LUMBER DEALERS WELCOME INVESTIGATION

For some time the lumber industry has been under suspicion owing partly to the series of advances in price that have been found necessary and which have been forced by the conditions over which the dealers say they have but little

A COMPARISON Our informant went into a comparison of cost with regard to the lumber business and he stated that five years ago logs could be had a float for from \$2.50 to \$4.00; today the mills have to pay as high as \$15.00. Five years ago men could be hired at the coast for from \$30 to \$40 per month but to-day lumbermen are glad to get river men for \$6.00 per day. The cost of manufacture at that time was only \$1.75 per 1000 but to day the price has increased

These figures were quoted the West to show that the raise in price of lumber has only been consistent with the increased cost of production and labor has profitted by this. It was stated that this firm made more money five years ago than they made last year notwithstanding




