It will be solid when cold. Turn out of the cups when wanted for use, and serve with cream or milk and sugar.

BEEFSTEAK.—Cut a tenderloin or well-shaped bit of steak and broil over a clear fire about seven minutes. Do not prick with a fork or much of the juice will be lost. When done, season with salt, and a little pepper (if allowed); spread with bits
