Iowa Correspondence.
To the Editor of the Mercury.
Sir:—As you allow space in your columns for intelligence from all known parts of the globe, allow me to say a few words about Iowa. THE NEW ATLANTIC CABLE. While the first, second, and even ird attempts were making to connect While the first, second, and even third attempts were making to connect Europe and America, by means of a telegraph, the people of the two continents stood on the tiptoe of expectation. There was something so bold, so magnificent in the idea, and at the same time something so problematical in the experiment, that people at first looked amazed, then doubted if science, powerful as they knew it to be, would prove equal to the accomplishment of what it had undertaken. The first failure damped the hopes of the public, but only excited the ardor of those who were the losers. They resolved to snatch victory from the arms of defeat, and, like sensible men, turning their experience to account, they made failure the mere prelude of success. What was considered, five years ago, as a problem to which it was doubtful whether a clear solution would ever be obtained, was afterwards so clearly demonstrated that the laying of a submarine cable, of any length, is now looked upon as a work only a little more difficult of accomplishment than stretching a telegraph wire upon poles.—Hence the progress made in laying the new cable from Brest, in France, to the Island of St. Pierre, off Newfoundland, is noted daily in a few words. Nobody seems to fear that anything will go wrong, or that, if it does, it cannot soon be righted, and when the Great Eastern arrives with the cable, it will create little more stir than if a Black Ball Liner had come to anchor with a cargo of emigrants aboard. On Saturday the big ship was 497 miles out, and everything was serene.

The Spanish Regent.

The Spanish Regent.

Spain has a regent for a ruler for the third time within the last forty years. The first of the three was Queen Christina, the mother of Isabella, lately driven from the throne. The revolutionary movement at Madrid in 1840 resulted in her down fall and the appointment of General Esparto as regent, who held power only two years, when he was overthrown by another revolution, and Isabella, then only 13 years, was declared by the Cortes to be of age.

Francisco Serrano, the new regent, is one of those many soldiers of fortune in Spain who owe their fame and rank to the devotion with which they attach them selves to the cause of Christina, and the courage with which they fought during the war of independence. Like many of his class he was liberally rewarded by the Queen mother, and at the period of her overthrow, in 1841, he already held high rank in the military service of his country. The Queen's abdication and exile did not long retard his advancement, for he took a prominent part in the successful movement against the regent Espartero; and immediately on the restoration of Christina he joined Narvaez in his scheme to combat and destroy the influence over the mind of the young Queen that in 1846, some time dater marriage, a very serious difference occurred between her and the King Consort, arising our of the latter's jealousy of Gen. An attempt was made shortly after by the Duke of Sotomayer to ruin Serrano politically, but it recoiled on that Minister's own head, Serrano subcacceding in overthrowing the Ministry of which the Duke was chief. Popular opinon, however, proved more powerful than royal favor, and Serrano subsequently tell with the Ministry of the Salamanca, with whose fortunes he had identified himself. Up to this time the lucky favourite had been a reactionary in politics, but he now became a liberal; and he has ever since been identified with what is known in Spain as the Liberal Union party. He was sent in 1854 into exile for having taken part in the Saragossa outbreak; but the revolution of July in that year opened the way for his return to Spain, and he became a supporter of the O'Donnell-Espartero Coalition. He played a prominent part in the coup de ctat of July, 1856, it being principally through his instrumentality that the insurrection in Madrid was subdued, and O'Donnell enabled to seize power as Dictator. For this sorvice he was sent as Ambassador to Paris; but the downfall of O'Donnell shortly after led to his recall. In 1865 he was appointed by the new O'Donnell Cabinet Captain General of Madrid. For many years he has had a seat in the Senate, where has distinguished himself by a uniform and vigorons opposition to the reactionary policy of the old school of Spanish statesmen, and by his hearty support of all liberal measures. He has taken a quiet but influential part in this last revolution, and he owes his elevation to power as regent to the character he has won, of late years, for prudence and moderation, joined to liberal and enlightened views. Serrano is about 70 years of ago, having been born at the end of the last century.

ed complete unless the trimphant path of the god had been stained with the blood of his worshippers. But the priests dare not encourage that custom now. If a devotee fling himself down before the idol, the Brahmins cry out that it was an accident. The idolatry, however, still costs hundreds of lives every year. The weak and sickly perish by the wayside, and a cholera epidemic usually breaks out at Porce when the city is most overcrowded with pilgrims. The poor creatures are huddled together in a way which seems almost incredible to the Europeans. The temple of Juggernaut stands in a large enclosure in the centre of Poorce. There is a Grecian column of black basalt in front of the principal gate. The god lives in a large tower, and about 640 persons are employed to minister to his supposed necessities. There is an attendant who puts the idol to bed every night, another wakes him, a third whose office it is to put water and a tooth-pick comfortably within his reach, a fourth to paint his eyes for him every morning, as if he were a faded London beauty, several others to cook and give him food, 120 dancing girls to amuse him in his heavy moments, and 3,000 priests to worship him—and plunder the pilgrims. All this goes on year after year—is going on in the midst of this hot month of June, while the pilgrims throng every road which leads to the shrine.
