The Situation.

The Crown Prince yesterday flung 20,000 fresh troops into the Verdun fight between Dead Man Hill and the village of Cumieres, with the result that the Huns captured some of the French advance trenches. From Paris comes the statement that main lines at this point are still firmly held. That Austrian troops are now being sent in large numbers to help in this great offensive would seem to be es-

tablished. The Austrians have brought up their heavy artillery to the new front and are once more hammering the Italians. Eleven attacks are said to have been repulsed by the latter, but there seems to be reason to believe that more ground has been taken. Vienna claims that Archduke Charles forces are approching the heights which dominate Arsiero.

The invasion of German East Africa is reported to be making excel-

lent progress. According to a Washington despatch word has reached there that with food at prohibitive prices and factories closed the German people ere fast nearing very critical conditions. Hitherto they have been successfully buoyed up with the hope that everything was going splendidly with German arms and that the Al lies were on the point of collapse. In this regard it is interesting to read in a London paper an interview with Miss Kitty Marks, an Englishwoman who has recently reached the British capital after a three years residence in Berlin. She states that she was amazed on reaching London to find business proceeding as usual for she had believed, like the rest of the Berlin residents, that London and many of the English manufacturing cities were more or less heaps of ruins. This was what had been given out. Just before Miss Marks left the fact of the enormous losses at Vertlun had leaked out and she relates, talking with the poorer classes in the evening on the broad thoroughfare of Unter der Linden-Berlins main street-she heard in effect such comments as: "We are being denied the food we want. Our husbands and sons are being sacrificed, our homes pre being broken up, and we cannot stand this much longer."

Miss Marks further states that the cock-suredness manifest during the first year of the struggle has disappeared and the feeling is: "Either the Allies are going to win, or the war will end in a draw.'
