Income Tax Return<br>on or before the 30 th of April, 1920.

A $^{\text {LL }}$ persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or
earned $\$ 1,000$ or more.
2. All other individuals who durfing the
calendar year 1919 received of earned $\$ 2,000$ or
3. Every corporation and joint stock companỳ whose profits exxceeded $\$ 2,000$ during the fiscal
year ended in 199 .
