- II.—The statements in the catalogue are correct, as far as known to the exposor, but he shall not be bound by them in any respect.
- III.—All purchases must be settled for immediately after the sale according to the terms stated below. Parties failing so to settle will, in the exposor's or judge's option, either forfeit their purchases and be liable in one-fifth part of the price, as the stipulated damage, or be bound to abide by and implement their purchases.
- IV.—Immediately after each purchase is declared, the risk of the animal shall be exclusively with the purchaser; and it is declared that, until a settlement shall be made in terms of these conditions, the delivery of the animals shall be suspended.
- V.—T. W. Harvey, Esq., ex-President of the A.A.A. Breeders' Association, is hereby appointed judge of the roup, to whom are hereby submitted all disputes and differences of every kind which may arise in relation to the sale, either between the exposor and offerers, or among offerers themselves, and his decision shall be final and binding on all parties.

INTRODUCTION

As introductory to the within offering, we would say that we part with our favorites with a great deal of regret, but we are induced to do so for the reason that the member of our firm who has taken the chief interest in the herd, and who alone of us has sufficient knowledge on the subject to conduct the breeding successfully, is obliged to turn his attention entirely to other more important (to us) branches of our business for the next two or three years; and as it has become impossible for us to give the herd the attention it should have during the continuance of the large lumbering operation we have recently added to our former business, we have decided to disperse it for the present, and console ourselves with the hope that we shall be able to fill up the empty stalls again at a future date. We propose to keep only a bull and five or six females, so as not to sever all connection with the daddies, and to form the nucleus of a future herd. Notwithstanding this little nest egg, we feel that we are going out of the business, at least temporarily, and that we are to a great extent losing thereby the benefit of the large amount of time, study and care spent in getting this herd together.

We commenced with the Polled Angus in 1881, having at the time some thoroughbred Durhams and Herefords, which we gradually sold out of, as we became more interested in the blacks. We liked the Herefords pretty well, but the Angus are our choice, and we would not again think of taking up any other breed. In selecting our foundation stock, we acted on the principle that the best would turn out the cheapest at any price we might have to pay for them, and we have found this the case. As we were buying to breed from, and not for re-selling immediately, we argued that after we should have bred up a herd, the first cost of our foundation stock would not look so big an item, when the much greater value of the herd was considered, as compared with the value of an inferior herd, bred from cheaper stock, but at the same cost for rearing; and that as we continued on breeding, the first cost of foundation stock would keep getting continually to be a still less important proportion. Also, we had always found it easier to sell a good beast at a good price than to dispose of an inferior one at a very low figure.

Therefore, in making our first purchases, we looked for the best, almost regardless of price; and as we had the assistance of persons well posted in the breed, both as to pedigrees and animal form, etc., we succeeded in getting such a lot as we have all along been greatly pleased with, excepting some five or six beasts, since got rid of, together with all their produce.

We were especially fortunate in the purchase of the bulls Ermine Bearer and King of Trumps. Although the choice pedigrees of these bulls were considered as somewhat of a guarantee that they would be good breeders, they have more than satisfied our expectations.

The good fortune in happening on two such stock getters, added to the care in choosing the foundation females, has made the herd what it is.

It seemed that from this time forward success simply came to us of its own accord, almost every calf proved a show beast, and we heard nothing but praise of our stock in the highest terms from all visitors. One of our principal stock men remarked, "It is the greatest piece of luck in cattle breeding I ever saw. You'll never do it a second time." This is probably the case; nevertheless a great deal can be done to help the

"luck" by careful selection of both form and breeding in purchasing. This principle we considered safe to adopt as to pedigrees; namely, that the best pedigree was the one that had the greatest amount of prize winning blood in it, and while we looked for animals sprung from the best family foundations we tried to secure them at the same time with every cross in their pedigrees, from that foundation up to the animal's own sire, full of prize blood, and the nearer it came to this the better pleased we were with the pedigree; and we have found since that the animals thus bred have given the best results in breeding.

It is a natural conclusion and we think a correct one, that prize-winning blood piled up cross after cross, must produce prize-winning and prize-breeding animals in the majority of cases. Such will be found in the greater number of the pedigrees in this catalogue.

We were especially pleased when we found the sire of a Smithfield champion at the top of a pedigree offered us, as was the case in our first Pride of Aberdeen, got by Black Watch, and our first Westertown Rose, got by Challenger; and we considered it more to the value of these crosses that the two bulls named were full brothers, and of the famous prize-winning ~~Pride of~~ Aberdeen family, as well as being themselves of exceptional merit.

In Big Island we have a farm wonderfully adapted to the growing of sound, healthy, muscular stock. It gives a run over 1,000 acres without a fence, partly cleared, partly bush (in which the cattle brouse), all high land, on limestone formation, giving stock the advantage of a variety of natural food together with abundance of exercise, so essential to the full development of young stock. There is no possibility of contact with cattle outside the herd, and no disease or epidemic of any kind has yet been experienced on the island, not even a case of black leg.

To this short sketch of the circumstances under which the herd was founded, reared, and is now about to be dispersed, we would merely add the statement that the cattle herein catalogued are now in the best of health and in excellent breeding condition, neither fat nor thin, but in moderate flesh.

We have endeavored to make the catalogue complete in every particular.

An examination of the regular breeding performances of the cows is conclusive evidence as to the healthy state in which they have been kept for the past several years.

At an offering of this kind not only can the animals themselves be seen, but a number of their near relatives, their sons, daughters, fathers, mothers, sisters, cousins, aunts, etc., so that the purchaser can inform himself as to the family type of the animal he selects, and judge how truly they produce their kind, information of great value which should add largely to his confidence in bidding.

We hope to be honored by the attendance of all the breeders, whether they wish to purchase or not.

YOUNG VISCOUNT, of the Erica family, sire Hampton (492), dam Erica 3rd (1249), gained the first prize in his class at the Royal Northern show, and the first prize in the Highland Society show at Inverness in 1874; first at United Hanfshire show at Cornhill in 1875; first at the Highland Society's show at Glasgow in same year; in 1876 was first at Highland Society's show at Aberdeen; and in 1879 gained the first prize and champion cup at International show at Kilburn. Young Viscount was sold in 1878 by public sale for 225 guineas.

JUDGE (1150), of the Jilt family, sire Scotsman (474), dam Jilt (973), was first prize bull at the Paris Universal Exhibition of 1878.

JURYMAN (404), also a Jilt bull, won the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries in 1870, also the first prize at the Morayshire show at Elgin, and challenge cup for the best polled animal in the yard. In 1871 he gained the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Perth, and the first prize at the Morayshire show at Elgin.

