

His Lordship Declines to Permit the Crown to Prove the Time of the Starting of Riordan's Car on the Fatal Morning-A Mechanical Expert Who Would Not Admit the Reasonableness of the Defence's Accident Theories-Mr. Carney and Sunday Cars.

The second week of the trial of the diminutive Hyams twins opened somewhat inauspiciously for the Crown. His Lordship Mr. Justice Ferguson ruled out the testimony of the Street Railway Company's employes, which tended to show that the car taken by Harry Hyams on the morning of the death of young Wells did not leave the car house in charge of Driver. Jeremiah Riordan until 10.42 o'clock, or about an hour and a half after Harry was said by Dr. King to have reached his office, having been conveyed there by Riordan and the bobtail car.

This testimony is of material impor-I his testimony is of material impor-tance to the Crown, as it would aid them to prove that the young man had been dead nearly two hours be-fore Harry Hyams undertook his trip from the Colborne-street warehouse in search of medical aid for a man he himself had told the car driver was already dead. Prospects of Horse Breeding.

Easily, Quickly, Permanently Restored. Mr. G. R. R. Cockburn said he was perhaps an old man, but the strong A writer on The London Live Stock Journal, in discussing the probable competition to be expected by Dritish farmers in the horse-trade from this country, says:

In considering this subject, there are two indisputable facts to be kept in view, and which may serve to some extent as a guide in the solution of this important question. These facs are that a very large proportion of American horses are entirely too light and not shapely enough to be acceptable to English or Scottish buyers, and also that the total number of horses raised in America during the last four years does not exceed 20 per cent. of the number raised the previous four years. Assuming that the number raised in the years 1887 to 1891 was twice what the necessities of the country required —and this is taking into account the commercial depression of the last three years-the total number now being raised is really less than one-half what the country itself actually demands. The latter fact named, and it is gen-

erally conceded by those best inform-ed to be a fact, is one that may well be considered here as well as in England. If we have recently bred only half the horses actually needed to supply our own markets it is certain there will scon be found a decided shortage in the supply. When this time comes prices are sure to advance greatly and rapidly. I believe that horse breeding to-day offers as favorable prospects as any branch of agriculture.


