recent advancements in Soviet weapon development have rendered NATO obsolete.

On Monday, February 17, George Bastin and Dick Steeves will take on Mount A here at which time the subject will be: Resolved that strikes in public utilities be declared illegal. In this, as in all three debates, UNB will be upholding the affirmative of the statement.

Proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Students' Representative Council of the University of New Brunswick.

ARTICLE II, section 5 is deleted and replaced by:
 ARTICLE II, section 5: The Students' Representative Council, through a committee which shall be called the Students' Disciplinary Committee —the powers, administration, composition, and jurisdiction of which committee shall be laid down in the constitution of said committee, shall have jurisdiction to deal with students who conduct themselves in an unbecoming manner at University functions and on the premises of the University during the Academic year.

ARTICLE II, Section 8 is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE II, section 8: On or before April 20th, of each college year, the S.R.C. shall appoint the Chairman of the Social Committee, the Campus Co-ordinator, the Student Public Relations Officer, who shall be a member of the S.R.C. and all other positions and concessions granted and awarded by the S.R.C. The Chairman of the Social Committee . . . etc., as originally.

ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection a) is changed to read as follows:
 The Honorary President, who shall be a member of the Senate, or any other close associate of the University of New Brunswick. He shall be appointed for the . . . etc., etc., as originally.

ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection d) is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection d): The Second Vice-President, who shall be a Junior Co-Ed, for the year in which she holds office.

ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection h) is deleted and replaced by ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection h): Four class representatives for the Senior class, one and only one, of whom must be a Co-Ed; three class representatives for the Intermediate Class; three class representatives for the Junior Class, one and only one, of whom must be a Co-Ed; three representatives for the Sophomore class; two representatives for the Freshman Class; all representatives except the Freshman representatives to be elected in the Spring, and the two Freshmen representatives to be elected in the Fall, as in Article VI, sections 6 and 7.

ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection i) is deleted and replaced by: ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection i): there shall be no more than two representatives from the same faculty in any one class except in the case of there being no nominations from other faculties.

ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection j) is deleted and replaced by: ARTICLE III, section 1, subsection j): The Chairman of the National Federation of Canadian University Students, and the Chairman of the UNB committee of the World University Service of Canada shall be non-voting members of the SRC.

ARTICLE III, section 2, is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE III, section 2: To this SRC shall be added a representative of the Faculty, chosen by the SRC from a list of names submitted by the Faculty at a meeting . . . etc., etc., as originally.

ARTICLE IV, section 1, subsection a) is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE IV, section 1, subsection a): Finance Committee, consisting of the Treasurer as Chairman and one SRC representative from each class except the Freshman Class. The representative of each . . . etc., etc., as originally.

ARTICLE IV, section 1, subsection b): "Students' Activities Awards Committee" is substituted

throughout for "Non-Athletic Committee".

ARTICLE IV, section 1, subsection e) is added as follows:
 The students' Discipline Committee, the composition and duties of which committee shall be laid down in the constitution of said committee.

ARTICLE V, section 1, subsection d) is deleted and replaced by:
 ARTICLE V, section 1, subsection d): Representatives of each class to sit on the SRC as provided in Article III, section 1, subsection h) and i).

ARTICLE V, section 3, subsection a) is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE V, section 3 subsection a): All nominations for the positions outlined in section 1, subsection a), b) and c) above shall be in writing and signed by the nominator and seconder who shall be members of the class concerned.

ARTICLE V, section 8 is changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE V, section 8: The SRC shall decide upon a suitable place where polls shall be located. Notices as to the location of the polls shall be posted at least 6 days previous to the day of the elections.

ARTICLE V, section 10 is deleted and replaced by:
 ARTICLE V, section 10, subsection 1): The names of candidates for the Co-Ed class representatives for the Senior and Junior years shall be placed on a ballot sheet separate from those candidates for the other positions.

ARTICLE V, section 10, subsection 2): The names of the candidates shall appear in alphabetical order on the ballots.

ARTICLE V, section 11, to be deleted; section 12 to become section 11, and the new section 11, subsection a) to read as follows:
 Where there are only two candidates for any of the offices mentioned in section 1, subsection a), b), c), or e), above or for that of Co-Ed class . . . etc., etc., as originally.

In the new section 11, subsection b) to read as follows:
 Where there are only two candidates for any of these offices as in Article V, section 11, subsection a), the voter shall indicate . . . etc., etc., as originally.

The new section 11, subsection c) to read as follows:
 In the case of Intermediate, Sophomore, and Freshman representatives the voter shall vote for the three, or two candidates of his class, respectively, by marking an X opposite each choice. In the new section 11, subsection d) to read as follows:

In the case of Senior and Junior class representatives, the voter shall mark an X beside the Co-Ed of his choice, and an X beside each of the names of three male candidates in the case of the Senior Class, and two male candidates in the case of the Junior Class.

ARTICLE V, section 13, to become Article V, section 12; subsection c) to be deleted, and to be replaced by:

ARTICLE V, section 12, subsection c): For the offices of class representatives, the required number of candidates receiving the greater number of votes shall be declared elected, except as provided in Article III, section 1, subsections h) and i).

ARTICLE V, section 15, to become Article V, section 14, and to read as follows (the original section 15 having been deleted):

ARTICLE V, section 14, subsection e): The eligibility of any candidate or voter in the above election shall be determined by the President of the SRC.