TROJAN (402), sire Black Prince of Tillyfour (366), dam Charlotte (203), of the Queen Tribe, won the first prize at the Royal Agricultural Society's show at Newcastle in 1864, also the second prize at the Royal Northern Society's show at Aberdeen, and the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling same year. In 1865 he won the first prize at the Morayshire show at Elgin.

CUPBEARER (59) gained the first prize in 1851, as a one-year-old, at the Eastern Forfarshire Society; the first prize in 1852, at the Highland Society's show at Perth, as a two-year old; the first prize in 1853, as a three-year-old, at the Royal Northern Agricultural Society; the first prize in same year, as the best bull in Angus, Mearns, Aberdeen and Banff; the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Berwick in 1854; the first prize in 1856 at the Angus Society's show at Dundee; and was also awarded a prize at the Concours Agricole at Paris, in the same year.

OLD JOCK (1) was of the old Keillor stock, and in 1844 was sold for one hundred guineas. He was first, as a yearling, at the Highland Society's show at Dundee in 1843; again first at Inverness in 1846; and again at Perth in 1852; he was first at the Royal Irish at Londonderry in 1847, where also he stood second for the great Purcell challenge cup of \$500.00, open to all breeds.

ERMINIA (4171) is full sister to Editor, 1460, a most noted show bull. See Lot 17.

ENCHANTRESS (981) won the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Perth in 1871.

ERICA (843) gained the first prize as the best two-year-old heifer, and also the first prize as one of a pair, at the Angus Association at Dundee in 1859; the third prize as a cow at the Highland Society's show at Perth in 1861; and the first prize at Arbroath of the Angus Association in the same year.

EMILY in 1858 gained the Angus Society's second prize, at Kirriemuir, as a cow.

ERMINE BEARER was imported from Scotland when only one year old, and was never shown. Many prizes have been won at the Canadian Provincial and Dominion Exhibitions by young stock of his get.

ELCHIES (563) is by the Highland Society's prize bull Juryman (404), and his dam is Eisa (977), winner of several first prizes at the Highland Society's shows.

CLANSMAN (398) gained in 1865 the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Inverness. In 1867 he won the second prize at the spring show at Banff, and in 1868 he won the first prize at Cornhill, and second at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen. In 1869 he won the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh. In 1870 he gained a first prize at the Royal Northern show at Aberdeen.

HERO (400) is by Don Fernando (514), and has for dam Pride of Aberdeen (581); see below.

PRESIDENT 4TH (368) gained the first prize as a yearling at the Highland Society's show at Stirling in 1864; and the first prize as a two-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1865. He is by President 3rd (246), a noted prize winner, dam Flower of Strathmore, 479, by Cupbearer (59).

BLACK PRINCE OF TILLYFOUR (366) is by Rob Roy Macgregor (267), dam Maid of Orleans (530), winner of first prize as the best two-year-old heifer at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen in 1858. Black Prince is sire of several very noted show animals.

HANTON (228) gained the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Berwick in 1854, and gained the first prize in Paris in 1856. In 1856 he was also first prize aged bull at the Highland Society's show at Inverness.

ANGUS (45) won the first prize in the class of bulls of any age at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh in 1848, being then two years and two months old.

PANMURE (51) in 1843 gained the Highland Society's first prize at Dundee as the best aged bull, beating fifteen others; and the first prize at the Eastern Forfarshire Association in the same year. He gained the Four Counties first prize and numerous others in Aberdeenshire, never being beaten except by his son Monarch (44).

By the dams also in King of Trumps' pedigree numerous prizes have been won.

KING OF TRUMPS (2895) was imported when under one year old. He was first prize two-year-old bull at the Industrial Exhibition, Toronto, in 1883, and at the Dominion Exhibition, Ottawa, the same year; and at the latter show he won the silver medal as the best bull of any age. In 1884 he was first prize aged bull at the Dominion Exhibition at London, and at the Industrial, Toronto. He was killed by an accident on board the Big Island ferry boat, on 16th May, 1887.

CHALLENGER (1260) is by Gainsborough (596), winner of the first prize at the Angus Agricultural Association's show at Forfar in 1873, and of Lord Dalhousie's prize for the best bull in the yard; also the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling in the same year, and the first at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1874. Challenger was a very handsome bull, and his picture is chosen to adorn the fifth volume of the Polled Herd Book; being calved four days before date specified in show regulations, he could not compete in his class, either as yearling or two-year-old. He is the sire of Coquette 12th (7838), the champion fat heifer at the Smithfield Fat Stock show, competing against all Breeds.

MARQUIS OF PERTH (726) is by Duke of Perth (357), winner of first at Elgin as a one-year-old and commended at the Highland Society's show in 1871; winner of third at Highland Society's show at Keiso in 1872, second at Stirling in 1873, and first at Glasgow in 1875.

LOCHIEL (723) is by Jupiter (471), who gained first at the Highland Society's show at Glasgow in 1867 in the class for aged bulls, and is a son of the great Windsor (223).

REFORM (408) is by Black Prince of Tillyfour (366). Reform gained second at the Royal Northern Society's show at Aberdeen in 1870.

SYBIL (974) the foundress of this Sybil family, won first prize as one of a pair of cows at the Royal Northern Society's show in 1869, and was second at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh same year. In 1870 she won first at the Royal Northern and first at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries, and in 1871 the gold medal at the Highland Society's show at Perth. The Sybil family has since produced a number of prize winners. A group of this family won Lord Aberdeen's prize at the Royal Northern Society's show in 1884 for the best family of polled breed.

CHIVALRY (1765) in 1883 gained the first prize in his class at the Dominion (Canada) Exhibition and at the Industrial Exhibition, Toronto, and the silver medal for best bull of any age. In 1884 he was again first in his class at the same two exhibitions, and won the silver medal in Toronto for best bull of any age.

JURY TWIN (2174), by Marshall Var (1452), a son of Young Viscount (736), dam May Queen 11th of Mulben (5991), by Elgin (724), winner of first at Elgin in 1872 and 1873, also first prizes at Banff and Aberdeen in 1874, and fourth at Highland Society's at Stirling, and first at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries (1039), by Prince of Wales (453) who gained a number of firsts at the Highland Society and other shows; 3 d. Mayflower 5th (1184), by Malcolm of Bodlochell (566), who gained second at the Highland Society's show in 1858 and again in 1861; 4 d. Snodick (419), by Jock of Tillyfour (87); 5 d. Madge (161). This Madge family produced Tidy (2349), the champion female at Smithfield in 1871.

