





Know Whereof You Speak.

It seems to me that there is at least one quality which is daily becoming less a common among us, and that is accuracy. This is the day of big things, of large undertakings, and broad outlooks and general culture, but it is most emphatically not the day of accurate knowledge. If you will take the pains to notice, you will find that the average person knows a great many things loosely, but very little exactly. Indeed, it seems to be very difficult for the average person to be exact and definite about anything.

I was anxious to hear all about a certain kind of work which was being done by a woman in a neighboring city. I was told that a friend of mine knew this woman well and could tell me all about it. When I went to interview her on the subject, she corroborated it. Oh, yes, she knew all about it; she had lived next door to the woman for six months, she assured me glibly. It sounded hopeful but when we came down to definite facts, I was less delighted, for the following is a fair sample of the accuracy of her information: "How much could Mrs. A. usually make at this work?" "Well, I'm not exactly sure. It was either thirty dollars a week, or thirty a month. I've heard several times, but I can't seem to remember which."

A friend of mine was visiting in a city some miles from home. To get to the depot from her hostess' home she was obliged to travel on the trolley car. When it came for her to go

home, she planned on a certain train which would get her back to town in season for an important engagement, and then asked what time she could get a trolley car to take her to the train. Her friends assured her that the trolley car went past their street at ten minutes after the hour, would give her ample time. Unfortunately, ten turned out to be merely one of those round numbers with which this generation is so prone to content itself. The car actually went at seven minutes after the hour. She missed it, missed her train, and could not keep the important engagement.

The man who wears a watch that he is sure is exactly right is a rare avia, and a popular one, too, for all the inaccurate watch carriers are constantly availing themselves of his accuracy. And in at least nine homes out of ten, if you ask: "Is that clock exactly right?" you will be told: "No, I think it is a little fast—I don't know just how much," or "I'm not sure—I'm afraid it loses a little," or something of that sort.

To be sure, not knowing the exact time of day, or the time a trolley car goes, is not wicked, although it certainly causes infinite trouble, but things like these are indications of our national trend towards inexactness and inaccuracy.

There is an expression: "I want what I want when I want it," which is said to be characteristic of the American people. I wish it could also be said of us that we know what we know when we know it.

In the home, in the schools, in public life, in business life, in professional life, in our children, in ourselves, it certainly behooves us to fight this growing tendency to be satisfied with careless and inaccurate knowledge.

Household Notes.

Celery is said to be more digestible cooked than raw. Rhubarb is rich in oxalic acid, which does much to tone up the system. Onions contain much nutrition, but are most valued for their pungent oil which is rich in sulphur. Raisins may be easily stoned if boiling water is poured on them and they are left in it for a short time. Spinach, containing a large amount of iron, can scarcely be ignored as a valuable spring vegetable dish. When roasting turkey, goose or chicken, they will be more juicy and taste better if cooked with the breast down. Beets, carrots and parsnips all contain a large percentage of sugar. Carrots and parsnips, when young and tender, are very nutritious. Save your fine tissue papers for pecking clothes, crushed and inserted in sleeves and shaped waists or coats, as it prevents creases forming.

Tan boots and shoes can be renovated by well rubbing them with a rag dipped in olive oil and afterward polishing with a piece of old velvet. To render boots and shoes waterproof in damp weather, rub a little nutmeg round the edges of the soles. Beeswax is just as efficacious. Waxed paper is excellent for wrapping about foods to be put away in the refrigerator, or cheese and like edibles which are kept in a dry place. Asparagus, cabbage, cauliflower and celery are chiefly valued for their mineral salts and for the bulk, variety and relish they give to the diet. When going away for the summer, paste paper over the flush closets and basins in closing the house, as this prevents the escape of sewer gas into it. Bits of tissue paper shaken in baby's nursing bottle clean it instantly and better than almost anything. This leaves a shine that nothing else so simple will.

The heat radiator (or soapstone) from a fireless cooker proves a boon on ironing day, if used for a sad-iron stand. The irons hold their heat twice as long. Cabbage contains a great deal of sulphur, and for this reason frequently causes flatulence. Cauliflower, which is of the same family, is more easily digested. Honey is excellent in nearly all throat and lung affections. For a sharp tickling throat cough, a teaspoonful taken every few moments will quickly allay the irritation.

