

Carnegie Urges Taft to Avert War

New York, April 21.-The hope that President Taft may find a way open to invite the leading naval powers of the world to consider if some agreement should not be reached to avert the danger of war between England and Germany, which "threatens to convulse the world." was expressed by Andrew Carnegie in his address as president at the annual meeting of the Peace Society cf the City of New York. *

Mr. Carnegie's subject was "The Wrong Path." He said, in parts

"We have been assured | that 'an overpowering army and navy is the cheap insurance of nations.'

"None are more secure from attack than before; on the contrary, the danger of war has increased. Britain spent upon army and navy last year \$345,000,000, most of this upon her navy: Germany. \$233,000,000, about half upon the navy; our peaceful republic expended upon army, navy and war pensions no less than \$470,000.-

"Britain has just discovered in Germany a menace to her existence. Germany, having equal rights upon the sea, fails to recognize the right of Britain to remain a menace to her, which she long has been, claim ing to be "Mistress of the Seas. The United States, no longer fre from naval conditions, is in no mood to remain menaced by any power.

"It seems pre-eminently . the mission of our peaceful industrial republic to lead the world to the reign of peace under law. She it was who led The Hague conference in urging an international supreme court. She covets no new territory. On the contrary she has relinquished control of Cuba, and is preparing the Filipinos





An editorial in the Standard Empire, regarding the impetus to shipbuilding expected to develop during the year, states:-

"Only a decade ago Canada stood fourth among the maritime nations of the world; today she has fallen to tenth place. In 1907 the Canadian vessel tonnage was 6,541,791; Norway, her greatest competitor in the coasting trade of the Dominion, held fourth place in the rank of the nations. In 1881 Nova Scotia had 3,025 craft with a total tonnage of 558,911; in 1908 she had about 2,100, with an aggregate tonnage of but 185,-000 tons of shipping.

"While the home shipping was nine years, more than one million tons of shipping, representing an Canada's waters was growing. In falling off, that of Norway in invested capital of perhaps forty million dollars, had come into our waters, chiefly on the Atlantic coast, to trade from port to port. This shipping was almost entirely Norwegian, carrying the crew with which they had sailed from Norway, men who had absolutely no interest in Canada.

"The agitation among the coasting captains of Nova Scotiz. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island during recent years has been exceedingly keen. They claimed not only that they were laboring under a disability in their competition with the Norwegians, but that they were discriminated against by the coal companies, their most important clients. One captain recently stated in a signed letter, his declaration being attested to by many of his fellows, 'that Canadian vessels were not allowed coals as a rule, while a Norwegian steamer is at the same pier; and, in many cases, coal is til the Norwegian vessel has kept from a Canadian vessel unmade two voyages to Montreal.'