DERBY OF MONTBLETTON (914), by Shah (680) who gained the first when one year old at the Royal Northern Society's show at Aberdeen in 1873; the fourth prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling the same year, and the first prize in aged class at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries in 1878; dam Pride of Alford (1778) by Jim Crow 3rd (359) also a noted prize winner; g. d. Matilda of Tillyfour (1173), etc. This bull is of the very favorite Zara tribe that produced Paris 1473, the head of the Paris 1878 group.

HAMPTON (492), gained the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling in 1873. He is got by Jamie of Easter Skene (367), dam Matilda of Hillockhead (1750), etc., of the Mina tribe, Hampton was the sire of Young Viscount (736).

TAM O'SHANTER (491), gained the first prize at the Banff and Turriff Association, the first at Aberdeen, the Highland Society's first prize at Perth in 1861, and first prizes at Aberdeen in 1862 and 1863. He is got by Hanton (228), dam Lola Montes (208).

YOUNG CHARLOTTE (103), gained first prize at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh in 1848.

BLACK JUDGE 6612 has been in the show ring every year since 1883 inclusive, and has never been beaten; in that year he was first as a calf at the Toronto Industrial. In 1884 he was first prize yearling at the same show; in 1885 at both the Toronto Industrial and the Provincial Exhibition, London, he was first in two-year-old class, and won the medal and diploma for best bull of any age. In 1886 at the Toronto Industrial he was again first in his class and best bull of any age, and in 1887 at the Provincial Exhibition, Ottawa, he won both the same honors and special jubilee medal.

THE QUEEN TRIBE.

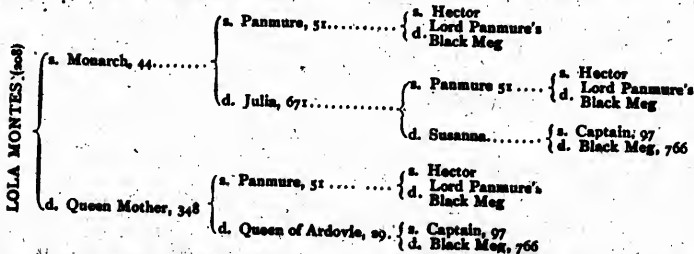
Extract from Macdonald & Sinclair's History.

"In the Queen tribe there is a monument to Mr. McCombie's skill and success as a breeder. We have in it the result of the combined efforts in cattle-breeding of Mr. Fullerton and Mr. McCombie, but chiefly of the latter, as the material was manipulated by him during a period of no less than thirty-seven years. In examining the career of the Queen tribe, the first point that excites notice is the illustration which it affords of Mr. McCombie's remarkable faculty of instantly and with unerring accuracy perceiving the inherent qualities and possibilities of development in an animal. This rare acquirement was undoubtedly perfected when he was transacting his immense business in buying and selling store cattle. It came to his aid on the occasion when he attended the late Mr. Fullerton's sale at Ardovie, in 1844, and made purchases that have become historical in connection with the polled breed. In that year Mr. McCombie brought to Tillyfour, from Ardovie, two young heifers, Queen Mother (348) and Jean Aun (206), full sisters, both out of Queen of Ardovie (29) and after Panmure (51). The breeding and achievements of these animals have already been described.

"There was something in their appearance and in their pedigree which fascinated Mr. McCombie, and he determined on securing more of the same sort. He obtained, after considerable trouble, the bull Monarch (44), who was got by Panmure (51), and out of Julia (671), the latter after Panmure (51), and having for dam Susanna, a full sister of Queen of Ardovie (29).

"With the produce of these closely-allied animals Mr. McCombie resolved to risk his fame as a breeder, and he had no reason to regret the choice, for the strain has made a reputation second to none in the annals of the breed.

"Monarch was twice put to Queen Mother and the produce in 1847 was Lola Montes (208), and in 1849, Bloomer (201), both of whom became celebrated prize cows. The following shows the pedigree up to this point:



It has already been explained that Mr. McCombie having, according to his own published ideas on the subject, carried in-and-in breeding to an extreme point, sought an out-cross, and procured from Mr. Watson, Keillor, the bull Angus, 45, one of the best bred and best-looking sires reared in that herd, he having been out of Old Favorite, and after the celebrated bull, Old Jock I., who was also out of Old Favorite. Lola Montes, produced in 1852, a calf by Angus, 45, which attained very high fame by her achievements in the show-yard, and also as the foundress of the branch of the Queen

tribe which Mr. McCombie himself held in greatest favor, and which is now specially associated with his name. The calf referred to was Charlotte, 203, known from her victory in the gay capital in 1856 as the 'Paris Cow.' Charlotte's calf, in 1857, was Pride of Aberdeen, 581, got by Hanton, 228, who may be also termed the 'Paris Bull,' he having gained the corresponding honors in the male class at the French exhibition, in 1856, to that obtained by Charlotte in the female section.

"A somewhat nice point arises here, Pride of Aberdeen, 581, had two full sisters, Empress of France, 578, and Daisy of Tillyfour, 1165, and we have heard the question asked, "In what consists the superiority of the Pride of Aberdeen branch of the Queen tribe over the Dandy and Daisy or Vine branches, which trace respectively to Pride's full sisters, Empress, 578, and Daisy, 1165?" Of course there was absolutely no difference in the blood of these three cows; but, while both Empress and Daisy were undoubtedly fine animals, Daisy, especially, having been a Highland Society first prize cow, and winner of the challenge cup at Aberdeen, neither of them can display a show and breeding record equal to that of the Pride of Aberdeen. Indeed, Pride of Aberdeen's career is without parallel in the chronicles of the breed. She was the first prize yearling, the first prize two-year-old, and the first prize cow at the Highland Society's shows; she gained the challenge cup at Aberdeen; and she was the first prize cow at the International Show, at Battersea, 1862, where she beat her dam, Charlotte, and was referred to as being, with Mr. Richard Booth's celebrated short horn cow, Queen of the Ocean—designated by Mr. Carr, the historian of the Booth short horns, "a superb short horn, a queen of cows"—the best female animal on the ground. Nor was this all, Pride of Aberdeen must have possessed, along with the most perfect shapes and quality, an extraordinary constitution. Few females of any breed have been able to stand three years of the forcing process necessary to keep in the front rank in the show-yard, and crown a career of unsurpassed success in exhibition, by no less distinguished performances as a breeder.

"Pride of Aberdeen produced seven female calves and four male calves that have been registered. The bulls were useful in the herds to which they were introduced, while from each of the females has sprung a race of valuable cattle.

