#### Back to the Mole

ZEEBRUGGE OVER AGAIN-KING ALBERT UNVEILS MEMORIAL.

raiders of Zeebrugge landed on Mole amid the echoing salutes of cannon and marched in file amid cheers and waving handkerchiefs along the great sea wall upon which seven years ago they burst like a tempest and tied for good the hands of the German submarines.

Where the Mole joins the land rises a great granite pillar, crowned with the figure of St. George, which is to he the memorial of that exploit, and they had come for its unveiling by the King of the Belgians.

The tall King, who stood in driving rain, handed over the monument to the perpetual care of the City of Bruges as a token of gratitude to the British Navy.

As he spoke one's eyes lifted to the statue of St. George, on whose day

He holds one hand pressed out as if to say "Wait; be attentive!" and the other, which bears the sword piercing the dragon by his feet, he holds poised -seeming to indicate to the onlooker the figures of seamen and mariners and their officers who stood below. "There are the true memorials of the day," that gesture said, if ever ges-

ture spoke. And indeed it was so, for it is upon the men more than upon statue and ceremonial that one's thoughts linger

There were two unforgettable mo-

ments to-day. One was upon the decks of the Caledon, the cruiser which had left Dover in the early morning hours to bring the survivors to Zeebrugge. It was as she drew in sight of the Mole, when a quiet, broad, pale-featured man, his blue serge suit covered with medals, looked hard at the approaching masonry, and with scarcely an inflection of his voice said "There is

my gap!" It was Petty Officer Cleaver of Submarine C.3, who was of the party that set and fired the fuses of the dynamite-loaded submarine. From a dinghy shot-pierced and barely affoat, he saw the submarine from only 200 yards away separate in two "strangely, slowly, and deliberately," as the dynamite went off, and saw the viaduct to which the submarine had been backed break into twisted iron and the Germans and their machine guns upon it disappear.

Then his frail boa entered the smoke-cloud, and from that day to this the great hole he had blown in Zeebrugge Mole was only a supposition for him until to-day he stretched out his hand and pipe and said. "There is my gap." It has never been completely repaired, though trains

The other scene one will scarcely forget was the sight of the dwindling backs of the little group of 200 or so -for on that morn they looked few, and more of a forlorn hope than ever in their dull civilian garmentsmarching along the sea wall, fading from the sight of us who watched them, to the old and new and glorious and melancholy strains of "Tipperary."

The bandmaster who played it then had a fine thought.

There were other sights and scenes of the day scarcely less moving and touching.

Most of the Zeebrugge men had never set eyes upon each other for seven years until they met in the cruiser on the way to Zeebrugge. There were strange talk on the forecastle decks of the Caledon of that distant Twenty-third of April.

Most of the speakers told one that they had done their duty as it came to them during the violent 65 minutes the attack lasted. But once it was over and their ships were disappearing back in the smoke-screen those old scenes came back to them so terribly that they entered into a sort of stupor and hardly knew what would happen.

So they looked to-day, with a strange interest many of them, at the bare ribs of the Thetis and the remains of the other block ship in the

The incident which most of them recalled most vividly was that of the gangways splitting and breaking beneath them with the shell-fire, and the lift and crash of the uneven seas.

They showed each other old phototraphs, grim photographs of Marine ompanies or groups of sailors taken before the attack took place, taken in told blood, because they knew so many of them were doomed and it was lelt that they should have some memento for those who were destined to

PARIS, May 11 .- (A.P.) -The first lutter at the Foreign Office and the United States Embassy over the reported prospect of the United States Government sending a note to France about her debts to the United States, has been quieted by a report from Washington that the State Department officials had denied that such a note has been sent. However, the onviction exists here that Finance Minister Caillaux intends himself to raise the question later in the year and it is believed that he has already discussed the matter with Gerrard B. Winston, Assistant Secretary of the United States Treasury, during the latter's recent visit here.