A piece of garden hose makes an ideal carpet beater. While stout to dislodge the dust, its flexibility prevents the wear and tear given by the ordinary sweep or rattan beater. After making sandwiches, place them in an earthenware vessel or crock and cover tightly. Set the vessel in a pan of cold water, and sandwiches will keep moist for hours. A common floor mop soaked in coal oil makes a good dust absorber. Soak the mop thoroughly after which hang it out in the air for three or four days. It will then be ready for use. Towels should be thoroughly dried before being put away. In their damp condition mold sometimes forms on

them, which not only spoils the towels but has even been known to cause skin troubles.

To polish side combs, dry some flour thoroughly in the oven and then let it get cold. Rub this well on the combs with a piece of wadding or rag. As the flour gets dirty, use fresh, and be sure that the wadding is clean.

Make a stove-polishing mitten out of old coarse woolen material and oilcloth. Use the oilcloth to make a mitten without a thumb, and sew the woolen to one side. This will keep the hands clean while polishing the stove.

If a cloth is wet in vinegar and wrung out as dry as possible and wrapped around cheese and the whole put in a large paper bag, then put in a cool place, it will retain the moisture of one freshly cut and will not mold.

A moistened newspaper resting on dryer layers makes an excellent dust-dump for either the contents of a carpet sweeper or a duster. Dust and scurrying lint do not escape when a stray draught strikes it, owing to the moistened paper holding it.





Official, But Not Political.

In announcing the visit of His Excellency the Governor of Newfoundland to the Governor General of Canada, the senior organ of the Government on Saturday last declared it to be an "official visit."

What significance the Government intended to give to the use of the phrase in this connection we know not. Nor can we supply of a certainty the contents of the idea of those responsible for the currency of the term.

According to a despatch to the Montreal Star from Ottawa on May 8th, which dealt with Sir Ralph Williams' visit to Ottawa, "the object of his visit is to pay his respects to the Duke of Connaught and is devoid of political significance."

By coupling the two statements together we find that the Governor of Newfoundland is paying an official visit to the Governor General of Canada which is devoid of political significance.

Another despatch from Ottawa, published on May 10th in the Sydney Record has the following: "Official information received in Ottawa to-day that Sir Ralph Williams, would this month pay an official visit to Canada, has started the rumor that negotiations for annexation between the two countries may be opened very shortly. The rumor has it that while the Gov-

ernor's visit is to pay his respects to the Duke of Connaught, yet it is hoped that it will lead to more friendly understanding between the two countries, to be followed by closer relations and possibly annexation." Putting the three announcements together we get the pronouncement: "That the Governor of Newfoundland's visit to Ottawa is official, and although it has no political significance, yet it is hoped that it will be followed by Confederation."

Election of Senators.

Special to Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. The House adopted a joint resolution providing an amendment of the constitution to permit the election of the United States Senators by a direct vote of the people. It now goes to the President.



Report That Sir R. Williams May Lead to Closer Trade and Otherwise.

Some interesting news from Ottawa in relation of the Governor of Newfoundland, Ralph Williams, C.M.G., to Canada.

Sir Ralph is due to arrive in Sydney on Tuesday next, and will proceed to Toronto.

A special Ottawa despatch regarding Sir Ralph's visit, says: "Official information from Ottawa to-day that Sir Ralph Williams would this month pay a visit to Canada, has started the rumor that negotiations for annexation between the two countries have been opened very shortly. The fact that while the Governor is to pay his respects to the Duke of Connaught, yet it is hoped that it will lead to more friendly relations between the two countries, and possibly annexation."

The Governor will arrive in Sydney on May 14 and will visit Toronto, where he will stay until May 18.

He will then go to Ottawa, where he will spend some time.

Report That Sir E. Williams' Visit May Lead to Closer Relations for Trade and Otherwise.

Some interesting news is cabled from Ottawa in relation to the visit of the Governor of Newfoundland, Sir Ralph Williams, C.M.G., K.C., M.G., to Canada.

Sir Ralph is due to arrive at North Sydney on Tuesday next, and he will proceed to Toronto.

