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TOYS FOR SANTA CLAUS.

He Will Have Some New Ones This Year.

His factories in All Parts of the World have been busy since the old fellow was last around filling stockings.

If a child could see the vast quantities of toys in the stores and the manufacturers and wholesale dealers, says the New York Sun, it would wonder at the number of toys of objects in an astonishing compilation.

Whole trains of cars loaded with dolls, fine glass ornaments, the dolls, the toys, mounted on life size animals, producing unearthly noises with various instruments, or acting in the most wonderful manner, tin war ships and powder soldiers in battle with wooden forts, pony carts being chased by the life-like shapes of paper reptiles, grinning imps leading cathedrals for the pleasure of knocking down angels, or trying to rob the dime and nickel savings banks, mechanical figures in a wild and grotesque manner, the puzzles and games and other combinations that occur ordinarily in dreams. Every year new toys are made, and the amusement of children, and the ingenuity spent in the construction of some of them is hardly appreciated.

Not only here, but in France, Germany, Switzerland, and even in Japan, the children are being thought of for many months before the holiday season. Many of the toys that are particularly appreciated are made in Germany, not because we have not the ingenuity to produce them, but because we can not make them so cheap.

Among the new toys are registering and grotesque banks, the one with a dial and the tail shaft of a light house that will hold 100 nickels, and can not be opened until it is full. The other is an ordinary bank for a penny with a time lock register.

The clock for this clock is ordinary. A grotesque bank has the figure of a frog mounted on a bicycle. When a coin is placed in the mouth of the frog, it starts and throws the coin into a receptacle that is guarded by another frog. Two Women and Two Children Orally Murdered.

BLUDGEONED, SHOT AND STABBED.

A Jacksonville, Fla., dispatch says: Two women and two children were orally murdered on Saturday night of a horrible murder, committed, it is supposed, by a tramp of four people who came to New Coast, about four miles from New Smyrna, to spend the winter.

The names of the victims are Miss Bruce, Frank Packwood, Mrs. L. D. Hatch, and her son. The bodies of the victims were found in the house which they occupied, with the throats of all four cut from ear to ear. The victims apparently died from loss of blood.

A posse of citizens has left for the scene of the crime, but the exact location is not known. The police are searching for the murderer.

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THE HORROR TRAFFIC.

Slave Traders' Cruelties as Related by Retained Missionaries.

A New York dispatch says: A meeting of the African Society here today Canon Keiser read extracts from the diaries of Afrim missionaries which told of revolting cruelties in connection with slave-trading in a neighborhood of Lake Tanganyika.

One of the missionaries read as follows: "The notorious slave-trader, Makalaba, brought back with him 2,000 natives of every age and sex, and some remarkable people were chained in batches of a score. They were driven naked by the line of the caravan was traversing the Kirando country, where there was a famine, the marching slaves were obliged to dig up roots to eat. Hundreds of them died of hunger, fever and dysentery. A large number of women and children, whose want of strength impeded the rapid march of the column, were drowned. Lagged through illness were killed at the rate of from 10 to 50 daily. At night they were placed in rows of huts, while the goats which were being taken along were kept in covered stables. The bodies of those who had died during the night were dragged out and thrown to the hyenas which followed the camp. Many of the poor creatures were covered with burns and scalds, resulting from the punishment inflicted upon them.

Similar accounts were given of cruelties practiced by other slave-traders. The missionaries mentioned in the extracts are those that are ill in a hospital whenever possible.

# ATHENS ENTERTAINMENT.

The annual meeting for the nomination of councillors and school trustees for Athens was held in the town hall on Monday evening, and a large number of ratifiers were present.

The village clerk opened the proceedings at 7.30 and requested that nominations be made in writing. The hour following was a busy one and closed with these men in the field:

Reeve - W. G. Parish, A. E. Donovan, Dr. Harjo, J. W. Kerr, M. Halladay.

Councillors - Bruce Holmes, J. F. Lamb, John Dewberry, S. A. Taplin, John Wiltse, Theo. Berny, Wm. Harley, M. Halladay, S. Boddy, B. Lovrin, H. W. Kincaid, Johnson Greene, M. A. Everts, H. H. Arnold.

School Trustees - John Malvern, Arza Wiltse, A. W. Blanchard, J. H. McLaughlin, S. A. Taplin, Jas. F. Gordon, Johnson Green, Jas. Ross, Theo. Berny, Theo. G. Stevens, Ed. McLean, Ira M. Kelly.

A meeting was at once organized with Mr. Lovrin in the chair, and the list of nominees for reeve and councillor was read. When the resignations and speech-making was at an end it was found that Mr. W. G. Parish had been re-elected reeve for a third term and that those in the field for councillor were Messrs. John Dewberry, Wm. Harley, Bruce Holmes, J. F. Lamb, Johnson Green.

The candidates for trustees were then given the floor, when all resigned but Mr. Wiltse, who was re-elected.

The meeting was one of the liveliest ever held in Athens. The speaking was done very strongly in favor of personal, and however unpleasant it may have been for those immediately concerned, we think it will result in good to the village. Certain rumors of illegal expenditure on the part of the council and school board have been in circulation for some time, and in speaking to his nomination Mr. S. A. Taplin enumerated these reports and broadly insinuated that they were true. His assertions had the effect of bringing forth explanations from all the parties concerned and many things were made plain that before were dark or not rightly understood.

While the admission and assertions of the speakers made it plain that the statute intended to secure the independence of municipal representatives from the village was being violated by both the council and school board, it was declared by different members of these bodies that what had been done was altogether in the interest of efficiency and economy. A resolution was shown to be for materials bought at the direction of the board in his capacity as secretary. Other matters were explained in a manner equally satisfactory. The whole question of illegality will likely to be considered by the council of '92 when they receive the auditor's report.

Many of the leading men of the village spoke very strongly in favor of supporting the Billis & Sherman by-law to be voted on at the same time as for municipal representatives.

Reeve Parish explained that the additional taxation, as the council would this year have sufficient money to do so independent of that required for ordinary expenditure.