"An examination of the circumstances, therefore, proves that it was no mere fancy that led Mr. McCombie to maintain that the Pride of Aberdeen family was the most precious branch of the Queen tribe. The favor in which the Prides are regarded has certainly not been gained by that rarity which results from inbreeding. We have counted the number of female descendants of Pride of Aberdeen, 581, registered in vols. II., III., IV., V. and VI., of the 'Herd Book,' and find there are no fewer than 78. The estimation in which the Prides are held by breeders is illustrated by the fact that nine of the best representatives of the family sold publicly, in 1880 and 1881, realized an average of £140 each, one cow (Mr. Auld's Pride of Aberdeen 9th) bringing £283, 10s. The Prides are distinguished in individual appearance by long, square, handsome frames, length of quarter, great size, substance and wealth of flesh; while they are known to be robust in constitution, with wonderful aptitude to mature early, and to lay on flesh and fat on the better parts.

"The cow Windsor, 202, out of Queen Mother, 348, and after Victor, 46, was the first prize-yearling heifer at the show of the Royal Agricultural Society of England at Windsor in 1851, and, besides numerous other honors, won the first prize as a cow at Berwick in 1854. She was the dam of two splendid bulls—Windsor, 221, and Rob Roy Macgregor, 267, full brothers, both having been after Hanton, 228. These remarkable animals are referred to, at length, in connection with the Tillyfour, Westertown and Kinnaird herds. Windsor, 202, is represented in the female line, only by stock tracing from her daughter Beauty of Morlich, 2072, by Angus, 45. This animal was sold to Mr. Cran, Morlich. We know little concerning her individual appearance, but good stock has been bred from her."

BLACK PRINCE of Ambleside (2542) got by Major 3rd (666), dam Waterside Lucy (4816), by Knight of Aven (775), g. dam Mary of Methlick (1761), by Distraeli (401), 3 dam Daisy of Drummin (959) by Deffance (397), 4 dam Young Lucy (947) by young Panmure (231), 5 dam Lucy of Portlethen (887) by Fyria (12), 6 dam Young Miss Alexander (16) by Sir Alexander (10), 7 dam Miss Alexander (678).
BLACK WATCH (1242), got by Gainsborough (596); dam Lillias of Tillyfour (1795), by Black Prince of Wester Fowles (619); Pride of Aberdeen 5th (1174), by Bright (454); Pride of Aberdeen (581), by Hanton (228), etc. Black Watch was sire of the famous Smithfield Champion of 1881, Gainsborough was a winner of the first prize at Angus Agricultural Association's show at Forfar, 1873, and Lord Dalhousie's prize for the best bull in the yard; the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling in the same year, and first prize at Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1874.

TALISMAN (640), got by Elector (427); dam Bognie (1070), etc. Elector won the first prize as a two-year old at the United Banffshire Agricultural Society's show at Keith in 1869, and the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh. In 1870 he won the first prize at the Banffshire Society's show at Cornhill, and the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Dunfries, and in 1871 was commended at the show at Perth.

CHAMPION (459), bred by Wm. McCombie, Tillyfour; got by Derby (377); dam Zara (1228), etc., etc. **PRESIDENT 4th (368)**, got by President 3rd (246); dam Flower of Strathmore (479), etc. President 4th (368) gained the first prize as a yearling at the Highland Society's show at Stirling in 1864, and the first prize as a two-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1865.

HANTON (228), got by Fat (59); dam Lizzie (227), etc. Hanton gained the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Berwick in 1854, and was sold to Mr. McCombie for £105. He was afterwards exhibited at Paris in 1856, when he gained the first prize, also first prize at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1856.

ANGUS (45), got by Grey-breasted Jock (2); dam bred by Hugh Watson. Angus (45) won first prize in the class of bulls of any age at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh in 1848.

MONARCH (44), got by Panmure (51), dam Julia (671).

PANMURE (51), got by Hector (12), dam a pure Buchan cow named Black Meg. Panmure in 1843 gained the Highland Society's first prize at Dundee as the best aged bull in class X, beating fifteen others; and the first prize at the Easter Forfarshire Association in the same year. At Dundee Mr. Fullerton sold him to Mr. Farquharson Taylor, Wellhouse, to whom he gained the Four Counties first prize, and numerous others in Aberdeenshire, never being beaten except by his son Monarch (44).

NOTE.—Pride of Big Island 2768 won third prize as a yearling at the combined Dominion and Provincial Exhibition, held at Ottawa in 1884, Coquette of Big Island, Lot 18, being first, and Duchess of Verulam, Lot 24, being second, and her dam, Pride of Findhorn 3rd (4758) 2705, formed one of our "bronze medal" herd at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition same year. She produced a heifer calf prematurely on May 7th, 1887, by Vedette (5094) 2904, which died within two hours of birth.

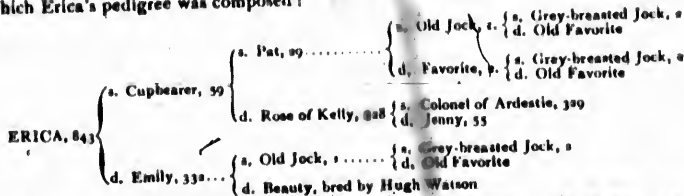

ERICA, COQUETTE AND LADY FANNY FAMILIES.

Extract from Macdonald & Sinclair's History.

No family of polled cattle has in recent years taken a more distinguished position in the show yard than the Ballindalloch Ericas. Since 1870 they have not been absent from the prize list of the Highland Society's shows, excepting on two occasions. We have compiled the following list of prizes gained at the Highland Society's shows by specimens of this fashionable strain: 1870, Dumfries—Cupbearer 431 out of Erica 843, second prize, two-year old bull; Elsa 977, out of Erica 843, second prize cow. 1871, Perth—Elsa, first prize cow; Enchantress 981, put of Erica 843, first prize two-year old heifer. 1872, Kelso—Enchantress, second prize cow. 1874, Inverness—Young Viscount 736, out of Erica 3rd, 1249, first prize yearling bull; Eva 984, out of Elsa 977, third prize cow. 1875, Glasgow—Young Viscount, first prize two-year old bull; Ethel 1415, out of Enchantress 981, second prize two-year old heifer. 1876, Aberdeen—Young Viscount, first prize aged bull; Bacchus 607, out of Elsa 977, very highly commended aged bull. St. Clair, first prize two-year old bull; Eva, second prize cow; Erica 6th, 3023, out of Erica 4th, 1697, fourth prize heifer. 1877, Edinburgh—St. Clair, third prize aged bull; Cluny 1283, out of Eva 984, highly commended two-year old bull; Eva, second prize cow; Echo 2976, out of Elsa 977, highly commended cow; Erica 6th, third prize two-year old heifer; Edina 2987, out of Enchantress 981, third prize yearling heifer. 1878, Dumfries—Editor 1460, out of Edith 2973, commended one-year old bull; Echo, second prize cow; Edina, third prize two-year old heifer. 1879, Perth—Editor, highly commended two-year old bull; Eva, fourth prize cow. 1881, Stirling—Express 1821, out of Eleanor 3376, fourth prize yearling bull; Essenc 4347, out of Erica 9th, 3822, second prize yearling heifer.