A special Ottawa despatch, in referring to Sir Ralph's visit, says:

"Official information received in Ottawa to-day that Sir Ralph Williams would this month pay an official visit to Canada, has started the rumor that negotiations for annexation between the two countries may be opened very shortly. The rumor has it that while the Governor's visit is on ahaunt, yet it is hoped that it will lead to more friendly understanding between the two countries, to be followed by closer trade relations and possibly annexation."

The Governor will arrive at North Sydney on May 14 and will proceed to Toronto, where he will remain until May 18.

He will then go to Ottawa, where he will spend some time visiting His

Royal Highness and the Government. He is not the bearer of any proposals from the Newfoundland Government, but his visit at the present time is regarded as highly significant.

The last occasion which such negotiations took place between Newfoundland and Canada was in 1895, when Sir Mackenzie Bowell was Premier.—Sydney Record, May 10th, 1912.

25,000,000 Oranges Shipped

Records for Citrus Fruit Movement Broken When One Road Takes Out 196 Cars of Fruit.

San Bernardino, May 7.—The season's citrus fruit shipment records were broken by the Santa Fe Railroad recently when 13,171,200 oranges were started to the eastern railroads.

A total of 196 cars of fruit were gathered in the switching yard, and shortly before dawn the great shipment was started over the mountain. It required twelve powerful locomotives to move the big train to the summit of Canjon pass.

There were four sections of the train. Had they been coupled together the string of precious freight would have been two miles long.

Santa Fe officials estimate that 380 cars of citrus fruit, or 24,792,200 oranges, were moved out of Southern California on the three roads.

A BUSY WEEK.—Labour will be plentiful during the present week and members of the Longshoremen's Union will be kept busy, as from now until Saturday not less than six steamers will arrive with big freights.

HERRING PLENTIFUL.—Passengers arriving both by train and steamer report that herring of large size are plentiful north, so that when the cod catches start at work they will have plenty of bait for their work.

A TRYING ORDEAL.—Mr. William Hibbs, of Portugal Cove, to whom we referred recently and who is in hospital will likely have his right arm amputated to-morrow. He is 76 years old and this will be a trying ordeal for a man so old.

Tat Municipal Order.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—By an order passed by the Municipal Council, at the suggestion of Mr. Fearn, the dry goods and grocery store keepers of Water St. are prohibited from using the only means of keeping their goods and other wares from being ruined by the dust, which every puff of wind sends into the stores from the sidewalks.

It is but idle to say wash them down before 8.30 a.m., as the stores don't open till 8.30, and if washed down then would require to be sprinkled again at 9.30, as the sidewalks dry up very quickly. The fact is that the only washing these sidewalks ever get is done by the keepers of stores.

Again, any microbes, or putrid dust from dried expectorations, left on those sidewalks can only be kept

from blowing into the lungs of those who use the sidewalks by a generous sprinkling of water.

This order of the Council is made at the suggestion of one who is not a store keeper, and who knows little of the great annoyance under which the business man of Water Street has to work. I should not be surprised to find that the next order of the Council forbids the wearing of head, or foot covering on Water Street.

Tired of Life.

New York May 6.—Charles McFarland, a dependent chauffeur slipped by the police guard on the roadway of Brooklyn Bridge early to-day, and when he reached the middle of the span, plunged over the rail into the water 135 feet below. A tug boat headed towards the spot where the bridge jumper had disappeared and a minute later the unconscious body came to the surface. McFarland was hauled aboard the tug and brought ashore. His shoulder was fractured and he suffered from internal injuries. He may recover. McFarland said he was tired of life.

Schr. Banshee's Belated Passage

Reports Passing Wreckage — Two Dead Bodies—Aeroplane and Icebergs.

The schr. Banshee, Capt. Willis, 66 days from Cadiz, entered port at 7 o'clock last evening bringing a cargo of salt to Rendell & Co. The voyage was beset with storms, but the staunch little vessel weathered them well. The passage was so long as to excite worry and fear by the friends of those on board.

On arrival the vessel was put on the quarantine ground until given a clean bill of health by the medical officer, after which Capt. Willis came ashore and being interviewed by a Telegram reporter related a somewhat sensational story.

