To the Mayor and Councillors of the Town of Wolfville, N. S. Gentlemen:— We have very carefully examined all the books and vouchers of the Town Clerk, covering the operations of the Town Council and the Board of School Commissioners, also of the Electric Commission of the Town of Wolfville for the year ended 31st December, 1923. Herewith we present our certified Statements, respectively, of the Receipts and Disbursements and Assets and Liabilities, together with memoranda and Abstracts of the several accounts relating to the same. Acting upon a suggestion that we embody in this report a comment upon the present system of accounting in the Town Office, we are pleased to be afforded the oppdrumity of congratulating Mr. Ford upon the improvement already effected by him. In our report accompanying the Financial Statement and Balance Sheet to the Electric Commission, we stated that the system derised and used by Mr. Ford for that body had proved its efficiency by its labor-saving and simplicity of its work-ing during 1923, the certainty of its balances and the manner it facilitates exhaustive auditing, permitting no loop-hole for a leakage of any kind. And, as that system proved adequate for all the requirements of the Electric Commission, so we are confident that the system, now in process of development and adoption by Mr. Ford for date there of development and adoption by Mr. Ford for accounting in all the other departments of the Town of Wolfville will, when, completed, prove equally adequate and efficient. This new Rate Book tried for the first equally adequate and entants. In how how been been which was in time in 1923 is a great improvement, not only upon that which was in vogue before its adoption but upon any other that we have seen recom-mended elsewhere. With the very few minor changes which experience will dictate, this book may well be taken as a perfect model. Likewise, the new Cash-book introduced in July last when the old one was finish-ed, has answered its purpose admirably, and it only remains now for the Clerk to be enabled to complete the System for 1924 by the adoption of the other specially adapted books, including a new Ledger to replace the old one which is out-of-date, worn, torn and nothing but a conglom-meration of memoranda, from which it always has been a laborious task to abstract the correct data for the purposes of the annual audit and Statements. It is for the Clerk to show the Council his imperative needs to enable his carrying out his plans completely as from the beginning of the year 1924. Then the Town may proudly boast of its efficient book-keeping in every department of its service.