We have referred to the Erica family at such length in notices of the Kinnaird and Ballindalloch herds, that little remains to be said here. Erica 843, the foundress of the family, was bought by Sir George Macpherson Grant, at the Earl of Southesk's sale in 1861, for fifty guineas, her sire having been Cupbearer 59, and her dam Emily 332, by Old Jock 1, bred by Mr. Watson, Keillor; the sire and grandsire having thus been two of the most renowned show bulls of the breed. The following displays the material of which Erica's pedigree was composed:



All the existing female specimens of the Erica family are descended from either of four calves, as follows:

As previously explained, Erica 3rd, out of Erica 2nd, 1284, and Ella 1205, were sold, the former to Mr. Duff, Hillclohead, and the latter to Mr. Macgregor, Cupline. Elsa and Enchantress were retained in the herd, and the family, as bred without interruption at Ballindalloch, accordingly traces from these two daughters of Erica; got by the admirably bred Queen bull, Trojan 402. The Erica sires that have been used in the Ballindalloch herd were: Elchies 563, out of Elsa; Elcho 595, out of Erica; Editor 1460, out of Edith 2973; and Young Viscount 736. The last named is at present the stock bull, being assisted by Justice 1462, a son of Elcho 595.

Very few female Ericas have been parted with from Ballindalloch since the family acquired its reputation, and it is thus difficult to indicate with precision the market value of the tribe. Young Viscount fetched 225 guineas in public competition, and a female Erica was sold publicly in 1877 for over 100 guineas. We have heard of several female

specimens of the tribe having been sold privately at considerably over 100 guineas, and Sir George Macpherson Grant has lately had submitted to him an offer of 500 guineas for the first female Erica he can spare from his herd. The Ericas show striking uniformity of type, and display undoubted indications of high breeding. They are deep, broad, compact, low-set cattle, with short fine legs, excellent ribs and loins, beautiful quality, graceful head, and very rich cover of flesh.

The most distinguished families associated with the Ballindalloch herd are the Ericas and Jilts, to which reference has previously been made. Sir George Macpherson Grant has, however, succeeded in rearing many animals of other strains that have attained no little celebrity. The cow Sybil, 974, bred by Mr. Shaw, Bogfern, and purchased from Colonel Fraser, of Castle Fraser, had earned renown before she went to Ballindalloch. She produced there some good stock, although none of them have yet equalled the old matron's fame. The Coquette-family represents the old Ballindalloch stock, the dam of Coquette, 1417, having been bred by the late Sir John Macpherson Grant. Crossed with the celebrated sires at Ballindalloch, it has produced good animals. At Ballindalloch is also preserved the Balwylo Keepsake family, tracing from a somewhat famous cow, Keepsake, 427, by President, 205, bred at Balwylo. The Lady Fanny family had its origin in Grannie, 131, bred by Mr. Grant, Carnousie, the first of the sort that went to Ballindalloch being Young Mary, 527, bred in 1852 by Mr. Grant, of Carron. This animal produced Lady Fanny, 971, by King Charles, 236. The Miss Burgess family, which has supplied two first prize cows at Highland Society's shows—Bertha, 980, and Maid of Avon, 2995—springs from Miss Burgess, 1198, by King Charles, 236, this animal's dam having been bred by Mr. Burgess, slack of Ballindalloch. The Nosegay family is another old Ballindalloch variety, tracing from Nettle by Craig, 260. It is specially noted for its milking properties."

Dam Lady Ann of Westertown (926) by Prince Albert of Westertown, 237; g.d. Young Lady Ann (307) by Victor (46); g.g.d. Lady Ann of Balgavies (102) Balliemore (741) was commended at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh in 1877.

KILDONAN (405) is by Black Prince of Tillyfour (366); dam Keepeake (427) by President (505); g.d. Mopsis (76) by First Prize Angus (313); g.g.d. Old Mopsis (742).

KING CHARLES (236) is by Druid (223), who in 1856 and 1857 gained first prizes at the shows of the Highland Society, Royal Northern Society, and Angus Association; and in 1857 the Royal Northern prizes as the best bull in the yard, and the best in the counties of Angus, Mearns, Aberdeen and Banff; and in 1858 carried off the first prize at the Royal English at Chester, and a similar prize from the Angus Association. The dam of King Charles (156), namely Kathleen of Kinnaird (319), gained in 1853 the Royal Northern Society's first prize as a one-year-old, and the Angus Society's second prize as one of a pair; in 1854, the Highland Society's second prize as a two-year-old; in 1856 the Angus Society's second prize as a cow; and in 1857, the Highland Society's second prize. King Charles (236) himself gained the Royal Northern Society's second prize at Aberdeen in 1859; the Morayshire Society's second prize at Elgin; and the Duke of Richmond's second prize at Huntley, in the same year.

THE COQUETTES are one of the oldest families bred at Ballindalloch. Dandy (794) was bred by the late Sir John Macpherson Grant; Coquette (1417), Coquette 2nd, Coquette 5th and Coquette 10th, by Sir George Macpherson Grant. Coquette 11th (7838) of this family won the champion cup at the Smithfield Fat Stock show for best fat cow or heifer, competing against all breeds and crosses.

NOTE.—Coquette 10th formed one of the herd with which we won the "bronze medal" at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition in 1884, but was defeated in the cow class by Mary 2nd of Knockiemill, Lot 48, and Flower of Knockiemill (5875), the dam of Black Judge, 6612, Lot 4.

THE KINNOCHTRY BLUE BELL FAMILY AND EASTER TULLOCH DUCHESSSES, ETC.

Extract from Macdonald & Sinclair's History.

