**End of Steel Bridges**

A steelless world before the year 5000 is predicted by Gustav Lindten, that consulting engineer who declares in a recent issue of the Engineering News-Record that iron bridges will be curiosities within a span of time much shorter than that from King Tut to the present.

"Bridge construction and bridge architecture will be to posterity a sure index of the progress of our present-day civilization than house temples or cathedrals of past ages, appear to us," the engineer predicts. This will be so because the economist, when it becomes costly, will probably begin in bridge and structural construction before it begins in other kinds of construction.

"In a span of time much shorter than that from Tut-ankh-Amen to the present, steel bridges will probably have disappeared from the face of the earth through corrosion and neglect. Iron bridges, iron ships and railroads will then be curiosities.

"Iron is a more perishable material particularly in Northern climates than stone, of which were built the pyramids, other Greek temples, and the wonderful Roman arch aqueducts. These could be built again, but no iron bridges.

"It is probable that the zenith of large bridge construction will be reached within the next 50 or 100 years, because of the increased cost of iron and coal."

## Civil War Has Broken Out in China

U.S. Airmen Reach Pictou -- Germany Makes Initial Payment Under Dawes' Plan--Special Squadron Enroute to Nfld.

**CIVIL WAR BREAKS OUT.**  
 TOKIO, Sept. 3. Official despatches received by the Japanese Foreign Office say that civil war has actually begun in China. The Navy Department announced to-day that the cruiser Tatsumi had left the Sasebo naval base for Shanghai with 150 marines.

**HOSTILITIES ACTUALLY BEGUN.**  
 SHANGHAI, Sept. 3. General Ho Peng Lin, Shanghai, Lu Shen Yuan's administrative officer, announced this morning that fighting between the forces of Ju, Tuchoum of Chekiang Province and Chi Sheh Yuan, Tuchoum of Kiangsu Province, had actually begun. The fighting is occurring at Hwanstu, 15 miles west of this city, on the Shanghai-Nanking railway.

**REFUGEES FLOCK TO SHANGHAI.**  
 SHANGHAI, Sept. 3. Civil warfare, which has threatened for a week, is likely to break out on two fronts within 24 hours, it was said in well informed quarters here to-day. An official notice issued last night suspending indefinitely all passenger and freight traffic on the Shanghai-Nanking railroad, left the entire community in a fever of expectancy, although ignorant of what might be taking place thirty miles from the city. The Shanghai-Hongchow-Ningpo railroad was still open to-night, but was being devoted for the most part to military uses and the movements of refugees, including missionaries, into the city. It is estimated the native population of Shanghai has been increased 100,000. All native hotels are filled to capacity, while the more wealthy Chinese have been actively securing residential quarters in the French and the international sections. The Foreign war craft in this harbor totalled twenty to-night.

**DECREASED COAL OUTPUT.**  
 GLACE BAY, N.E., Sept. 2. There was a decrease in colliery output in Glace Bay and New Waterford Districts of 25,000 tons during August, as compared with July; the output last month being 234,115 tons as compared with 259,253 tons for the previous month. In August 1,923 the output was 365,035 tons. Collieries of the Emery seam only averaged two days a week owing to the shut down at the Steel Plant. The output for September is expected to show considerable increase. All mines are in operation to-day and the coal steamers Linean, Hochelaga and Twicken-

 MONTREAL, Sept. 3. There are no young Liberals being born in Great Britain to-day. **SQUADRON SAILS FROM QUEBEC.**  
 QUEBEC, Sept. 2. Witnessed by a large crowd of people on Dufferin Terrace, the departure of the British special service squadron took place at four o'clock this afternoon, bringing a memorable two weeks' stay of the fleet in this port to an end. Early in the afternoon H.M.S. Repulse and H.M.S. Adelaide moved to midstream from the wharves alongside which they had been berthed since their arrival here and took up second and third positions respectively behind the flagship of the fleet H.M.S. Hood. At four o'clock sharp the anchors of H.M.S. Hood were raised and the pride of the British navy was seen slowly to move forward in downstream direction, evoking loud cheers from the people on the high places and along the water-front who were visibly impressed by the gallant spectacle which the squadron presented.

**CANADA'S REVENUE DECREASE.**  
 OTTAWA, Sept. 2. The Canadian customs and excise revenue during the five months to the end of August were \$28,000,000 less than in the corresponding period last year.

**FLIERS AT HAWKE'S BAY.**  
 HAWKE'S BAY, Nfld., Sept. 2. The round the world fliers arrived at Hawke's Bay at 4.05 standard time from Labrador. The machines broke through dense fog and rain and came safely to the water of the Bay and tied up to the emergency buoys which had been set out for them.

**SENTIMENT FAVORING NAVAL DEFENCE.**  
 QUEBEC, Sept. 2. There is a growing sentiment in Canada in favour of Canadian participation in a scheme of naval defense and practical expression will be given to this sentiment when Canada's overseas export trade assumes larger proportions. This in substance was the opinion expressed by Vice-Admiral Sir Frederick Field, during a final interview granted to the press this morning on board H.M.S. Hood, prior to the sailing this afternoon of the British special service squadron for St. John's, Nfld.