She left Cadiz on March 8th and at the outset experienced summer like weather, this continued for a couple of weeks when the vessel encountered her first gale near the Western Islands and she was badly buffeted after that storm succeeded storm and it was only by careful management that the ship survived the fury of the elements. For several days on a stretch she was "hove to" weathering a gale and came through without damage. There was a series of north-east winds for the rest of the voyage with calms at intervals, as the captain put it—from one extreme to another, in both instances the schooner making but little headway. On April 19th she was three hundred miles off Cape Race when suddenly a north-east gale sprung up, the wind blew to a hurricane velocity with a mountainous sea running the vessel's decks were constantly inundated, huge combers frequently swept over her and she was threatened with disaster. The crew had very little sleep and were unable to work about the decks; even the captain was often as long as three days and nights without any sleep.

Passed Wreckage.
The Banshee on April 22nd in latitude 42 North and 49.30 West, sailed through a large amount of wreckage. Most of it as Capt. Willis described to our reporter was bedroom furniture and fittings. The first article sighted was a drawer with brass handles on it and such as would belong to a captain or officer's room; the next seen right against the side of the Banshee was a considerable quantity of white woodwork and framing, amongst which was a cabin door and its adjoining portions. Believing that this belonged to some wrecked vessel which might have been in the immediate vicinity the captain and crew of the Banshee kept a close watch out for anything that would bear the name of a vessel.

Two Bodies Sighted.
On the afternoon of that day the weather was more moderate and on the Reiner observation Captain Willis witnessed a gruesome sight that of seeing the dead bodies of two men floating alongside his vessel. Capt. Willis described the men to be dressed in grey overalls, and their faces did not show the slightest signs of decomposition. These facts disclosed are reasons for the belief that they were probably sailors donned in working garb and had not long been in the water. It is also just possible that they were Titanic victims.

Saw Aeroplanes.
On Tuesday last when about one hundred and twenty miles south of Cape Race Capt. Willis espied an aeroplane in the water which had apparently gone adrift while in a flight taking with it an unknown life. The aeroplane was painted black and was lying on its side in the water.

Heaviest Gale.
About a fortnight ago the Banshee ran into the heaviest gale for the whole voyage and in twenty-four hours she was driven astern nearly forty miles, and when she recovered herself was becalmed and could not make progress.

The fund will probably amount to \$100,000.

Did Sun Get a Million?

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKING, To-day.
All the members of the Chinese republic cabinet at present in Peking, appeared yesterday before the Provisional Council and promised the introduction of reforms in the administration and extensive modern developments. These include, trials by jury, reorganization of the army and navy, general system of education, sound methods of taxation, including introduction of income tax and the establishment of a national bank. The visit of the cabinet ministers to the Provincial Council was apparently an effort on the part of Premier Tang Shao Yi to prevent his impending overthrow. The Premier was closely questioned, during the secret session of the Council by certain councillors who declared that Tang paid over to Dr. Sun Yat Sen personally the sum of \$1,000,000, whether this charge is true or untrue, the allegation itself shows there exists a lack of confidence in Tang. The Councilors charge the Government and Premier Tang Yi with contracting for the spending of the Belgium loan without consulting the Council.

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Is Ulster to Be Excluded.

London May 9.—William O'Brien, leader of the Independent Nationalists, in a letter to the Times this morning, asks whether the country has not materials for a friendly consultation and a rational compromise on the Home Rule question. Pointing out what he regards as indications in this direction, Mr. O'Brien says that while nobody on the ministerial side now laughs at Ulster's discontent, no Ulster leader has yet pledged himself to resist any settlement arrived at with the understanding that it has the approval of England.

In thick fog, which came down suddenly over the English Channel, a collision occurred off Folkstone yesterday between the battleship London and the British steamer Don Benito. The battleship was apparently undamaged and proceeded to Sheerness for examination, but assistance for the steamer had to be signalled for from Dover. Tugs proceeded to tow her into the harbor, but one of the holds filled with water and she ran aground.

NEW YORK, May 13.

