ENEMY RAIDS REPULSED.

LONDON, March 7. A raid attempted by the enemy last night east of Ephey under cover of heavy artillery barrage, was completely repulsed. The war office reports other hostile raiding parties which endeavored to reach our lines southeast of Bois Grenier and east of Poelcapelle, were unsuccessful. The enemy's artillery has been active in the Scarpe Valley, west of Lens, and east of Ypres, and shortly before dawn developed considerable activity in the Neuve Chapelle sector.

WASHINGTON, March 7. German submarines didn't sink a single Italian ship during the week ending March 2.

THE SAME STORY.

LONDON, March 7. How the members of the crew of a German submarine brutally killed the wounded master of a Belgian fishing smack, who refused to leave the vessel, is disclosed in a press association despatch from Penzance. The submarine attacked the smack with gunfire, and the skipper was wounded severely. He urged his men, including his son, to save themselves. The sub. commander forced the fishermen to row German sailors to the smack in order to place bombs aboard. One of the Germans drew a revolver and shot the helpless skipper through the head in the presence of his son.

The German advance eastward in Russia was stopped early Tuesday, according to a despatch from Petrograd, dated Wednesday, but was resumed during the night on several sectors, in order to allow the Germans to reach and consolidate the line between Panburg and Gdoff, east of Lake Peipus and south of Narva. It is reported in Petrograd that the banks have re-opened, the property of landlords restored and other conditions approaching the old regime resumed in these towns.

ON THE FRENCH FRONT.

PARIS, March 7. German raids on the Verdun front last night were repulsed by the French, the war office announces. Rather heavy artillery fighting occurred in the region of Cerney and Rheims. Last night the Germans made raids against our trenches at Avocourt Woo dand southwest of Hill 344, Verdun front. Our fire everywhere

checked the assault, and prisoners, including an officer, remained in our hands. Our lines were bombarded intermittently to-day in the region of Avocourt and north of Douamount at times there was heavy artillery firing at various points in Lorraine and Alsoce . On Tuesday three German airplanes were brought down by our pilots and two by the fire of our anti-

aircraft guns. Macedonian Front-There was reciprocal artillery activity west of Lake Doiran in the Cerna Bend and north of Monastir.

LONDON, March 7. 





PEACE TREATY SIGNED.

An official announcement was made Berlin to-day of the signing of a peace treaty between Germany and Finland and also of trade and shipping agreements and a supplementary proctocol treaty was signed at noon to-day.

THE U.S. ARMY.

WASHINGTON, March. 7. Troops and supplies for General Pershing's forces now are moving in France on schedule time, it was learned to-day on high authority. While the figures may not be published, it was stated positively that transportation requirements of the army are being met by the Shipping Board and the immediate situation as to ships was described as satisfactory. A substantial American army is already in the trenches on the West front, and Secretary Baker has indicated that there may be at least a million troops in France during 1918.

THE STRENGTH OF THE ALLIES.

LONDON, March 7. Bonar Law said he recognized that what had happened in Russia made it doubtful and would cause a difference of opinion as to what prospects there were of recovering the whole of the money loaned to Russia. The matter could be better discussed in his opinion, when the budget was introduced, but in the meanwhile he would treat the sum as receivable. Regarding the military situation, he said the Germans have transferred thirty divisions from the Russian front. The Allies still have a slight superiority in guns and men on the west front, but there's a possibility that the appearance of Austrians there would change

AMSTERDAM, March 7. ROME, March 7. Cardinal Serafini, Prefect of Congregation of Propaganda, is dead. He was created Cardinal in March, 1916. He was born in Rome, August 3rd, 1852.

NARVA EVACUATED.

LONDON, March 7. A later despatch sent by Reuter's Germans have evacuated Narvo and established themselves 12 miles west of that town.

WAR FINANCE COMMITTEE.

WASHINGTON, March 7. The Administration Bill to create a finance corporation with a fund of \$4,500,000 to aid war industry, was passed by the Senate late to-day, and now goes to the House.

PRAISES WILSON.

NEW YORK, March 7. A high tribute to President Wilson was paid by Earl Reading, British Ambassador, in the address which he made here to-day in the presence of 1,200 members of the Merchants' Association, which gave a luncheon, at which he was the guest of honor. Earl Reading in his remarks dealt upon the bond of sympathy which have been established between the United States and Britain as a result of a desire on the part of both nations to attain a higher moral elevation for humanity. He told with evident emotion of the great sacrifices already made by Britain and France, adding, I pray that your sacrifices never will be as great as ours. Earl Reading said Britain had put her all into the struggle, treasure, labor and many lives, and that there could be only one result, the triumph of the Allied

THE CHARGE ADMITTED.

AMSTERDAM, March 7. Baron Von Bersche Haddenhausen, German Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, declared in the Reichstag that the text of the despatch of July 31st. 1914. from Chancellor Von Bethmann Hollweg to Baron Von Scheon, then German Ambassador to France, revealed by the French Foreign Minister, M. Pichon, was correctly report-ed. In this despatch Germany de-manded that France surrender the fortresses of Toul and Verdun as guarantee of her neutrality in war be tween Germany and Russia. The Under Secretary added: "The course of events was not influenced by it, as it was not communicated to the French Government. Herr Gothen, Progressive, observed "it was an intelligible thing for our diplomacy to do." The Independent Socialist De-mocratic leader, George Ledaborr, said he considered the telegram proof