"A few remarks about the sires used at Kinnochtry will be interesting. The first notable sires used were the early Keillor Jocks, as already mentioned. Both Black Jock (3) and Young Jock (4) were Mr. Ferguson's property. They were as good as most of the bulls to be seen at the time present, and both were splendid getters. After them came Hugh, 130, from Mr. Watson, who had been using him. Hugh was the last calf of Old Grannie, 1, and was also a very superior bull, leaving some excellent stock. The last Keillor stud bull, President 3rd, 246, bred at Balwyllie after President 2nd, 54, and out of Isabella of Balwyllie, 423, was also used. He was a long, level, stylish bull, and a prize winner at the Highland Society. The Baronet, 339, bred at Crathes, but from Keillor stock, was also used. He was quite equal to President 3rd as a getter, and was kept for a good many years. In 1863, when eight years old, he gained the first prize at the Scottish Midland Agricultural Society's show, and at Perth.

"Young Hugh, 131, after Hugh, 130, and out of Prizie, 586, was then used, being about the most gay and stylish bull Mr. Ferguson ever had. He was never fed for showing, but in 1851 he was exhibited at the Perth show of the Highland Society and, although in lean condition was highly commended. Young Hugh carried all before him: at the local shows, and was sire of the cow Princess 2nd, 916, now sixteen years old, and who has twice, in lean condition, beat Highland Society prize cows. It was, Mr. Ferguson informs us, mainly from this bull that the Kinnochtry Princesses got their high bred looking and characteristic heads. Young Hugh was sold to Mr. William Watson, who was then engaged breeding polled cattle at Binns, near Dundee. After the Baronet, 339, and Young Hugh, 131, Crathie Jock, 340, calved in 1865, was used. Bred by Mr. Ferguson, he was out of Princess of Kinnochtry, 914, and got by the Baronet, 339. He gained a large number of prizes and was a remarkable instance of early maturity. Meeting with an accident, when under three years old, he was sold by weight to Mr. Young, Whitelawstone, near Dundee, when his four quarters were found to weigh 132 stones, dead weight. After Crathie Jock, Crathie 2nd, 342, also bred by Mr. Ferguson, was used. Crathie 2nd was got by the Baronet, 339, out of Miss Scott, 913, by Hugh, 130; g.d., Beauty of Kinnochtry, 595, by Young Jock, 4; g.g.d., Prize, 586, being thus of the Baroness family. In Mr. Ferguson's possession he gained the first prizes as a yearling at the shows of the Scottish Midland and Stormount Union Agricultural Societies, in 1868. He was sold when two years old to Mr. William Owen, of Blessington, County Wicklow, and, in Mr. Owen's possession, won the first prize as a two-year-old at the National Show, in Ireland, in 1879, the first prize at the Royal Dublin Society's spring show, in 1870; and the first prize at the Irish National show, the same year. Crathie 2nd was a lengthy, gay, and fine handling, stylish bull, and Mr. Owen kept him a long time. Mr. Ferguson believes that this bull gave an impetus to the breeding of polled cattle in Ireland, leaving excellent stock in Mr. Owen's herd, as he had done at Kinnochtry."

WESTERTOWN ROSE FAMILY.

Extract from Macdonald & Stclair's History.

"At Westertown, Fochabers, a herd of polled cattle was owned by the late Mr. George Brown's father about half a century ago, and animals exhibited from it gained prizes at the early shows of the Morayshire Farmer's Club. In 1853 Mr. John Brown gave up to his son, Mr. George Brown, the entire management of the farm. The Westertown herd may thus, for all practical purposes, be said to date from that year. When the herd was dispersed in 1874, it consisted of five families. These were the Roses, tracing from Marion 308 (calved in 1855, by the Tillyfour bull, Uncle Tom 90), bred by Mr. James Fraser, Lhanbryde, Elgin; the Victorias, tracing from Victoria of Auchinbo 127, bred by Mr. Gordon Auchinbo, who for many years owned polled cattle; the Lady Anns, tracing from Young Lady Ann 307, bred by Mr. McCombie, of Tillyfour, calved in 1850, by Victor 46, and out of Lady Ann of Balgavies 102, bred by Colonel Dalgairns, of Balgavies; and the Duchesses, tracing from Duchess of Westertown 927, bred by Mr. McCombie, of Tillyfour, calved in 1860, and bought as a calf in 1860, for 19 guineas, Duchess was got by Rob Roy Macgregor 267; a son of Windsor 202, of the Queen tribe, out of Favorite, 1237, also of the Queen tribe, and, like Windsor 202, after Hanton 228. The remaining family was the Violet, from Clara 89, bred by Mr. Brown. Among other cows in the herd, but extinct in the female line for many years prior to 1874, were Paris Kate 309, calved in 1850, bred by Mr. Bowie, and purchased in 1857 at West Scryne for £41; and Matchless 390, calved in 1849, bred at Tillyfour, after Monarch 44, and descended from the St. John's Wells herd.

The first sire of importance used by Mr. George Brown, was Victor 46, calved in 1846, bred by Mr. McCombie, of Tillyfour, after Monarch 44, a son of Panmure 51, and out of Jean Ann 206, a daughter of Panmure 51. Then followed Uncle Tom 90, another bull bred at Tillyfour, but whose pedigree is not recorded. Next came Earl Spencer 3rd, 26, from Mains of Kelly, a great grandson of Panmure 51. In 1856 Mr. Brown bought a bull calf from Mr. McCombie, which proved the most valuable and potent animal introduced to the herd. The bull was Windsor 221, calved in 1856, after Hanton 228, and out of Windsor 202, who was a daughter of Victor 46 and Queen Mother 384, being thus very closely bred from the Panmure and Queen blood. Windsor was sold in 1858 to the Earl of Southesk, and his doings at Kinnaird and in the show-yard are fully noticed in connection with that herd. On the sale of Windsor 221, King Charles 236, bred by Lord Southesk, and descended on the dam's side from a daughter

of Monarch 44, was transferred to Westertown. The chief sires afterwards used were all bred at Westertown. They were Prince Albert 237, calved in 1858, a son of Windsor 221 and Maid of Moray 310; President 354, calved in 1859, a son of Windsor 221 and Elizabeth 391; by Victor 46, Elizabeth being of the St. John's Wells Matchless strain; Captain 468, calved in 1863, a son of President 354, and Rose 3rd, 925, by Prince Albert 237; Success 469, calved in 1865, a son of Captain 468 and Duchess 927, by Rob Roy Macgregor; March 355, calved in 1867, a son of Success 469 and Lady Ann 926, by Prince Albert 237; Baron Settrington 356, calved in 1869, a son of Duchess 927 and March 355; and Duke of Perth 357, calved in 1870, a son of March 355 and Rose 3rd, 925. It will thus be seen that all the sires used by Mr. Brown (with the exception of Uncle Tom 90, of whose breeding there is no record) had flowing in their veins a plentiful stream of the blood of Panmure 51 and the Ardovie Queens.