A giant iceberg, 1,000 feet long, 150 feet high and 15 miles off, was sighted by the passengers and crew of the steamer George Washington, which arrived at New York to-day. The berg, one of the largest ever recorded, was many miles south of the beaten track of floating ice. She was sighted on Friday morning in lat. 39.03 north and long. 47.16 west, which is further south than New York, and at a point estimated as 150 miles south of the spot where the Titanic went down.

LOUISBURG, N.S., May 13.

The steamer Mont Magney arrived to-day, bringing three bodies of the Titanic's victims—Harold Reynolds, Toronto; C. Smith, of the cooking staff, and an unknown girl, 15 years of age. These were landed here and shipped to Halifax for burial. The Mont Magney sails to-night after bunkering to continue the search.

General Orozco, the rebel chief, today mustered his army for a final stand against the Federal forces.

The catcher is a lowly and galle-like receptacle for the elusive spit ball, the dizzy float and the paralyzing up-shoot, and carries more defensive apparatus than an armoured cruiser. Nearly all of our great catchers are meek and humble in some quiet hamlet, where the curfew jolts the juvenile population off the village green at 9.00 p.m., and the principle pastime is guessing on the age of the nearest pullet. It is the duty of the catcher to tame brush league pitchers who are long on saliva and short on about everything else and inform the umpire that his decisions on balls and strikes would make Jesse James revolve rapidly in his sarcophagus. The catcher is the autocart of the ball field. He has a system of signals which nobody can fathom except the opposing team, and he changes them so often that the infield runs around in circles. The catcher never knows on entering a game whether he will come out in one piece or have to be returned to the hotel in a gunny sack. His principal competitor is the foul tip, which catches him under the chin about twice a week and bends his thorax into a neat horseshoe. Every once in a while some batter who has just escaped from the hay field will swing at the ball with so much earnestness as to miss it entirely and stroke the catcher across the base of the brain, arousing considerable resentment, and a translucent bump. The catcher also has to contend with delicious—snub artists who imagine they are pitching quiffs on the old farm and try to see how far they can bury the ball in his breast protector. When a pitcher is told to waste a ball and wastes it in the pit of the catcher's stomach, a certain amount of coldness is bound to rise between them. The catcher is supposed to supply brains for his own use, as well as the pitcher's, and it is wonderful how well he succeeds with the material on hand.

Of course there are some cases where a poor article is sold on advertising alone. But such articles do not last, and the men who try this plan should be put in the insane asylum. Because there is no greater fool than the man who pays his own good money to advertise his own duplicity. His course is always quickly run, because the more he gives publicity to his lies, the sooner you catch him.

Now try, with this immense buying power you have, to concentrate your expenditures. It is not necessary for a country to be profligate because it is rich.

If advertising is the cheapest selling method for the merchant then it is certainly the cheapest buying method for you.

Learn to read your advertising daily; to use it daily, and before you realize it, you will find that your money troubles have entirely disappeared.

The Griguet Fishermen's Union.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Please allow space for a few remarks from Griguet Local Council of the F. P. U.

It is not often items appear in the daily papers from the North East Coast, but as the F. P. U. seems to awaken the present Government and its heeled to the possibilities of a deadlock, we cannot suppress our thoughts from displaying our feelings on the work that the F. P. U. has done and is still doing.

Although isolated as we are in Northern Newfoundland yet a branch of the F. P. U. has been formed, but owing to the slipshod way our overlords handle, we are a couple of months behind.

There are no other people in Newfoundland who can show more proofs of neglect than the inhabitants of St. Barbe District.

What we want is something to safeguard the interests of the fisherman, and its our firm belief that the F. P. U. is the only means of escape from the thraldom of injustice.

We here mention one case out of many that has greatly hampered our fishermen from providing for their families, i.e., in 1909 a petition was sent into the Government signed by fishermen from Cape Union in the Straits of Belle Isle to Cape George, on the East Coast, prohibiting the use of trawls either by shoremen or banking schooners. It was unanimously passed in the House and added as an amendment to the fishery rules, but as a matter of fact took little or no effect.

In fact, Mr. Editor, it only served to make matters worse for our people. Although Magistrate Pearce did all he could do to prevent it yet the bankers did it in defiance of the law, and I know one case of a banker trawling here on a Sunday and came in Griguet Bay and split the fish. It was a matter for our Fishery Warden and J. P. to look after but they


