Sanctum Suggestions.

The Lord's Day Alliance of Canada is making a special appeal for funds for the prosecution of its work. The Alliance has done excellent work in the past and it is to be hoped that it will not be hampered for want of funds.

Wolfville people who have been watching the estimates with the hope of seeing a grant for a public building for our growing town will apparently have to be satisfied with seeing an appropriation of \$300 mentioned for repairs to our new government wharf, and thus are our interests being looked after at Ottawa.

Tuesday evening of next week is the date for the quarterly meeting of the Wolfville Board of Trade. There should be a number of matters of sufficient importance to engage the attention of the Board at this time. Let every member be on hand with something to propose in the interest of our town and neighborhood.

The following bit of counsel offered by an exchange is worth passing on to the people of other towns. Wolfville among the number:

'Now that the snow is disappearing and spring is at hand, there is something which everyone can do to improve the appearance and healthfulness of the town. As soon as the season will permit, a general cleaning up should be instituted. The accumulation of filth during the winter should be removed as quickly as possible from the streets and backyards. The blocking of the sidewalks with packing cases and the littering of the thoroughfares with waste paper should be stopped. And as neatness and attractiveness pay in addition to enhancing the appearance of things generally, shopkeepers would find it to their interest to try what the application of a little fresh paint to their premises can do in that respect. The same remark applies, too, to our citizens generally, who should take pride in the look of the houses in which they live. They should do all they possibly can to increase their attractiveness and it there be a lawn or a small piece of ground in front of their residences, a well kept green sward or a bed or two of gay flowers will contribute powerfully towards that desirable end during the fine season. Their fences should be painted or white-washed. In fact, there is a whole lot of things which the citizens might do along these lines and yet not hurt themselves very much in time or pocket. The mere development of a desire to live in a neat, perfectly clean town would be a good thing.'

The latest addition to our list of exchanges is the Daily Globe, published by Pelton Bros. at Yarmouth. These enterprising young men were formerly the publishers of Pelton's Journal, which was a very bright and readable paper. Believing that their town needed and could support a daily they have undertaken to supply the need. Although small the Globe is newsy and interesting and should succeed. This is the age of the gambler. Men gamble at the race track. Politicians gamble on the fortunes of the nation. The Wall Street operators gamble millions every day. Everybody gambles. Ever there is a desire to get something for nothing.

This wild gambling of today has developed among us a monetary craze. Fifty years ago a man with a considered rich. To-day the buccannery of business must have one hundred MILLION. No man can earn this amount; he must acquire it by gambling.

This centralization of the nation's property in the hands of the few is pregnant with danger. Ryan, Rockefeller, Harriman, Rogers,—these gamblers hold in their criminal hands power to shake the continent. Also, you may be sure that these pirates of business will never use that power for good.

The vendors of liquor must be quietly smiling at the progress of temperance bills in the local house. The Temperance Alliance put a deal of faith in Mr. E. H. Armstrong, one of the Liberal members from Yarmouth. He was to introduce a bill framed by the Temperance Alliance. This bill, after being duly introduced, was killed on a technicality. The Liberals were very careful not to let it come to a vote where they would be obliged to show their true colors.

Mr. Tanner last year introduced a bill giving the province absolute prohibition. THE LIBERALS KILLED THIS BILL on a strict party vote. Mr. Tanner then appealed to the country on the platform of prohibition. The Conservative party pledged itself to absolute prohibition; the Liberals pledged themselves to nothing.

When that prohibitory plank was put in the Conservative platform every whiskey dealer in the party went over to the Liberal camp. And yet, in some counties, so gullible is the public, preachers worked side by side with these whiskey merchants for the success of the Liberal party.
