DIRECTORS' REPORT

The Directors at this the first annual meeting of the Company, beg leave to submit the following report of what has been dane during the past year, with the financial statement. After their appointment last year, they arranged with Mr. Joseph Hobson, as the Engineer of the Company, and with Mr. Charles Davidson, as Secretary-Treasurer and Commissioner:

The Engineer was instructed to proceed at once to make a survey of the road in as direct a line as possible, commencing at the corner of Mr. William Cleghorn's farm at the intersection with the side line passing the north boundary of town and the road allowance between divisions E and A, and follow the gravel ridge to what is known as Miller's Tavern on the Pilkington and Wool-wich line; also to run a line from the said Miller's Tavern on the Pilkington and Wool-wich line; also to run a line from the said Miller's Tavern through the corner of the Township of Pilkington to the north end of the road allowance between Divisions B and D in the Township of Guelph; thence up said Concession to what is usually known as Thomas Jackson's Corners; thence to the north along the side road to the starting point, which was done, and an estimate given, which your Directors having duly considered, were fully convinced that the line along the rigde to the road allowance between B and D; thence down the said Concession to the end of the Township, and direct to Miller's Tavern, was preferable. Mr Hobson then pushed on the survey in as direct a line as practicable to Elmira, taking advantage of the present travelled road as much as possible

After the Engineer had reported on the route, and the line had been determined on by the Board, Mr. Davidson, accompanied by Mr. Hobson, went over the ground—especially through the Township of Pilkington—where they made the owners of the property an offer for what was required for the road, two of whom accepted the amount and the others refused. When arbitrators were appointed, a meeting of the owners and arbitrators was held, and their awards handed to the Solicitor, H. W. Peterson, Esq., who having prepared the necessary papers, the Secretary waited on them, and we have to report that the whole have been settled with the exception of a widow, the amount of whose award, with the exception of \$4.25 for dower, &c., has to be held and paid to the children when they come of age, in accordance with the will.

Cleghorn, Shortreed, Sallows, Brobmann, and Moyers, which covers all the cleared land with the exception of a small piece belonging to Mrs. Thurtle, the balance of the land required being through the woods, and which belongs to the Canada Co., Messrs. Hassan, Anderson, and W. & J. Wilson. The total cost of the whole right of way through the ridge will be about \$\frac{1}{2}\$, 100. This route will be of great benefit to the Company, inasmuch as it lessens the distance about a mile, and when constructed will be more easily kept than any other part of the road. The road from Miller's Tavern through to its intersection with the Elora Road to Winterbourne, is in many parts already well gravelled, and is comparatively a level road, with the exception of a short bat very sharp hill which, is partly composed of gravel, which, when cut, will serve the purpose of graveling the road. On reaching the said Elora Road, a slight jog, for the present, will be taken along it until it joins the road leading to the village of Montrose, which for the present they would recommend should be taken, although it causes the greatest angle that will be in the road, but the present Bridge being built and a rising village at Montrose are two considerations which they conceive ought not to be overlooked. London, March 10, evening.—The Fenians on trial at Sligo have been brought here for trial. Baron Gifford has been appointed Vice Chancellor.

The Morning Post, in an editorial on the subject of Irish refom says the plan which will be pursued by the new Government under Mr. Disraeli in regard to Ireland is as follows:—First, the consideration of the Church question will be put off until the Commission on the Irsh Church Establishment, already appointed, shall have made their report; second, another Commission will be appointed to inquire into the relations of landlord and tenant in Ireland; third a charter will be granted for a new Roman Catholic University; fourth, Irish railways are to be subsidized by the Government.

Belfast, March, 10.—A commercial treaty between the Zollverein and the Austrian Government has been concluded and signed.

London, March 10.—The Prince of Wales will soon make a visit to Ireland, where he is to be made a Knight of the Order of St. Patrick. The Fenians who were captured at Merthyr Tydvil, in Wales have been indicted for treason and will be tried at the Swansea Assizes. Dispatches frem Annesley Bay say that King Theodore had arrived in the immediate neighbourhood of Magdala with his troops and war material. The Agricultural Museum.

The Agricultural Museum.

An interesting circular has been issued by the Commissione of Agriculture, Mr. John Carling, setting forth some of the measures adopted, and to be pursued, for forwarding agricultural interests, under the Agricultural, &c., Act of the session just closed. Among these is the establishment of an Agricultural, mechanical, and industrial museum, in connection with the Department. This will comprise characteristic specimens of agricultural implements and machines, cereals and horticultural productions, manufactures, and the result of mechanical skill, and also woods and minerals possessing an economic value. While it is intended to make this museum as complete as possible, so far as Ontario is concerned, efforts will be made to collect materials from the other Provinces, thus enlarging the scope of information with reference to practical objects. All persons are therefore invited to contribute objects and specimens suited to the purpose. Grain in the Strauc, carefully pulled up by the roots just before ripening, is particularly requested. Each article will be labelled with the growgr's name and address, with other particulars; and the Department will pay costs for freight. As the Museum will be freely thrown open to the public, in capacious rooms of the Parliament Buildings, mechanics and others will find this a good and inexpensive way of giving publicity to their productions. In connection with the Museum a technical library is formed, which is free to all for consultation. Already about fifteen hundred volumes of valuable and suitable books, procured by the late Board of Asts and Manufactures, have been arranged on shelves; and such works of authority, on agriculture, horticulture, and the applied sciences connected therewith, will be speedily obtained, so as to render the library for practical purposes of great value.—Free Press.

The London Free Press calls attention to the depressed condition of the petroleum trade of Canada. The prices have fallen with astonishing rapidity within the past two years. In the winter of 1865'66 crude petroleum commanded \$10 per barrel; refined 65 cents per gallon. The following year crude had fallen to \$1.25 per barrel, and refined to 20 cents per gallon. At the present time crude is down to 40 cents per barrel, and refined 10 cents per gallon.