**SENATOR FOWLER DEAD.**  
 OTTAWA, Sept. 2. Lieut.-Col. the Hon. Senator George William Fowler, died at his local residence at 8.30 this evening.

**GERMANY'S INITIAL PAYMENT.**  
 BERLIN, Sept. 2. Germany to-day made an initial payment of 20,000,000 gold marks under the Dawes plan. Payment was received by Leon Freiser, Assistant to Owen D. Young Agent General for Reparation payments.

**LIBERALS WIN IN BYE-ELECTIONS.**  
 MONTREAL, Sept. 2. Two Liberal candidates were returned in the Federal bye-elections held to-day in Quebec Province in the constituencies of Rimouski and St. Antoine Division of Montreal. In the former Major General Sir Eugene Piset, late Deputy Minister of Defence, was elected over his Conservative opponent, Elzear Sasseville, Advocate, of Rimouski, by a majority which late returns place around 1500. In the latter Alderman W. J. Hushion was returned by a majority of approximately 1,000 over the Conservative standard bearer, W. M. Bricks, of Montreal.

**GEORGIANS REVOLT AGAINST SOVIET RULE.**  
 GENEVA, Sept. 3. 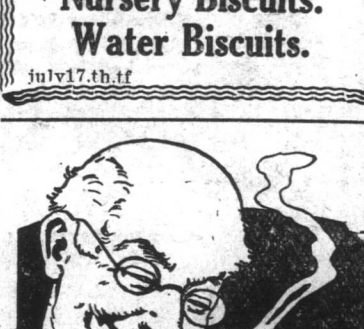

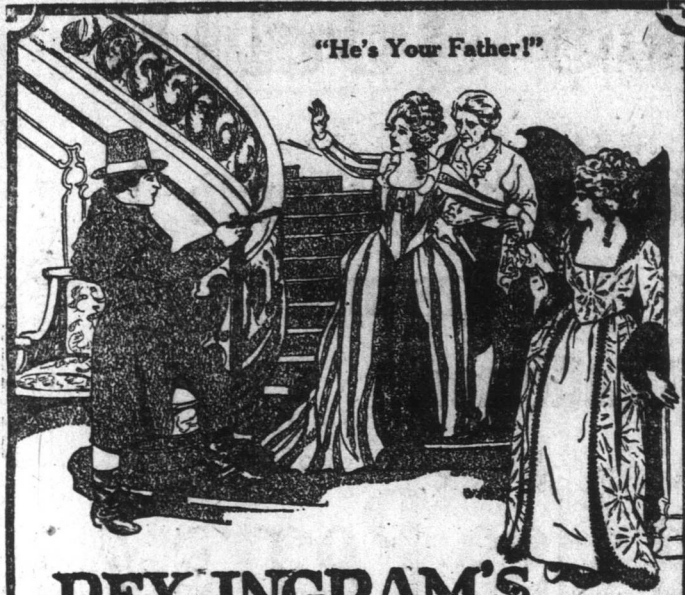

### Fortunes in Flowers

UNUSUAL BLOOMS, FOUND BY CHANGE IN GARDENS, HAVE BROUGHT WEALTH TO THEIR LUCKY DISCOVERERS.

A story is going the rounds that a man has discovered in his garden a new variety of white narcissus which blooms a month earlier than any other of its colour, and that he is asking a thousand pounds for his find.

Now, as a rule, new varieties of flowers or plants are arrived at only by a long and patient process of cross fertilization, and only one in a thousand of new varieties so obtained proves to be of any value from a commercial point of view.

Yet Nature at times produces "sports" quite on her own account, and the person whose eye is quick enough and whose knowledge is sufficient to spot such a "sport" may at times find something in his garden or on his farm which is worth a small fortune.

For instance, one particularly exquisite white daffodil was so discovered in an old Westford garden. The owner had no idea of its value until a keen-eyed visitor picked out the rarity.

### A Wheat Wonder.

In the summer of 1910 a postman walking through a wheat field at Graveley noticed one ear larger than the rest, thick towards the top, and holding a very large number of grains. He plucked it, took it home, sowed the seeds in his garden, and had a wonderful crop, which, in the

following season, was sown on his allotment. In the third year he had enough to sow three acres, each head bearing seventy to eighty grains instead of the usual fifty. The quality was excellent, and the wheat so strong that in sowing three pecks when as far as two bushels. The new find made a very nice sum of money for its sharp-eyed discoverer.

The dumb-bell fruit, which has a flavour between that of the peach and the pineapple, was the chance discovery of a young Britisher named Jeffreys. He was forced to break off his engagement and leave Britain, being stricken with that dread disease consumption. He settled in Ceylon and grew fruit.

The dumb-bell fruit resulted from a chance seedling. Jeffreys was quick to perceive its value, and it has since been extensively cultivated.

Even wild flowers "sport" and offer wonderful chances to the discoverers of the varieties. The now popular Barberton daisy came from the Transvaal some thirty years ago, and was grown in France as a market flower. Yedreé found it in 1897—an Englishman found upon the wild a "sport" with vermilion-coloured double flowers. He propagated this, and eventually sold the stock for several hundred pounds.

In spite of rumors of its waning popularity, beigo plays an important role for fall.