M. Caillaux is described as having reached the determination to take up ion with the United States Government for two reasons: first, to tranquilize the French state of mind, and second, because of the necessity to advance French credits in New York and London by arriving at an arrangement of both the United States and British debts. The question of French debts to the United States is interlinked with that of her debts to Great Britain and the British debt negotiations for a general agreement

regarding continental conditions. It is believed that M. Caillaux will probably give general expression of his views on the debt question in the financial proposals which he will make to parliament when it reassembles at the end of the month ,and possibly that he may allude to the subject before the finance commission of

the Chamber of Deputies to-morrow. Those who have some acquaintance with M. Caillaux's views indicate that he must in any event, make the debts question wholly subordinate to the balancing of the budget and that once this is done, he must find a surplus out of which something may be paid

The Enabling Bill is being introduced in the House of Lords shortly and it will provide for an additional Under-Secretary of State, who will deal exclusively with Dominion affairs and take over the chairmanship of the

Overseas Settlement Committee When this is done Hon. W. G. Ormsby-Gore, the present Under-Secretary, will concern himself solely with the Colonies, dependencies, protectorates and mandated territories. Col. Amery has been working hard to get this hange for some months past and at ast seems to have convinced his colleagues in the Cabinet that Dominion affairs must be handled in a different manner from that which may have done half a century ago.



Most of the people do not read the news about the rebellion, because they do not believe it. They feel the press is being used as an arm in favor of the Government. During the whole time of the Rebellion successes in the south, there was no news whatever about the revolution, only long lists of names of people who were supposed to be in support of the President, and telegrams and expressions of loyalty from individual people oc cupying the official positions in the different States, but, who did not echo the voice of the people. 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#### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

PENSION MILL PASSES SECOND REALTING.

The House of Commons to-night assed the second reading of the Govrament's Possions Bill 401 to 125. The House first rejected the Labor amendment moved by J. Wheatley, the former Labor Minister of Health, delining to sive second reading to a hill which exacts contributions from the wage earners and imposes an additional bargen on industry. The bill, which embodies Winston Churchill's Budget insurance plan for granting pensions to widows, will now be referred to the Committee of the Whole House. The principal feature of tonight's debate was the unexpected attack on the measure by Sir Robert Stevenson Horne, former Chancellor of the Exchequer in the Coalition Government, whom, it had been supposed Premier Baldwin might eventually invite to enter the Cabinet. It is recalled that the Prime Minister did invite Sir Robert Horne to join his Government as Labor Minister, but that Sir Robert, expecting to be appointed Chancellor of the Exchequer, declined what he considered a minor office. It is believed that his attack on the Government has spoiled any future chance Sir Robert might have had of joining the Government. He has important business interests, however, and may not be anxious to take a ministerial office.

FRENCH AWAIT ABD-EL-KRIM'S NEXT MOVE.

PARIS, May 20. French forces in four groups are now in the positions in Morocco assigned to them by General Count De Chamburn, and aside from such local actions as are necessary to prevent the Riffians from slipping through between them, they will await the next move of Adb-el-Krim, leader of the rebel tribesmen. This is the latest report received from Northern Africa. A new column of French, commanded by General Elle Billett, which arrived yesterday, has taken up a position where it can watch the movements of the Riffians concentrated near Sheshuan, known as the "Holy City of Xauen."

J. H. THOMAS DELIVERS A MES-SAGE TO THE EMPIRE.

LONDON, May 19. The Overseas Settlement Department of the Colonial Office this evening issued a message written by J. H. Thomas, who was Secretary for the Colonies in the Ramsay MacDonald Cabinet, addressed to "my fellow citizens in the Dominions and Great Britain." Mr. Thomas opens by stating that he is aware there are many people who assume that the Labor leaders are against the development of the Empire. "It is because I am a Labor man that I believe with all my heart in that great brotherhood of Cabinets, Loops and other wooden free Democratic peoples, which is fixtures for Radio Sets made up to building up the British Empire."

UNION MINES CEASE WORK.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., May 19. All of the Pittsburgh Coal Company's Union mines are now closed, the Company announced to-night. Forest Hill Mine, near West Newton, employing 400 men which closed today, was the last to go down. Two years ago the Company had fifty mines working employing 17,000 men. They produced 1,500,000 tons of coal monthly. A solution of the present difficulties of increased cost had been found, the Company said, by some of its Union miners of Pomeroy, Ohio, who three weeks ago agreed to work on the November, 1924 wage scale.

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
