SHANGHAI, Sept. 3.

A pitched battle between the forces and Chi Shieh Yuan, Governor of Kiangsu, opened at daylight this morning along the Shanghai Nanking railway near Hwangtu, about a dozen miles from Shanghai, according to reports from Defence Commissioner Ho. The battle commenced with a heavy attack by Kiangsu troops estimated at ten thousand. While the left wing of the Chekiang army was forced back, the centre and right slowly gained ground, according to Ho's Secretary. Reinforcements reached Chekiang left wing enabling it to push forward at five o'clock. On the whole the Chekiang force gained about two miles. There were many casualties. 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



Murder for Revenge. Murder for Jealousy.

Murder to Eliminate. Murder from Love of Killing.

Murder of Conviction. Murder for gain is the most usual e of murder, filled by a numberless wd. from peasants like the abomble Dumollards, who killed servant irls for their clothes, to clever vilins like Palmer, who poisoned dends and relatives right and left r their money.

But the most extraordinary thing out the average murderer for gain that, apart from the fact that the k would be considered by anyone normal sense of proportion too vast any gain, the actual gain is less an a man would consider worth his hile to embezzle.

In the case of the person who murfor the lust of killing, sheer love cruelty is at the root. The Browniggs, for instance, obtained apprences for the sole object of flogging em to death

The famous case of Neill Cream. was hanged on the 16th Novem-1892 was one of the most extralinary cases of a man murdering the love of it. Before he was arted he poisoned with struchnine fewer than four women and atpted the life of a fifth.