### Carthage in England

The ruined temple at Virginia Water, Surrey, is always something of a mystery to visitors to that beautiful spot, which was at one time a dreary swamp. Standing in a romantic glen, its columns look as though they had been undisturbed for two thousand years. The fact is that the temple has been in its present position about a century. Its original site was ancient Carthage.

On several of the stones are inscriptions. One, in Greek, on an altar stone, tells how Publius Aurolius dedicated it to Jupiter and to the other gods worshipped in the temple. Others were written in Latin. One of these reads: "Marcus Julius erected this to his most beloved wife Domitia Rogata, who lived twenty-three years."

At one time a fine group of Ancient Greek statues stood near these columns from Carthage. When William IV. opened these lovely grounds to the public, however, these statues were so shamefully mutilated by visitors, that they were completely ruined, and the public were again excluded until the reign of Queen Victoria.

### A Captured Crown

The crown of the Emperor Theodore of Abyssinia, which, after being kept in a glass case at the Victoria and Albert Museum, South Kensington, since 1869, is now to be returned to its former home in Africa, has had a very eventful history.

This crown was brought to Britain by Sir Robert, afterwards Lord Napier of Magdala, after the capture of Magdala and the death of Theodore in the Abyssinian War of 1869.

It is a ponderous piece of silver-gilt filigree work, many sizes too large for any ordinary head. It is lavishly decorated with little squares and diamonds of red and blue glass, varied with diminutive paintings. A feature is the strange looking pipe which projects several inches through the centre of the dome, apparently for ventilation.

The King's intention to present this crown to the Empress Judith was announced when he granted a farewell audience to Prince Tafari, the heir-apparent and Regent of Abyssinia, whose recent visit to Britain created much interest.

It is interesting to note that the only son of the Emperor Theodore was educated at Rugby. He died in 1873, at the age of 19, and was buried in St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

### Youngest Soldier in World War is Dead

MUNICH, Aug. 16.—The youngest soldier of the world war, Otto Gyfka, died at Rosenheim, near Munich, a few days after his twenty-fourth birthday.

As a youth of fourteen and a half years, Gyfka volunteered in the German army in August, 1914, saw the heaviest fighting on practically all German fronts and returned to Germany in November, 1918, un wounded but with his nerves badly shaken.

**PACIFIC OIL.**

Its Half-Year Results and Outlook.

(From Boston News Bureau, Aug. 28.)

N.Y.—Pacific Oil Co. for six months ended June 30 showed a net of \$5,905,807 after deductions for various reserve items of taxes, depletion, etc., equal to \$1.86 a share. In the first three months net for the 3,500,000 shares of capital stock was \$2,917,074, or 83 cents a share. Profits in the second quarter were equivalent to the same amount a share or \$1.86 a share earned in the first half year. Although Pacific's crude oil produc-

tion undoubtedly is less than during the same periods of 1923, profits in both the first and second quarter this year were larger than the same quarters of last year. In 1923 the first three months resulted in profits of 62 cents a share while the second quarter returned 67 cents a share, an aggregate of \$1.29 a share for the six months. Net in first half of 1923, \$4,835,807, was \$1,271,618 less than the same period of 1924.

Better earnings this year, despite some decline in production, result from higher prices being paid for crude oil on the Pacific Coast, but more particularly to the more stable markets. Fuel oil on Pacific Coast is in strong demand which is particularly beneficial for Pacific Oil as the bulk of its business, outside of crude oil production, is in this petroleum product.

**CUBA CANE SUGAR.**

Earnings of at Least \$10 a Share on Preferred Assured.

N.Y.—Though the result of operations of Cuba Cane Sugar will not be known until about Oct. 15, sufficient of the 1924 crop has been sold to insure earnings of at least \$10 a share on 500,000 preferred outstanding. Of crop of 3,683,291 bags about 500,000 remain unsold. Average price obtained thus far is well above 4 1/2 cents a pound.

It is not considered likely dividends will be resumed on preferred until 1924 results are definitely known. Accumulated payments now total total 2 1/4%.

**TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.**

**FLIGHT TO PICTOU WITHOUT INCIDENT.**

PICTOU N.S., Sept. 3.

Lieuts. Wade and Ogden forced out of the round world flight last month will take the air in a new machine with their comrades and will continue the flight until its completion. A new propeller replacing one found to be unsuitable will be placed on Lieut. Wade's machine to-morrow. The hop from Hawkes Bay was made without special incident beyond the breaking of a spreader bar on Lieut. Smith's machine, a minor accident that did not affect the flying qualities of the plane. The airman encountered no fog, a dreaded visitant of Newfoundland waters, and throughout the trip found exceptionally high visibility, enabling them to pick up destroyers and patrol vessels which stood out to convoy them at long distances. Head winds, however, cut down the speed until after Cape St. Lawrence was sighted when the wind hauled to N.W. and virtually blew itself out.

**NEW LIEUT. GOVERNOR OF P.E.I.**

OTTAWA, Sept. 3.

Frank Richard Hearts of Charlottetown has been appointed Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, in succession to his Honor Murdoch Mackinnon.

**BRITISH AND FRENCH FORCES LAND IN SHANGHAI.**

SHANGHAI, Sept. 3.

