MARCONI EXPERTS

Will Establish System on the Tanana

The Distance Between Terminals Points, Weare and Chenoa, 180 Miles.

Messrs. Richard Phind and H. J. Welby, of New York, are guests at the Regina on the way to Fort Gibbon on the lower Yukon at the mouth of the Tanana to which place they are being sent by the United States government to establish a Marconi telegraph system up the Tanana river to Chenoa, a distance of 180 miles.

Mr. Phind was somewhat amused yesterday evening on reading in an evening paper that he had 12 men and 70 tons of supplies with him. There are but two men in the party and their outfit consists of but 5 tons.

Both Phind and Welby are conversant with the system of operation, the former having been for some time associated with Marconi himself. They have no fears but that the system will work to perfection over the route on which it will be established.
