But if the minister of one church can marry and baptize in virtue of his standing in his own body, and all others must apply to courts, prothonotaries and clerks of the peace, for a right, is there not an inferiority in this? If the rectors, as by statute imperial and colonial, are endowed with all the power, privileges, and emoluments of rectors in England, and if their bishop claims jurisdiction, is not this an establishment? There is an established church, and until the power granted by the 31 George III, to establish and endow Rectories is repealed, and a declaratory cudow Rectories is repealed, and a declaratory act passed recognizing the entire parity of all de-nominations, we have an establishment.