The first day's fighting less than twenty miles from here in Hwangta Nansiang district in the warfare between rival Chinese military Governors proved indecisive, advices here to-night indicated. Chekiang troops fighting for General Lu Yung Hsiang were reported to have retired. Preparations are being made at Shanghai railway 12 miles away. A major engagement is expected there to-morrow. An eye witness survey behind the Chekiang lines from Shanghai to Woensung showed that the territory was wholly undisturbed, but disclosed that about five thousand troops were taking up a position two miles west of Lung apparently in preparation for an attack to-morrow. Shanghai to-night continued quiet but apprehensive. Four hundred French sailors came ashore this afternoon to supplement one volunteer company already on duty in the possible emergency defense of French settlement boundaries. Several contingents of British marines also were moved from ship to shore into the international settlement, but it was explained that the transfer was made largely because accommodations aboard British warcraft were limited. A fourth Chinese Red Cross unit was in process of organization here to-day.

**FIERCE FIGHTING IN PROGRESS.**

SHANGHAI, Sept. 3.

A pitched battle between the forces of Lu Hsiangyan Tsuchon of Chekiang and Chi Shieh Yuan, Governor of Kiangsu, opened at daylight this morning along the Shanghai Nanking railway near Hwangta, about a dozen miles from Shanghai, according to reports from Defence Commissioner Ho. The battle commenced with a heavy attack by Kiangsu troops estimated at ten thousand. While the left wing of the Chekiang army was forced back, the centre and right slowly gained ground, accosted by the rotary reinforcements reached Chekiang, pushing forward to push forward at five o'clock. On the whole the Chekiang force gained about two miles. There were many casualties. All reports indicate that the engagement is becoming general in the whole area from the Shanghai Nanking railway to the coast. There was artillery action along the railway and at 8 o'clock this morning the Kiangsu brigade commanded by Gen. Yuzen, estimated at five thousand, attacked the Chekiang force.

**PRESS PLANE MEETS ACCIDENT.**

YARMOUTH, N.S., Sept. 3.

A Chicago newspaper airplane enroute home with photographs and films of the landing of the United States world fliers at Indian Harbor was abandoned early this afternoon about two miles off Yarmouth. Bad gas was stated to be the cause of the trouble. William Alexander, the pilot, repairs are made. H. V. Baker, the newspaper man in charge of the plane, left by boat to-night for Boston.

**FAVOURS GENEVA FOR DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE.**

GENEVA, Sept. 4.

The British Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald declared last night that he favoured holding the proposed disarmament conference here instead of Washington because it should be attended by the Frontiers of Europe and who would thus be able to devote time to the conference.

**ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE MUS-SOLINI.**

LONDON, Sept. 4.

A despatch to the Daily Express from Rome says an attempt was made Sunday night to assassinate Premier Mussolini while he was travelling by automobile from Acquapendente to Rome. Shots which were fired at the Premier, the correspondent declares, missed him, but an automobile which was following was struck by a number of bullets.

**CHIEF OF AIR SERVICE AWAITS FLIERS.**

BOSTON, Sept. 4.

Major General Mason M. Patrick, Chief of the Army Air Service, arrived at the East Boston Air port at 4.15 p.m. yesterday in his own plane heading a squadron of eight planes from Mitchell Field N.Y., coming here to await the world fliers. They reported an uneventful trip.

**LOCATELLI REACHES BOSTON.**

BOSTON, Sept. 4.

The destroyer Lawrence came back from the naval patrol for the world fliers to-day long enough to land here Lieut. Antonio Locatelli, the Italian flier who lost his plane off Cape Farewell and was rescued by the cruiser Richmond together with his party. There was no official reception. Locatelli said he was hoping to be able to fulfil his plans for a polar flight by plane from Italy next year.

**PREMIER MACDONALD ADDRESS LEAGUE OF NATIONS.**

GENEVA, Sept. 4.

In his address before the fifth assembly of the League of Nations to-day the British Prime Minister Mr. MacDonald declared that Germany cannot remain outside of the League. The best way of handling the problem of aggression, he said, was to set up a court or courts of arbitration. Before the address he conferred with the representatives of the British Dominions outlining to them main issues he would follow.

**HEAVY PITCHING IN VICINITY OF SHANGHAI.**

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4.

After 24 hours of fighting within 15 miles of the coveted city of Shanghai, the forces of General Lu Yung Hsiang, the ruler of the territory repulsed the armies of General Chi Shiepyong and gained about two miles, according to a statement issued from the headquarters of Ho Fung Lin, the defence Commissioner of Shanghai. Many casualties were reported. Shanghai is crowded with foreigners who fled into the city from the firing line to-day. They viewed the opening of hostilities with apprehension and fear that the battle lines might come closer to the city.

**Cricket**

**HARBOR GRACE TROUNCES TEAM OF LOCALS.**

At Harbour Grace yesterday a local team of cricketers played a game against a representative team from Conception Bay, and resulted in a victory for the latter by an innings and 27 runs. The locals went to bat first and were quickly retired for 31 runs. The only double score was R. Martin, who batted for 11 runs. Conception Bay in their turn at bat notched up 68 runs. S. Daves scoring 19. The locals in their second turn at bat accounted for only ten runs, thus giving the victory to the Conception Bay men by an innings and 27 runs. Mr. H. V. Hutchings received a slight injury during the first innings and was compelled to retire. The game was largely attended and much enjoyed.

