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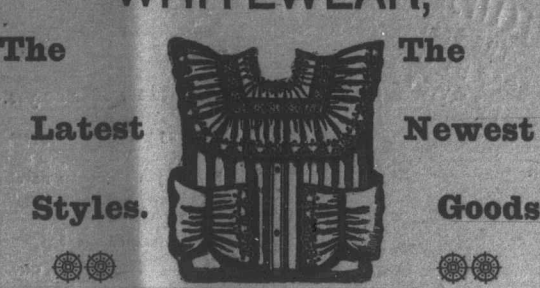

Press Clippings. The new Governor-General of Canada, the Duke of Leeds, will be installed in June. This is the first time in the history of Canada that a Duke has filled the position of Governor-General.

Indignation meetings held in Ontario have caused changes to be made in the temperance bill before the legislature. In spite of promises made by the Premier of the Province, Hon. A. S. Hardy, it was only a weak imitation of the Baines bill. The prohibitionists kept up such an agitation that the government redrafted the bill, striking out the parts acceptable to the liquor dealers and introducing new features in the direction of prohibition.

From Lunenburg come some interesting details of liquor warfare. Since the visit of the evangelists, Messrs Hunter and Crossley, a hotter war than ever has been waged against the liquor seller. No licenses are allowed in the county, and the town council persistently prosecuted the proprietors of the three hotels who continued to sell liquor. In re-venge the three hotels entered into a compact to receive no guests except permanent boarders and also closed the commercial travellers' sample rooms. Private families took charge of travellers and the temperance hall was opened as a sample room. This lasted about a fortnight and then the largest hotel capitulated, probably the others will follow, but the council has gained its point.

The new governor of New York does not serve liquor of any kind to the guests at the executive mansion in Albany. Of course, this is not pleasing to the liquor men. The Wine and Spirit Gazette says that "in view of his offensive teetotalism, he could not be re-elected by any majority, however small." It adds: "This is no prohibition state by any means. Its governor, therefore, has no right to make such conspicuous Puritanical notions. Governor Black is to be pitied for denying himself one of God's blessings and condemning for denying it to others." The governor will probably be able to stand it.

Union Signal. It is estimated that 77,000 in the United States die annually from the use of strong drink. If we divided the people into two classes, moderate drinkers and total abstainers, and have to continue to sacrifice the lives and souls of 77,000 persons annually to accommodate the liquor dealers, and they cannot get them from the total abstainers, the moderate drinkers must keep the army of drunkards filled from their ranks.—Southern Journal.

The noted attorney for the liquor dealers, Louis Schade, made the following admission recently: "Prohibition has cost us three-fourths of our trade in the two Dakotas."

Here is one man who makes whiskey, another who sells it, another who rents a house for the sale of it, another who dies drunk. Now if you can fix that up so that some of that crowd will go to heaven and some to hell, you are a profound philosopher than ever I have been.—Sam' Jones.

The National Christian Citizenship League is asking reformers everywhere to bear upon the committee at Washington in whose hands is a bill giving the states the power to control the sale of cigarettes within their borders, no matter where they were made or whether in original packages or not. It is pointed out that without such a law for the United States the constitutionality of the present anti-cigarette bill pending in the Illinois legislature, favored by a large majority of the members of both houses, is questionable.

The liquor traffic of Halifax city is endeavoring at \$20 per column to monopolize the press. In just such campaigns, as that upon which we are entering, in other countries it has expended thousands of dollars for the same purpose. Here, as everywhere, its constant endeavor is to poison public thought by false stories and misleading statistics. Here, as everywhere, it is striving to coerce, cajole, by lawful and unlawful means, to control legislation and its operation.—Forward.

Louis XII of France first gave permission to distill spirits on a large scale. So terrific were the effects twenty two years afterward that Francis, his successor, was obliged for the safety of his subjects, to enact a law that the drunkard who remained incorrigible after several months' punishment should suffer amputation of the ears and be banished from the kingdom.

How much more wisely would Francis have acted, if, instead of banishing the drunkard, he had banished the pernicious material of drunkards.

Yet in this 19th century, our government to-day acts as unwisely as did Francis. It punishes the drunkard, whereas it should imprison the drunkard's drink—that which makes the drunkard.