"Mr. Brown was perhaps, of all breeders of improved cattle, the most systematic. There was no haphazard in his mode of breeding. He fixed upon a certain strain of blood and a certain type of cattle, and he labored to realize a distinct aim with such skill and method as has been displayed by the Messrs. Booth and Mr. Bates, in breeding Shorthorns. His cattle were bred from close affinities, but the dangers of excessive inbreeding were guarded against by keeping a large number of stock bulls. As the result of Mr. Brown's rare tact and judgment, a thoroughly characteristic herd was built up. His animals possessed a uniformity of type and style that was quite unmistakable. In the show-yard the herd had reached high eminence for several years previous to 1860, when it sustained a serious reverse. At the Highland Society's show at Dumfries that year, Mr. Brown exhibited three animals. They all won prizes, but the victory was dearly bought. The cattle caught pleuro-pneumonia at Dumfries, and communicated it to the rest of the herd, which, before the plague was stayed, was reduced to seven animals. Mr. Brown courageously, and with renewed energy and determination, resumed breeding with this remnant of a previously splendid herd. Showing was abstained from until 1868, when the bull March, retrieved the laurels of the herd, and until Mr. Brown's death in 1874, show-yard honors again fell thick and fast. The new herd had, thus been actually in existence for only about fourteen years, a period too brief for the maturing of Mr. Brown's plans. Had his life been spared a few years longer, it was confidently expected that Mr. Brown would have made Westertown the scene of as wonderful achievements in cattle breeding as Warlaby or Kirklevington. But this was not to be. Mr. Brown's death in 1874 abruptly terminated a career that was full of promise. At the dispersion of his herd in 1874, the animals fell into good hands. They enriched many already valuable stocks, and specimens of the Westertown families still exist in considerable numbers. It is to be regretted, however, that no one has attempted to complete the half-finished work commenced so systematically and successfully by Mr. Brown."

In 1869 he was first at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh. In 1870 he gained a first at the Royal Northern show at Aberdeen. Knight of Avon's dam is Dandy of Drumin (949), by Rob Roy MacGregor (167); g. d. Empress of Franca (578), by Hanton (228); 3 d. Charlotte (203), by Angus (45); 4 d. Lola Montez (208), by Monarch (44); 5 d. Queen Mother (348), by Panmure (51); 6 d. Queen of Ardovie (19), by Captain (97); 7 d. Black Meg (766).

BARON SETTRINGTON (356), in 1870, gained the Highland Society's first prize at Dumfries, and first prize at Elgin as a one-year-old. In 1871 he won the Royal Northern Society's first prize at Aberdeen, the Highland Society's first prize at Perth, and the first prize and challenge cup at Elgin when two years old. He is got by March (353), who, in 1868, gained first prize as a one-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen, and first prize and challenge cup at Elgin; in 1869 he won the Royal Agricultural Society of England's first prize at Manchester, and first at Elgin; in 1870, the Highland Society's second prize at Dumfries, and first at Elgin. Baron Settrington's dam is Duchess of Westertown (927), of the Queen Tribe; descended from Black Meg (766). DRUMIN LUCY FAMILY.

Extract from "Macdonald & Stclair's History of Polled Aberdeen Angus Cattle."

"The Lucy family, although now best known in connection with the Drumin and Mains of Kelly herds, is descended from one of the oldest tribes at Portlethen. They are the same strain as the bull Raglan, 208, for whom Mr. Walker, Portlethen, refused an offer of £230 from the Emperor Napoleon, in 1856. The following exhibits the composition of the pedigree:

The Drumin herd was founded about 1856 by the late Mr. James Skinner, father of the present owner, Mr. W. M. Skinner. Mr. Skinner then purchased three heifers from Morayshire, the pedigrees of which were never obtained. From them spring three families, of which the first recorded members are Fortunc, 945, Grace, 946, and Eliza, 960. In 1862 there were bought from Mr. Bowie, Mains of Kelly, the heifers Young Lucy, 947, and Young Raniston, 948. As these are the animals that established the families that have mainly raised the reputation of the herd, it is desirable to furnish a brief analysis of their pedigrees. Young Lucy, 947, was after Young Panmure, 232, bred by Mr. McCombie, of Tillyfour, the first prize aged bull at Dumfries Highland Society show, in 1860. He was got by Hanton, 228, and out of Crinoline, 204, one of the closest-bred Queen cows at Tillyfour, a daughter of the celebrated Charlotte, 203. Young Lucy's dam, Lucy of Portlethen, 287, was out of the same cow as Raglan, 208, who was in the prize list at the Paris Exhibition, in 1856, when Mr. Walker, Portlethen, his breeder, refused an offer of £230 from the Emperor Napoleon. Young Raniston, 948, was after Alford, 231, a son of Hanton, 228, and the Queen cow, Fair Maid of Perth, 313, a first prize winner at the Royal English and Highland Society's shows. From these two heifers, acquired from Mr. Bowie, are descended the Lucy and the Beauty families."

He is got by Gainsborough (596) who gained, in 1873, the first prize at the Angus Agricultural Association's show at Forfar, and Lord Dalhousie's prize for the best bull in the yard; the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Stirling, in the same year, and the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1874. The dam of Logie the Laird 3rd is Lizzie 4th (2249) by the Highland Society prize bull, Jim Crow 3rd (350); g.d. Lizzie 3rd (1603) by Lurgan (429), a son of Lola Montes (208); 3 d. Lizzie 2nd (249) by Earl Spencer 4th (27); 4 d. Lizzie (227), who gained the first prize, as a two-year-old heifer, at the East Forfarshire Farming Association show, and the first prize as a cow at the Angus Agricultural Society's show, in 1855; she was not shown at the Highland Society's show. Lizzie (227) was the dam of Hanton (228).

JESTER (472) was commended at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1874. He is got by Victor of Ballindalloch (403), dam Jilt (973) by Black Prince of Tillyfour (366); g.d. Beauty of Tillyfour 2nd (1180) by Young Jock (4); 3 d. Favorite (2) by Grey-breasted Jock (2).

CLANSMAN (398) gained, in 1865, the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Inverness. In 1867 he won the second prize at the spring show at Banff, and in 1868 he won the first prize at Cornhill, and second at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen. In 1869 he won the first prize at the Highland Society's show at Edinburgh. In 1870 he gained a first prize at the Royal Northern show at Aberdeen. He is got by Damascus (425), dam Magdalena (817) by Napoleon (257), etc., etc.