**The Lass for Him**

**Another Motor Road Suggested**

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—Everything points to the fact that we are going to have that motor road from South East Placentia to Branch. Hon. Sir J. C. Crosbie, the Finance Minister, is about to float a new loan to the amount of six million dollars, and from which sum the amount of two millions shall be expended on the making of new roads. The making of the road from Placentia to Branch will serve two purposes; first it will induce tourists to the splendid hunting grounds of Branch and along Cape Shore; secondly, it will be a means of opening to the people a possibility of utilizing the land along the coast which is remarkable for its good agricultural possibilities, it will act on the rising generation as a stimulant regarding their future prosperity and will induce many to stay at home to solve the problem and show to the world that Newfoundland is a good country to live in. One familiar with the agricultural possibilities of the Cape Shore could be safe in making a forecast by the completion of this motor road from Placentia to Branch, Cape Shore with all its settlements along the way will be a busy and a prosperous people. Of course I have no indication as yet that this road will be completed, but I will tell you the fact that I was the one who drafted a petition and had it signed by many voters from Branch to Placentia asking the Government of that day to extend the motor road from South East Placentia to Branch. Therefore having Hon. M. S. Sullivan and W. J. Walsh in the Executive, we are not at all considering any doubt whatever but that the motor road from Placentia to Branch is a foregone conclusion.

### TRACK AND FIELD RULES AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION.

#### The Competition.

1. Any competitor wilfully jostling, or running across, or obstructing another competitor so as to impede his progress, or competing to lose or to coach another competitor, either in a trial or final contest, shall forfeit his right to be in the competition, and shall not be awarded any position or prize to which he otherwise would have been entitled.  
2. No competitor, after leaving the track, shall be allowed to rejoin a race either for the purpose of gaining a place or to pace or assist another competitor.  
3. When in any but the final heat of a race, a claim of foul or interference is made, the Referee shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and shall also have the power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.  
4. When, in a final heat, a claim of foul or interference is made, the referee shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who is at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and he shall have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.  
5. Any competitor who shall refuse to obey the directions of the Referee or other proper official, or who shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman, or offensive to the officials, spectators or competitors at any meeting held under the rules of the Amateur Athletic Union, may be disqualified by the Referee from future competition at the meeting, and if the Referee thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment he shall promptly make detailed statement of the offense to the Registration Committee in whose territory the offense was committed.

#### Competitors.

1. All competitors shall report to the Clerk of the Course, immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and shall be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they shall not be allowed to start.  
2. Each competitor shall inform himself at the time of starting, and shall be prompt at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the Clerk of the Course.  
Field Even's.

1. The officials may have the power to change the place of the competition in any field event if in their opinion the conditions warrant the same.  
2. All measurements must be made with a steel tape.  
3. In all scratch events the competitors shall take their jumps or vaults in the order of their names as printed in the programme.

#### Javelin Throwing.

1. The throwing shall take place from behind a scratch line properly marked, which shall be a board 2 3-4 inches in width and 12 feet in length, sunk flush with the ground.  
2. The javelin must be held by the grip, and no other method of holding is admissible.  
3. No throw shall be counted in which the point of the javelin does not strike the ground before any part of the shaft.  
4. The throw is measured from the point at which the point of the javelin first strikes the ground to the scratch line or the scratch line produced.  
5. Each competitor shall have three throws, and the best five shall have three more. Each competitor shall be credited with the best of all his throws.  
6. The thrower must not place his foot or feet upon the board.  
7. In javelin throwing the competitor must not cross the line until his throw has been marked.  
8. In throwing the javelin, if the javelin breaks while in the air, it shall not count as a throw.  
9. For championship competition only javelins provided by the games committees must be used.

#### Throwing The Hammer.

1. All throws to be valid must fall within a 90 degree sector marked on the ground.  
2. A fair throw shall be where no part of the body of the competitor touches the ground outside the circle.  
3. It shall also be a foul if the competitor steps on the circle or leaves the circle before his throw has been marked.  
4. Each competitor shall have three throws, and the best five shall have three more. Each competitor shall be credited with the best of all his throws.  
5. The measurement of the throws shall be from the nearest edge of the first mark made by the head of the hammer to the inside circumference of the circle on a line from such mark made by the hammer to the center of circle.  
6. Letting go of the hammer in an attempt, or touching the ground outside the circle with any portion of the body while the hammer is in hand, are foul throws, which shall not be measured but which shall count as throws.  
7. In hammer throwing, if the hammer breaks while in the air, it shall not be considered a throw.  
Walking.

