According to Mr. Coaker, Nova Scotia has stood still since it entered confederation. Of course this is not true; if the development of Nova Scotia since Confederation has not been up to expectations, still it has been very considerable. A member of the Newfoundland government ought to be expected to know more of Nova Scotia; if he does not, the generality of the peo. ple can hardly be in possession of sufficient information to form a good judgement of the advantage or otherwise of entering the Canadian con-

Canada, according to a correspondent of that paper, would doubtless take over the Newfoundland ratiway, convert it into a broad guage line and make it part of the Canadian coast to coast government system" relieving us of burden of paying heavy subsidies to the Reid Nfid. #### Hard Luck Steamer.

The Basaan will be Converted into a Five Mast Schooner.

steamer Basaan, well known in St. John's and Sydney for the series of mishaps into which she fell along the Cape Brcton and Newfoundland coast last year, is to be converted into a five masted schooner. The Basaan was built about two years ago for the Emergency Fleet Corporation at a Maine shipyard and played in hard luck for ever since her launching day. She cost \$700,000 to build-yet she was sold for \$5,000 to pay the crew's claims for wages against her. She is now owned by R. W. Paige of Skowhegan, Me.

#### Again the Prince Wins Out.

To those who have been watching the progress of the tour of India by the Prince of Wales, the news of his victory over prejudice must come as a very welcome announcement. When the tour began, there was every reason to anticipate its outcome with genuine anxiety. One of the most powerful agitators the Indian Empire has known for many years. Gandhi. had boasted openly that he could and would compel the natives to abstain in toto from any participation in the public ceremonies. At the outset it looked as if his boast would be vindicated, for the Hartal was observed pretty generally. The Prince, however, took the bull by the horns when he dismounted after the official parade and mingled afoot among the

natives. The East Indian, while singularly wise in many things, is a child when an appeal is made to his imagination. This idea of a Royal Prince moving among them as one of them, without ous young man out sightseeing, made a tremendous impression upon the Oriental mind.

And the news spread-as news can spread in the East without the aid of lectric wires. From that time on, the Hartal was less and less observed intil upon the arrival of the Prince at Calcutta, where Gandhi had hoped to demonstrate completely his powers, the Royal visitor was accorded a reception that swept from the minds of official India all worry about the future. The popularity of the young Prince has triumphed over prejudice, over calculated hatred and organized insult. The star of Gandhi has declined, so far as the Prince of Wales is cerned.—Family Herald and Week



I cannot see any application in the paragraph in Capt. Kean's letter in which it is stated that my reference to the fact that "until within recent years the major portion of our fish carrying tonnage was British built" and that reference to this fact "confounds my theory." I did so state and added that this tonnage was "more or less square rigged. That owing to the hulls being British built meant a greater measure of resistance therein to the wear and tear of winter navigation, and that their rig subjected them to the minimum of straining, and confined this to the direction to which the hulls offered the maximum of resistance and hence losses in the past were fortunately limited." This appears to me to be quite logical, but I have no hesitation to simplify it by saying that I fear those same English hills would have become worn out in shor time had they been fore-and-aft

There is a sub-conscious tendency in all of us to believe what we'd like to believe, and as Capt. Kean owns and operates fore-and-aft rigged vessels, and they are admittedly good ones of their type, we cannot be expected to realize as readily as those not directly interested in such, that vessels of this type may possess inherent defects along certain lines.

There are other statements in Capt. Kean's letter that I am letting pass as they are not pertinent to the issue. I cannot, however, think he-Capt. Kean-will deduce anything in the way of evidence from his study thereof that the modern tendency. that he refers to, to increase the rake of stern posts can in any way increase

the wear and tear on rudders. In modern vessels with a sharply raking stern post the sea impacts against a rudder in the position of an inclined plane, the resultant strain being much less than it would be in the case of an old time rudder, which when at "hard over," would stand out nearly a right angle to a vertical stern post, and consequently offer much greater resistance to the impact of the sea, with greater wear and tear as the result.

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
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
