Our Soldiers Appreciate.

Mrs. Archibald is now receiving scores of letters from No. 2 Canadian Stationary Hospital, Boulogne, written by wounded soldiers who had eaten of the preserved fruits, etc., shipped in November.

Several of these letters were written by the officers on behalf of the soldiers to tell us how they are getting on. The following are some of the letters speak for themselves:

Another says: 'I just came down from the trenches four days ago, and I surely appreciate the preserves I had for supper tonight. My home is in Alberta and there is not very much fruit out there. There are a few lemons in the ward from Nova Scotia, and from the way they describe it I gather that it is a very nice place.

Still another from B. C.: 'I have been one of the lucky recipients of some of your preserves, and can't tell you how much I enjoyed them. My mother was born in Nova Scotia. We have had a great many presents from Canada and they are greatly appreciated by all the boys.'

On behalf of the patients in Manitoba Ward: 'It is my pleasure and privilege to thank you for the treat you have given us in the shape of those delicious preserves—just like another used to make. We certainly all appreciate them. We wish you all health and happiness, etc.'

This from a Toronto boy: 'I want you to know how pleased we all are to receive your preserves. I think the women of Canada are doing a great work for us men.'

Still another came written by a native of France in his own beautiful tongue, stating that he was glad they were not forgotten in this time of need by the women of Canada.

The N. B. Ward sent this word: 'We wish to thank you for the pickles which made our dinner today a most sumptuous repast, especially as real homemade delicacies are very rare to us boys at the front.'

From the matron of the hospital we quote: 'Dear Mrs. Archibald,—It gives me great pleasure to tell you of the safe arrival of your wonderful gift. When I tell you that we have between 80 and 90 per cent of our patients Canadian you will understand how much they appreciate the treat from home. Three of the men who were fortunate enough to be here at the time the boxes were opened are Nova Scotians who know Wolfville. Many are writing you notes of appreciation; the ones who needed the fruit juices are too sick to write you. But their appreciation is just as sincere.'