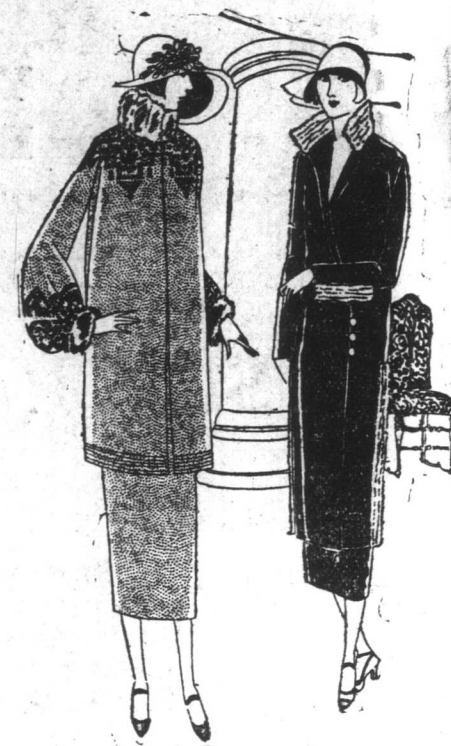
1. Walking in succession of steps and, in contradistinction to running (wherein both feet may be off the ground at the same time), in walking there must always be contact with the ground with some portion of one of the feet.  
2. In track races the following code of rules governing walking must be adhered to, or else disqualification will ensue:  
(a) Leg Action—As the foremost foot in taking a step touches the ground, the knee must not be bent. The heel must touch the ground first and the toe be the last portion of the foot to leave it. It is imperative that the heel of the foremost foot must touch the ground before the toe of the other foot ceases to have contact with it.  
(b) Carriage of Body—The body must be kept strictly upright.  
Note—Discretionary power is given to the judge or judges of walking to decide whether, in the event of the body being inclined forward, such attitude is the result of fatigue or arises from some cause beyond the control of the competitor; and if it be, and he or they are convinced that the rule has been broken for such reason only, and that the competitor is still walking fairly otherwise, disqualification need not necessarily follow from this cause alone.  
(c) Carriage of Arms—The arms may be held in any way the walker likes, but it is advised that they be carried well up.  
3. A disqualified competitor must at once leave the track.

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HOW WEMBLEY IS LIT UP BY NIGHT.

With the fall of dusk at Wembley, there begins to fashion itself the most marvellous transformation scene that the world has ever witnessed.

No sudden splutter of giant electric lights, or grounds mechanically switched into a glare of blinding brilliance; but ever so slowly, ever so gently, as daylight fades away, the whole Exhibition becomes touched with a hundred glowing tints that gradually shade themselves into one creation of colour whose beauty can never be forgotten.

It is as though some magic artist were to paint a master picture, with lights for his palette and Wembley as his canvas. Almost one can see the cunning lines taking shape on the monster screen.

Here one seems to walk through an oasis of gentlest green, with the cupolas of some great building towering above. Behind, a sky shows red, while ahead looms a silver light.

The water of the lake ripples through a score of changing colours, and there across the tiny wavelets made by the silent launches is the lighted fairland of the dancers' island with the music of the band stealing softly through the night.

Even the flowers have taken on a new aspect; an elfin king might have touched them with his wand. Lake, lawns, and paths alike, all are transformed by the magic that has made Wembley at night.

Never before has man attempted to draw such a picture, using lights for his paints. It was an artist's mind that conceived the whole huge scheme of blended light, and beauty rather than brilliance was his ambition. Months were spent on perfecting every detail of the great "picture," and thousands upon thousands of pounds went to its success.

The electric light used at Wembley is more than sufficient for the whole lighting of a city much bigger than Bradford, Newcastle, or Leicester. The point is that as far as possible the visitor does not see the sources of the Exhibition light, but only its results.

The faces of most of the great buildings are "flood lighted," which accounts for the series of different glows that one seems to see in the sky. To avoid ugly columns to hold the apparatus, these lights are generally worked from a neighbouring roof.

Where one place isn't suitable, another is chosen, and so it comes that some of the rays are thrown from as far away as a thousand feet. All this is to avoid having to set up a near-by structure that might be un-pleasant by daylight.

**Power Resources**

If the power resources of the world could be utilized for the world's benefit, civilized man might command his necessities as easily as the primitive savage supplies his wants. The first World Power Resources Conference, opened by the Prince of Wales at Wembley in a striking speech, was an effort to secure the international co-operation of technical and scientific experts in the pooling of their knowledge and their resources for the common benefit. The aim is to do for industry, as His Royal Highness said, what the League of Nations aims at doing for politics. What water power, electricity, oil, minerals, and their adaptation to agriculture, to industry in general, and to transportation may have in store, may be gauged by the discoveries of the last century, or two. A hundred years hence, in Lord Darby's view, people will say we of the present day were "more intahle at the game." The World Power Resources Conference holds forth the latest ideal. From a score of countries came delegates

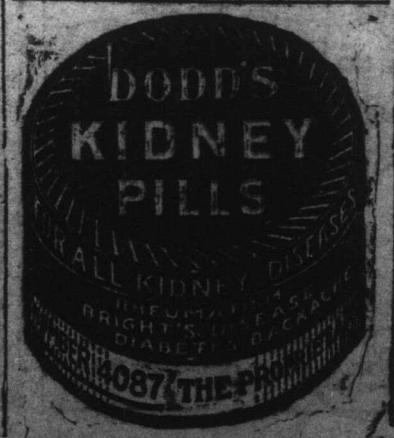

Meantime, there is the British Empire, which Sir Joseph Cook reminded the Conference has "the greatest untapped reservoirs of power and resources, generally, in the world." If the nations will co-operate, that must be all to the good, as Sir James Allen pointed out. On the other hand, there are many who know of what the Empire is capable—and those who do not may learn at Wembley—who feel that the utilization of power resources, like charity, might well begin at home. The British Empire has never attempted to keep its resources, industrial, tech-



ical, or natural, wholly to itself. The International Conference was really an invitation to the world to reciprocate.—United Empire.

