Fortifying Government House. VANCOUR, Dec. 12.—The Australian steamer Arava has arrived. Queen Lilia had not been restored when she left Honolulu.

It is surmised that Ouzran committed suicide.

DEATH OF MR. W. H. HOWLAND.

Toronto's Ex-Mayor Dies from an Attack of Pneumonia. Mr. W. H. Howland, Mayor of Toronto for the years 1887-7, died at the Arlington Hotel at 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon from pneumonia.

Mr. Howland was attacked with a gripe his usual ailment, but the disease developed rapidly and he died yesterday. He was 82 years of age.

Those present at the funeral were Mr. Howland's wife, Mrs. H. H. Howland, and his children. The funeral will take place at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday afternoon.

Mr. Howland was born at Lambton, Ontario, in 1837. He was a member of the Ontario Legislative Council from 1871 to 1874, and was elected Mayor of Toronto in 1887.

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MAIL BAG IN NEW LANDS.

ENORMOUS EXPANSION OF THE POSTAL SERVICE. The Postal Union stretches Clear Across Africa, Where Most of the Explorers Made Their Fame—It Costs No More to Send a Letter to Victoria Nyanza Than to Liverpool.

It is an interesting fact that all those parts of equatorial Africa where a half century ago great explorers made their name, from which most of the sensations of African discovery have come, are now embraced in the Postal Union. It costs no more to send a letter or a newspaper far toward the head waters of the Congo, or to the great lakes of the heart of Africa, than to mail them from New York city to Liverpool or St. Petersburg. It costs no more to mail them to the southern tip of Africa, or to the Cape Colony, or to the high plateau of the interior, than to mail them to London or Liverpool.

There are only a few parts of the world that cannot now be reached by mail with but a few days' delay. The Postal Union stretches clear across Africa, where most of the explorers made their fame. It costs no more to send a letter to Victoria Nyanza than to Liverpool.

J. D. King & Co. Do Not Intend to Try to Force Their Employed to Accept the Reduced Scale.

J. D. King & Co.'s men have made 20 very anxious concessions yet. They did yesterday morning agree to reduce the scale of rough work, but the employers claim that since they manufacture but little of this form of article the concession is useless.

Mr. King said yesterday that the arrangement made in April was not legally binding, but he considered it morally binding, and he would look on it as such until the workmen agreed themselves to disregard it.

Mr. King, however, wants the scale reduced. He says that business is leaving his firm and all firms in this city and going to Montreal, because the Toronto firms cannot produce as cheaply on account of paying a greater wage to the employed.

Mr. King maintains that he merely requested relief from his employees. He asked that a bill be agreed on which he proposed for a new scale of wages. This would allow him to manufacture women's shoes at a cost of but three cents in advance of the real rate and men's at a cost of but one cent more.

The bill was merely a proposal. The men were to consider and accept it or reject it. No threats were used and the men may do anything they wish with it.

TRADE TAKEN BY CANADA.

United States Shoek Makers Lose the Bermuda Market.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—"Ten years ago," said John H. Groat, jr., United States Consul at Hamilton, Bermuda, in a report to the State Department, "a single man in Bermuda practically controlled the market in Bermuda for supplying shoeks for onions, beets and tomatoes. Today the Canadian manufacturer has taken the demand for shoeks completely out of the hands of American manufacturers to decide whether the trade is worth having and also whether they can place their goods on the market here at a cheaper cost to the consumer than the Canadian manufacturer can produce."

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