ARTICLE V, section 16, to become Article V, section 15.
 ARTICLE V, section 17, to become Article V, section 18.

ARTICLE V, section 17 to be added as follows:
 In the event of the President of the SRC failing to qualify for his position in the Fall, the First Vice President shall automatically assume the position of Acting President until a new President be elected.

ARTICLE V, section 18, to be changed to read as follows: The SRC shall require all campus societies and organizations, except the Brunswickan, to hold their election of officers . . . etc., as originally.

ARTICLE V, section 19, to be changed to read as follows:
 ARTICLE V, section 19, The presidents and heads of all organizations coming under Article V, section 12, of the constitution . . . etc., etc., as originally.

A new Article V, section 21, to be added as follows:
 ARTICLE V, section 21: The procedure for nominations and election of the Freshman representatives shall follow the same form and procedure as those of the Intermediate and Sophomore classes, and shall be under direct supervision of the President of the SRC or his deputy.

A new Article V, section 20 to be added as follows:
 ARTICLE V, section 20: An election shall be held in the Fall, within 5 weeks of the opening of the first term, for the class representative from the incoming Freshman class, to the SRC and for the purpose of filling any other vacant seats on the Council and there shall be at least one nomination for each vacant seat on the Council.

ARTICLE VI, sections 3, 4, 6, and 7, all to be deleted.

ARTICLE VI, section 5, to become Article VI, section 3.

A new Article VI, section 4, to be added as follows:

ARTICLE VI, section 4: The duties of the Class executives shall be as outlined in their respective constitutions.

ARTICLE VII, section 3: The following to be added to the end of this section — (See Articles II, section 5) —

A new Article VII, section 5 to be added to read as follows:

ARTICLE VII, section 5: The President of the SRC shall meet with all nominees previous to all SRC elections in order to familiarize them with election procedures.

A new Article VII, section 6, to be added, to read as follows:
 ARTICLE VII, section 6: The President of the SRC shall hold a meeting at which he shall be in the chair, of all Campus leaders, immediately following the Fall elections, for the purpose of familiarizing these persons with the administration of Student Government at this University.

ARTICLE VII, section 5, to become Article VII, section 7.
 ARTICLE VII, section 6, to become Article VII, section 8, and subsection b) to be deleted.

ARTICLE VII, section 7 to become Article VII, section 9.
 ARTICLE VII, section 8 to become Article VII, section 10.

ARTICLE VII, section 9 to become Article VII, section 11.
 ARTICLE VII, section 10 to become Article VII, section 12.

ARTICLE VII, section 11 to become Article VII, section 13.
 ARTICLE VII, section 12 to become Article VII, section 14.

ARTICLE IX, section 3, subsection a) to be changed to read as follows:

ARTICLE IX, section 3, subsection a): On, or before, the third Friday of October, for the fall term, and the fourth Friday of

January, for the Spring term . . . etc., etc., as originally.

A new Article IX, section 3, subsection e) to be added to read as follows:

ARTICLE IX, section 3, subsection e): All organizations and societies requesting funds from the SRC must have a ratified constitution on file with the SRC.

ARTICLE IX, section 5, to be changed as follows:

ARTICLE IX, section 5: If an organization should require funds before the budgets of either Fall or Spring terms are passed, that organization may make application to the SRC at any meeting of the SRC for the necessary amount of funds. Such an application, which must be written, shall state the purpose for which . . . etc., as originally.

ARTICLE IX, section 7, subsection b) to become section 7.
 ARTICLE IX, section 13 to be deleted.

ARTICLE IX, section 14, to become Article IX, section 13.

ARTICLE X, section 2, to be changed to read as follows:

ARTICLE X, section 2: In the case of such recall, a new election shall be held within ten days of the presentation of such a petition, the usual procedure of election for that office being followed as denominated in Article V, excluding section 2, subsections a), b), and c).

ARTICLE XI, section 14 to be changed to read as follows:

ARTICLE XI, section 14: No varsity sport may be eliminated or introduced without SRC consent.

A new Article XI, section 15 to be added as follows:

ARTICLE XI, section 15: At the second meeting of the SRC after the Fall election the SRC con-

stitution shall be read and discussed by all members of the Council.

A new Article XII, section 3, to be added as follows:

ARTICLE XII, section 3: This constitution shall incorporate the constitutions of all standing committees of the SRC, including that of the Student Discipline Committee, as listed in Article IV, section 1.

In the new Article VII, section 7, (originally section 5) the following subsection to be added:
 ARTICLE VII, section 7, subsection d): the 1st Vice-President shall be a voting member of the A.A.A.

ARTICLE IX, section 3, subsection a) to be changed to read as follows:

On, or before the third Friday of October for the Fall term, and the fourth Friday of January for the Spring term, there shall be held a preliminary budget meeting at which the Finance Committee of the SRC shall present to the SRC its budget for the term. This proposed budget shall contain estimates from all organizations under the SRC and wishing to draw on the general fund, subject to Article IV, section 5, subsection b). From these budgets the SRC shall determine, at a second meeting, the budget for the term.

A new Article IX, section 5, subsection b) to be added, the original paragraph under Section 5 to become section 5, subsection a):
 ARTICLE IX, section 5, subsection b): All societies, clubs, and organizations subsidiary to the SRC charging a membership fee of not more than one dollar shall be allowed to submit budgets to the SRC, and all societies, clubs, and organizations charging a membership fee of more than one dollar shall not have the right to request funds from the SRC.