**Corn That Ripens in the Ground**  
Corn with stalks so short that the ears appear to grow directly out of the ground and maturing in seventy days is now being grown at experiment stations under the direction of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. We learn from Science Service's Daily Science News Bulletin (Washington). In an effort to produce corn of short-growing season and high resistance to cold, this corn will be bred with varieties brought from the Andean highlands of South America by Fred D. Richey of the Bureau of Cereal Investigators, who has just returned to Washington. This South American corn matures in a climate twenty degrees colder than that of the "corn belt."

**Breach of Promise Scandals**  
PROFESSIONAL LOVERS WHO LIVE BY BLACKMAIL.

If there is a legal process which is not systematically abused, it is certainly not action for breach of promise (writes an investigator).

Threats to resort to it are made daily for the purpose of extortion. There are many women, as well as some men of the most despicable type, who make a profession of blackmailing by "breach"; and solicitors of the lowest grade specialize in taking up cases of this kind on speculation.

Shady solicitors, indeed, play an important part in squeezing hush money from men who have been foolish enough to promise marriage, or to seem to have promised marriage, to more or less designing women.

Some years ago a notorious specialist in this form of blackmail—a solicitor who assisted hundreds of girls to exploit the law of "breach"—went a little too far, and, in consequence, was sentenced to a term of penal servitude. But his successors avoid the pitfall into which he tumbled, and go on year after year with impunity.

**The Detective's Warning.**

As a rule, the public hears nothing of most cases of "breach," because they are settled, with or without legal assistance, before they reach the courts.

A certain woman used to work entirely unaided. She waited till the marriage of a man she knew was announced, and then sent him a number of letters, beginning by threatening to commit suicide, and then, if he remained obdurate, declaring that she would not only bring an action against him, but be present at his wedding and cause a disturbance. After this the dupe generally succumbed, and paid her hush money.

But this procedure is dangerous, as another woman who practised it ultimately learned. A man on whom she tried it consulted a friend—a detective—who called on the professional "wronged one."

"Your game must stop," he said. "If Mr. — likes he can, on the strength of your letters, take out a warrant against you for endeavouring to extort money by threats, and if you write to him again you will be in serious trouble." This step was effective. Nothing more was heard from the blackmail.

**Two Verdicts Against One Man.**

Some wily women put their cases into the hands of solicitors, who, of course, proceed in proper form. After a woman of this class had obtained £500 and costs without going into court, it was discovered that she had an amazing record. Some years previously one of her intended dupes had refused to be bled, with the result that the claim was brought before a judge and jury. As soon as the case was called the plaintiff was confronted by her husband.

Just as startling was a discovery made concerning another woman. Her experiences of breach of promise had been extensive and peculiar. She had sued one man twice, and had actually obtained two verdicts against him, though the second was for a farthing only.

Generally the methods of such women very little. One of them makes the acquaintance of a well-to-do, unsophisticated youth, who, in the end, is foolish enough to send her letters proposing marriage.

**The Burned Letter.**

A confederate, posing as a friend of the innocent youth, then warns him that the woman has a past, and consequently he tries to break away. As a result, the letters are held over his head and he is threatened with an action and publicity.

Everything then hinges on the letters, of which the woman is sometimes dispossessed. About two years ago a professional snar was robbed of her bag, in which her precious evidence reposed, near Bond Street in broad daylight. It was a case of diamond (represented by a solicitor

acting for the "mug") cut diamond. In another case a well-known author arranged to meet a "fitted" woman on behalf of one of his friends. When the woman called, the literary man listened to her story with simulated sympathy, and then asked her whether she had any evidence. She produced from her bag an incriminating letter, and handed it to him, stating that that was the only evidence she possessed.

"You ought to have taken a copy of it, in case you should lose it," he said. "Have you done so?"

"No," she replied, "but I will."

"I am afraid it is too late," said the intermediary, putting the letter into the fire and pressing it down with the poker.

**When Second Thoughts Were Best.**

For a moment the woman was too astounded to move. Then she rushed to the door, presently returning with a man who had been waiting for her. When, however, he had run his eye over the author—who was able and willing to throw him down the stairs—he departed with his accomplice, and nothing more was heard from them.

But usually the woman holds the master card, and the dupe pays up at once. In a recent instance of such duplicity the "mug" was the only son of a shipping magnate, and the claim was settled for £3,000 and costs.

Sometimes, however, the man, acting, perhaps, on the advice of his solicitor, does not pay till the woman or her representative has created a good deal of mischief. A case in point occurred a few years ago, the woman writing to the parents of a girl to whom her former swain was engaged to be married, and thus causing the engagement to be broken off. Then, lest worse befall, the claim was settled for £1,000.

**Forged Letters as Evidence.**

It happens occasionally that a "fishy" claim for "breach" is brought into court. One suit was fought on the ground that the plaintiff was a person of bad character, but the defence failed and the jury awarded £700 damages. The man entered an appeal. Before this could be heard, however, it was discovered that the woman had a husband living.