MARSHALL (399). We quote the following respecting this bull from "Macdonald & Sinclair's History": "Marshall was by Black Prince of Tillyfour, 366, a son of Rob Roy Macgregor, and out of Fancy of Tillyfour (1195), a daughter of the Belle (205). Marshall was a grand bull of great substance, and the characteristic of size which still follows the Drumlin stock was inherited from him."

YOUNG PANMURE (232) was bred by Wm. McCombie, of Tillyfour, and is got by Hanton (228) and out of Crinoline (204). He gained the first prize as a one-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen in 1858, and the second prize at the Angus Agricultural Association in the same year; the first as a two-year-old at the Angus Agricultural Association in Dundee in 1859; the first at the Glasgow Agricultural Association, and the second at the Highland Society's show at Edinburg, all in the same year; the first as a three-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries in 1860, and the first at the Angus Agricultural Association at Forfar in the same year. Young Panmure also obtained the £10 prize at the Royal English Agricultural Society's show at Leeds in 1861.

ROTHIEMAY FAMILIES.

Extract from Macdonald & Sinclair's History.

"The foundation of the present Rothiemay herd may be said to have been laid by the purchase by Major Tayler of two black polled cows named Old Lady Jean and Miss Morrison, from the late General Hay, of Rannes, and a bull named Fintray 125, from the late Mr. James Walker, Wester Fintray, about the year 1846. The cows were very large and strong. Their descendants have been regularly retained and bred from; and in the 'Herd Book' the pedigree of the strains established by these fine animals trace from Old Lady Jean 187, and Miss Morrison 833. Another cow early added to the herd was Victoria, of Glenbarry 534, calved in 1855, after Black Jock of Mulben 104. She was acquired from her breeder, Mr. Paterson, Mulben. From Old Lady Jean the Rothiemay Georgina tribe has sprung, through Georgina of Rothlemay 532, by Fintray 125, calved in 1852; from Miss Morrison the Rothiemay family of that name descends, and a third family comes from the Mulben cow, Victoria of Glenbarry, 534. This then was the material on which Mr. Tayler's fine herd has been reared. For many years no females were added besides those bred in it, and much of its success is due to the careful selection of sires. At Mr. McCombie's sale at Tillyfour, in 1857, the bull Napoleon 257 was bought for 40 guineas. Napoleon was out of Bloomer 201, a daughter of Quea, Mother 348, and after Hanton 228. He was described by Mr. McCombie in the sale catalogue as being 'got by the best bull, and out of the best cow in the world in the opinion of the exposor.' Napoleon was also individually a first-class animal; he won the second prize as a two-year old at the Aberdeen show of the Highland Society, in 1858, and was used in the herd for a considerable time. The next sire used was Damascus 495, bought when a calf at the Earl of Southesk's sale in 1861. After the Queen bull Windsor 221, he was out of Deodora 1232, of the Kinnaird Dora family. Damascus was a splendid bull, and left excellent stock. By these two bulls some of the best blood in the country was infused into the herd. Napoleon was very strong in the Tillyfour Queen blood, which was also continued by the sire of Damascus; while the dam of the latter was after a son; and out of a daughter of Cupbearer 59, through whom the Keillor and Mains of Kelly strains were introduced.

"Then followed Elector 427, bred by Colonel Gordon, winner of the third prize at the Highland Society's shows in 1870 and 1871, and second in 1872. The other sires used were Bon Accord 446, bought from the Earl of Fife in 1871, winner of the second prize at the Highland Society's show at Kelso, in 1872; Canmore 626, bought in 1874 from Mr. Elmslie, Cardenston; Waterside King 870, after Mr. Bowie's Major 3rd, 662, and of the Kinnaird Fanny family, purchased in 1876 from Mr. Wilken, Waterside of Forbes, and Sir Maurice 1319, of the Fyvie Flower family, purchased at Colonel Gordon's sale in 1876, when a calf for 42 guineas.

At least three distinguished bulls have been bred in the herd, viz.: Clansman 398, of the Miss Morrison family, third prize winner at the Highland Society's show at Inverness in 1865, second at the same Society's show in 1868, and first at Edinburgh in 1869; Sir Roger 702, of the Georgina family, who was second prize one-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Glasgow in 1875, and died when rising two years old; and Sir Wilfrid 1166, of the Georgina family, first prize one-year-old at the Highland Society's show at Aberdeen in 1876, and second prize two-year-old at Edinburgh, 1877.

As formerly remarked, comparatively few females have been introduced to the herd. Among these, however, may be named Fashion 982, and Nosegay 2nd, 2156, from Sir George Macpherson Grant, and Crocus 2nd, 3765, from Mr. Hannay. Mr. Tayler has succeeded in rearing three families of much merit, the Georginas, Miss Morrisons and Victorias. From what we have already said, it will be seen that the members of these families have proved themselves worthy of the attention bestowed on them."

Raglan also competed at the Concours at Paris in 1856, when two years old, against the old bulls and was awarded the third prize for first honorable mention, one of Mr. Walker's bulls having got the second therefore keeping Raglan from the money of the third prize). Mr. Walker was offered £230 for this animal by the Emperor Napoleon, but refused it. Wallace's dam is Young Jean (495). This tribe produced Witch of Endor (3528), one of the famous Paris group of 1878.

"This family is valuable not only on account of the individual merit of its members, but also because by it is preserved one of the oldest and finest Kinnaird tribes. It is perhaps the case that it represents the earliest polled strain of which records exist. The first animal of the family registered in the "Herd Book" was Old Lady Lady Ann, 743, and there is evidence that she was calved about 1820, four years prior to the birth of Old Grannie, 1. The family is represented by two branches, thus:

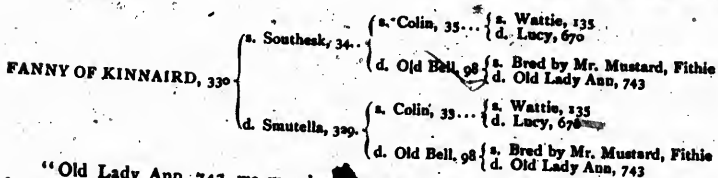

In 1870 he won the first prize at the Banffshire Society's show at Cornhill, and the third prize at the Highland Society's show at Dumfries, and in 1871 was commended at the show at Perth.

CHAMPION (459), bred by Wm. McCombie, Tillyfour; got by Derby (377), dam Zara (1228), etc., etc.
