We regret very much to chronicle the death of Mr. W. Wickham, of Summerside, which occurred at his home Saturday night. Mr. Wickham had been troubled with falling health for some time past, and was consequently obliged to resign his position as principal teacher at the High School this summer. Mr. Wickham was a young man of great promise and his early death cut short a career of usefulness. To his bereaved parents, who have thus within a year lost two of their sons, we tender our sincere sympathy.

On July 20th last George Jenkins, of Lot 49, then an attendant at the Hospital for the Insane, while attending a patient named Stephen McMillan, accidentally threw all the ground, fracturing and dislocating his ankle rendering him a cripple for life. A warrant for Jenkins' arrest was issued on Aug. 3rd. He is now confined in the hospital where it is learned that he had left the Province. However, on Friday forenoon, as policeman Bradley was going through the market he espied the fugitive from justice and promptly placed him under arrest Monday morning. His trial proceeded before the Hon. Stipendiary Magistrate, a fine of \$5 and costs, being imposed.

TRIAL OF THE BOODLERS. The boodle trials commenced at the Ottawa police court before Police Magistrate G. O. G. last Wednesday when the Gonnollys, Thomas McGreery and P. Larkin appeared to answer the charges of conspiring against the government for the purpose of obtaining certain contracts from the Public Works Department. Owen Murphy and Robert McGreery did not appear and warrants have been issued for their arrest. Horace Talbot, Ernest Diggins and A. C. Lawrence also appeared and pleaded guilty to the charges. They were sentenced to a week, being accepted. An adjournment of the Gonnollys, McGreery and Larkin cases was made until the 13th November the hall of each being fixed at \$1000. Robert Kennell, born at St. John's, Nfld., was arrested on suspicion of being a witness and a warrant has been issued for his arrest. Later, counsel for the Gonnollys was ordered to bail of the amount of \$30,000 each but to this magistrate would not submit.

Wednesday night last a gang of miners were descending a shaft at the Ansonia mine, near Little City, when a large quantity of water fell into the mine, and the men suddenly appeared, precipitating the men to the bottom of the mine. Of 19 men made the fearful plunge 17 were killed, and the other two fatally injured. The bodies of the men were crushed out of all semblance to human beings.