Another action was bolstered up by a forged letter which could not be proved to be such, and the plaintiff who had previously obtained money from "breach," was given £1,000 damages. Notice of appeal was given. Only a few days afterwards defendant's solicitor was placed in possession of conclusive evidence that the disputed letter was a forgery, and, as a result, the impudent claim was quashed.

Just as unscrupulous as the women are the men engaged in this disgraceful traffic. Adventurers of the worst class, these parasites lay siege to the affections of young and impressionable girls of good family, and do not show their hand till parents intervene, when they threaten to bring action and lay the whole of the circumstances before the public. By then they are in possession of some compromising letters, and mainly for this reason they are paid what is virtually hush money.

Small wonder, then, that some judges are not unqualified supporters of the right to sue for breach of promise of marriage.

**SIX REASONS WHY THEY TAKE HUMAN LIFE.**

What makes a man commit a murder?

There are at least six distinct reasons why he may take the life of a fellow being, and Miss Tennyson says in her book, "Murder and its Motives," classifies murder under the following headings:

- Murder for Gain.
- Murder for Revenge.
- Murder for Jealousy.
- Murder to Eliminate.
- Murder from Love of Killing.
- Murder of Conviction.

Murder for gain is the most usual type of murder, by a numberless crowd, from peasants like the abominable Dr. Dredge, who killed servant girls for their clothes, to clever villains like Palmer, who poisoned friends and relatives right and left for their money.

But the most extraordinary thing about the average murderer for gain is that, apart from the fact that the risk would be considered by anyone of normal sense of proportion too vast for any gain, the actual gain is less than a man would consider worth his while to embezzle.

In the case of the person who murders for the lust of killing, sheer love of cruelty is at the root. The Brownings, for instance, obtained apprentices for the sole object of flogging them to death.

The famous case of Neill Cream, who was hanged on the 15th November, 1892, was one of the most extraordinary cases of a man murdering for the love of it. Before he was arrested he poisoned with strychnine the fewer than four women and attempted the life of a fifth.

In addition to that he had been implicated in the deaths of two women in America, but as the evidence against him in these two cases had not been strong enough, he had escaped with a sentence for life, afterwards commuted to seventeen years.

Just as there are born murderers in the world, so are there human beings who lay themselves out to be murdered.

Palmer's victims feared and distrusted him, not vaguely, but very definitely. His mother-in-law declared she would be the end of her if she went to stay in his house; she went, and was the end of her. His wife had a deadly suspicion at her heart and let allowed him to minister to her though she felt worse after every cup she took from his hands. He sought out his wife's death by repeated doses of strychnine.

What can possibly be the explanation of this curious mental attitude in the victims of murderers?

To the impartial onlooker, it almost suggests the hypnotized attitude of a bird before a snake. Partly, no doubt, the explanation lies in that instinct which forbids one to believe that anything terrible can happen to oneself or to anyone in one's immediate circle.

Undoubtedly a murderer—when the murder is premeditated—is not balanced mentally, but that does not mean that the criminal is not responsible in the legal sense. The most interesting thing about Smith, the brides in the Bath murderer, was that he always warned Miss Pegler, woman for whom he had a genuine affection, never to take a big bath. "They were dangerous for women," he said.

Now, this points to one thing in Smith's case. He had a mania for drowning women in baths, and he did not trust himself if even Miss Pegler let the temptation in his way.

But at the same time he had the wit to turn his mania to account.

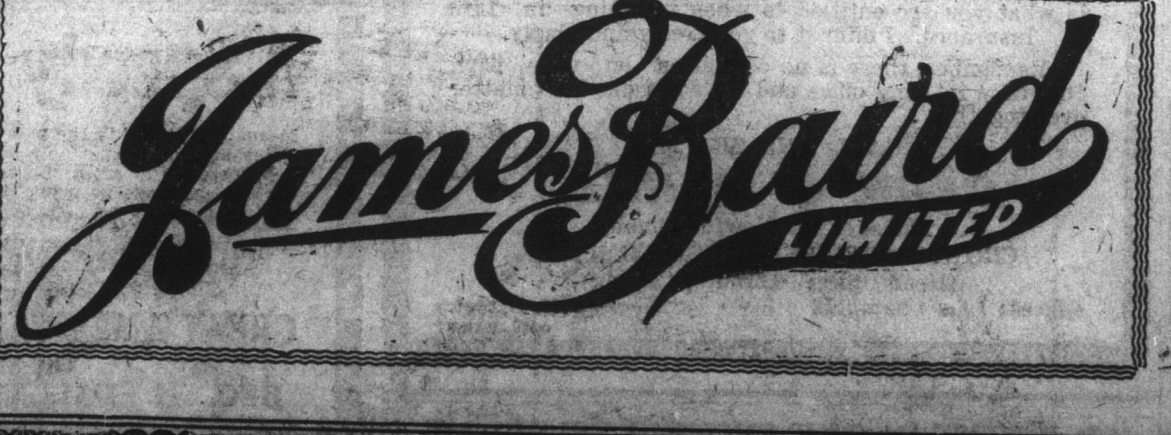
