## From Miss Maggie Wr. Melville.

Cisamba, May 21, 1899.
My Dear Friends, -Since I last wrote to you I have befe over visiting for ten days the missionaries of the Englist Mission at Ocilonda. It is about twenty-five miles distant, and with good carriers and good weather, the journey can be mad in eight hours. I spent a very enjoyable time, but vas glad be home again among the girls and boys. How noisy the gir! were that night. I said, did they want to sew, and the replied, "No, we just want to sit and look at you." Well, I fe glad that they cared so much for my presence. One of tel married girls, Vita, took charge of them in the evenings durins my absence, holding the evening prayers with them. Durin ${ }^{2}$ my visit another little one arrived at the station, a little girl Kambundu and Wande. You will remember my writing their marriage. She is a fine, little, plump girl, to be calle Eva. Then last Wednesday a little, delicate boy came

Kumba and Nrene. It was from them ur Father saw fit to take their little Citende when he was just a month old. We pray that if it he His will He may spare this little une to be a "sumshine " in their house. Kumba is such a good, true lad, having the "Truth" weli in his heart, and not only that, but he his well able to tell it to others.
The last two weeks have been very busy, for the carriers nave arrived frum the coast. As there are 100 or so, it made a great deal of work to pay them. I had very little of it to do, only being able to tean sume of the cluth with which to pay them. Gou may be sume we rejoice to receive uar goods, some of which Have been at the cuast fur eighteen months. Sume bales of guods. from sume of the home churches have arrived too, but oss I have nut the particulars, I cannut thank you by name. Mr. Currie may be able to acknowledge particulatly, but in Several instances nu list of goods has been sent and nu name of the senders.
Just now there are eight little buys louking at picture books, and, judging from remarks, they are enjuying them. One of them is a lad who came befure my sister went away with a sore foot and when almost well went with the lads to the Njenje. On returning, he carne again to the station, and seems to wish to Gemain. All the others are from the villages. But one never knows which boys or girls among these picture lovers will be fhose to come and live here. But I must not make my letter onger this time.

## Cisamba Schools.

During the first two months of the year the schools were aivided as reported last year, but because Mrs. Currie and my bister left us to return to America, a change was necessary. Enstead, therefure, of the Girls and Boys' Schools each being divided into two, with two teachers, they were each held as one, thus making a much larger Buys' than heretofore. As it was mpossible for one persun to overcome the work, two of the 'arthest advanced of the lads were chosen to assist, one in each thoul. They very soon became good teachers, and after three honths' practice were sent to Ciyuka to take charge of the chools there. Others were chosen in their places, and after a thange in one case, we seem again to have two lads well fitted for their position. The regular Kindergarten had to be given pp for a time. In the Girls' School, however, some of the founger unes sew, but it is simply to keep them interested until ther helpers come from the home-land, when we hope to extend he work greatly.

The school work has been very encouraging during the ye The attendance has been very regular, especially in the Gir School. The average in the Boys, however, has been reduo because of a number having gone long journeys, occupying fra two months up. These boys, however, have carried their boos with them, and on their return we have not found that the have dropped behind to any great extent.

Just a word about the younger girls who are here. Two yed ago, when we saw the last girl married, it was rather a gloo outlook. But one by one uthers came until now we have steadie from eighteen to twenty-one or two, sleeping in their houses a overflowing into our kitchen. Their evenings are spent with and thus they are shielded from much evil they would see living at the natuve villages. Pray for our work, that our Fathe richest blessing may rest upon it.

## From Rev. W. T. Currie.

Cisamba, May 1ó, 1899
Drar Mrs. Sandrrs,-I received to-day three parcels mart C 1, C 2 and C 3 , out of a case marked C 3 . These contand hatchets, saws, boring-bits, sping traps (my thumb says the are brutal things), iron spoons, and what seem to be shoes oxen. I know not when these things reached the coast who is the practical, big hearted person, male or female, sent them. It may be they were never intended for us. that case there is little chance of them ever reaching their lam' owner. They have come-like the manna in the widernes
th when they were wanted; all but those steel traps; though Chaps in a couple of days it will be possible to think of them th more grace. Our boys are wild for the hatchets and saws; it were they sent as a gift? or is the bill to follow shortly? fe will conclude for the present that the Lord sent them, and we find ourselves mistaken we will ask some of you at home help us pay for them.
I also received three bales of goods for the hospital apparently. ne is a long bale bcund outside with a thick paper-brown on he side and black on the other-but without any marks; at ast none are to be seen, for the paper cover has been badly fn on the journey. I have not, and will not for the present, pen this bale, unless it proves to be damp, but just send you ptice that it has come to hand. The other two were covered fith burlap and marked C 1 and C2. One of these I opened. he contents were in good shape, and will be of great service. fome slips with the donors' names I am sending to AIrs. Thos. foodie, Montreal. Charges since last report:


The freight, insurance, and duty on the tardware may or may ot be charge, u me in 1897 or recently. I wili try to find out C 1 and C 2 from Winnipeg. The cther bale was from Brantford.

## Copy of a Letter from a Prominent Native

 Christian,A. PROCTOR IN THE SURREME COURT.

Jaffina, Ceylon, 26 th April, 1898.
Dear Misses. Leitch, - I wrote you twice before this, enclosing futtings from newspapers, but received no reply. Perbaps the fetters did not reach you. It appears to me that I am always in touch with you because I often read the letters you send to bour friends here. and also your occasional letters and publications. I thank the Lord for using you to eytend and strengthen gis kingdom. Iou were trained by Him in a foreign field for bis purpose. Flad you not lived in wheathen land and known fheir ways of misery and darkness, your lnve for the heathen Hould not be so great as it is now. Fortunately for us your training home was our land. Ynu will be glad to know that there are thousands in Jaffna who are sincerely grateful to you.

The hospitals at Manepy and İnuvil are doing a world good. I know more of the latter because I pass by daily on way to the courts, and see for myself the number of path brought there fur treatment. Dr. Curr has ganed the cof dence of the perple and is very kind to her patients. A ha filled with divine love, Oh, what luve does it pour out!

The last rainy season was unusually wet and fever of a type prevailed. Both the hospitals afforded great rehet. labor, energy, and money you spent founding these hospt? were more than compensated by the work done at that tif The perple appreciate t'se work dune in the hospitals, and sog are getting up a petition to Guvernment to open new road bring the hoypitals nearer to some of the villages.

The gospel message is heiug faithfully carried to the pathe and their friends. Several attend the meetings which are h in the Bungalow. The Irnuvil hospital is very fortunate having Mrs. Chilliahpillai to minister to the spiritual needs the patients and others.

The Irnuvil premises look nice and in a few years would quite shady Santhiapillai is doing his best to make it attracul 1 hope that in no distant future you would come among us sojourn awhile and see with your own eyes the fruits of 5 labors. May Gud bless you.
