MIDDLETON CASE WILL COME UP TO-MORROW

Charge of Theft Withdrawn and One of Obtaining Money by False Pretences Was Preferred

In the Police Court this morning the charge of stealing furniture, brought against Gordon Law Middleton by his wife, was withdrawn, and one of obtaining the sum of \$18,500 by false pretences substituted. This was the amount realized by Maynard & Son on the sale of the household goods, less commission. The case was continued until tomorrow.

Middleton was arrested on Tuesday as he was about to start a trip to Denver, on charges brought by his wife. She told the police that her husband had obtained nearly \$1,000 by mortgaging property, purchase which she put up the money. Middleton formed the plan of going to Colorado, and had purchased his ticket, but his wife was too quick for him.

On his return to Victoria Middleton gave it out that he had been appointed agent for the Meyer Bros. Heating and Lighting company of Denver, and in that capacity he posed about the city. Some short time ago Mrs. Middleton went to visit her parents and during her absence, it is alleged, her husband sold the furniture in their home by action for some of the furniture. His claims, was also purchased by her money.

Widely determined to forsake his wife and leave for Denver to rejoin the other woman, Middleton made preparations to leave, but his wife was too quick for him and his arrest followed. When arraigned yesterday and remanded on bail of \$1,000, J. A. Allan, commissioner of the court, ordered the court to allow a draft amounting to \$250 to be returned to his client. Middleton stated that he was in possession of the police, while R. E. Jones, who is acting for Mrs. Middleton, held that the draft was to be paid with the proceeds of the mortgage property paid for by his wife.

Middleton, who has held one or two good positions in the city, arrived here over two years ago from the prairie section. It is believed that he had some trouble in Vancouver before his arrival in this city.

NEWBOYS' UNION EXISTS HERE NOW

Fifteen Charter Members Sign the Role and a Friend Donates \$100 to Treasury—Adopt a Good Motto

The newboys' union of Victoria is an accomplished fact. Fifteen boys signed yesterday and more are affixing their names today while official recognition was given the body last night by the Trades and Labor council.

The new union is starting well. The new white page of the presser's book shows a balance of \$100 already on hand. This was a gift from a friend of the boys. The charter members are enthusiastic as to the union's future. They have adopted a motto which states their policy as seeking the protection of themselves the newspapers and the public.

The objects of the international body were carefully explained to the boys gathered for the purpose by George Harrison, the president of the Seattle Newboys' union. He had with him the rules and regulations of the union, cards and buttons, and he explained their use and made suggestions as to how they could be adapted to the local conditions. The boys were very enthusiastic over the formation of the society and believe that it will be of material benefit to them.

Mr. Harrison also explained at length the tenure of corners, and other points of vantage and the rules of the union under which a boy may secure for himself his desired location. This cannot be invaded by other members of the union under penalty of dismissal from that body. He also made suggestions with regard to selling papers, securing a regular line of customers and keeping them.

A large garrison is stationed in the town, and among the artillery officers quartered there is Captain Briard, who occupies a portion of a big house with his two daughters, aged respectively 16 and 18, and his son, a boy of 15 Major Courcier, another artillery officer dwells in the other part of the same house.

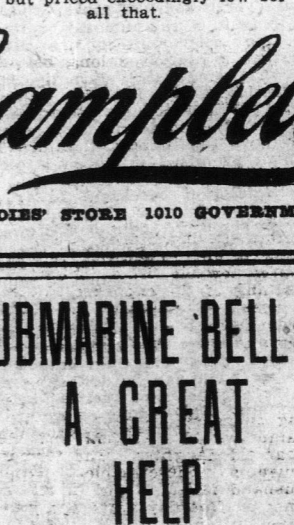

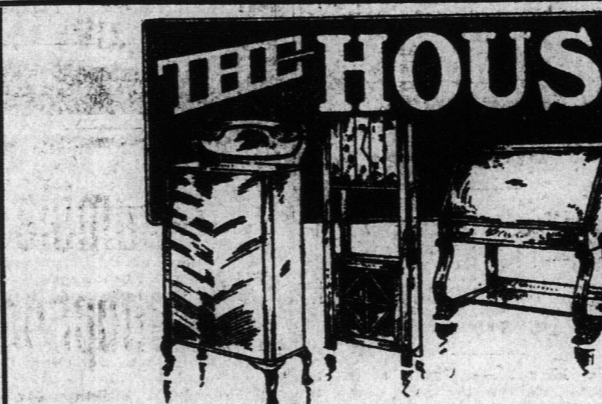
