The Tilton-Beecher Scandal. The American papers are again revelling in the Tilton-Beecher scandal, which has been revived by the publication of a letter from the former addressed to the Rev. Dr. on, who presided over the Bro lyn Congregational Council, which met last year to discuss this painful Mr. Tilton felt aggneved by the action of this Council, and once more re-opens the whole ques-tion as to the amount of blame which attaches to him or to Henry Ward

Tilton, according to his statement was a member of Plymouth Church for 15 years, but in 1870 it came to his knowledge that Beecher had committed against him an offence which he forbears to name or characterize. On this account he ceased attending his ministry, and after the was, according to the rules of the church, erased from the list of members. It seems that Beecher apologised to him for the wrong—whatever it was-that he had committed, and alleged that an exposure would forbid him re-ascending the pulpit. Thus the matter stood till 1872, when some New York paper published a garbled version of the scandal, attributing its origin and animus to Tilton. This was followed by accusations made before the Congrega-Council already referred to, which he alleges were permitted by Mr. Beecher, who, Tilton says, was imself the guilty party. Smarting under these wrongs, Tilton says he could stand it no longer, and so adopts this last method of clearing himself. He gives documentary evidence to substantiate his assertions, and fortify his position. Thus the matter stands, but what the end will be we know not. Beecher maintains a dead silence, but it is understood that the position he intends to take is this.—He will make at the proper time a statement exonerating Tilton from blame in connection with the misrepresentations that have been made. As to the nature of the original difficulty between them, he will decline to be instrumental in reopening the matter, taking the ground that it was a personal affair between him and Tilton that was amicably settled years ago, and with which the public has no business. If the Plymouth Church insists on a re-opening and investigation of the scandal, he may resign his pastorate. It is stated on good authority that the original charge against Mr. Beecher was of not so serious a character as might be inferred from the published extract from Mr. Beecher's apology.
