CANADA/NETHERLANDS CULTURAL CONSULTATIONS

A. REVIEW OF PAST ACTIVITIES

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The activities of the Canadian cultural program in the Netherlands over the past three years have been directed primarily at identifying and capitalizing on those sectors of the Dutch cultural scene offering the greatest potential for access by Canadian artists and performers.

Since 1986, we worked with the Meervaart Theatre in Amsterdam to present a "Canada Back to Amsterdam Festival" at which Eduard Locke and "LA LA Human Steps" were introduced to Dutch audiences. In 1987 Canadian artists were presented in both Amsterdam and The Hague under the Department's major exhibit "Carte de Visite", which enjoyed substantial audiences following openings presided over by local dignitaries and the Ambassador. At the same time the Stedlijk Museum in Amsterdam produced an exhibit of two contemporary Canadian photographers while we worked with another photography gallery, the Perspectief in Rotterdam, to produce a focus on Canadian photography from a different angle.

In 1987 the Embassy was able to obtain the cooperation of a leading literary magazine in the Netherlands to produce a special double issue on Canadian literature. That same year, we successfully introduced new Canadian jazz musicians to the Netherlands at the North Sea Jazz Festival, where pianist Oliver Jones, and groups "Deported from Cozumel" and "Danny Christianson" joined more established performers such as Oscar Peterson. Canadian country music has also become significant, with several performers appearing for the first time at Dutch venues. The leading Dutch country music glossy now devotes a section to Canadian performers each month, Canadians now appear regularly in the Netherlands, and Canadian country music albums are now available locally.

Theatrically, Montreal's Carbonne 14 staged a production of "Le Rail" in Utrecht, and their success in 1987 lead to a repeat visit in 1989 to perform "Le Dortoir" in three cities. During 1988, the mission participated with the Dutch Ministry of Culture and a non-governmental cultural foundation, the Openbaarkunstbezit, with a presentation of the Glenn Gould, which included a full day seminar and a special concert in the Amsterdam Concertgebouw. Glenn Gould, was also the focus of an edition of the cultural publication 'Music en Danse', and was featured on a prime time national TV show. Charles Dutoit also appeared at the Concertgebouw, where he conducted the orchestra on occasions in 1988 and 1989.

During 1988, Eduard Locke returned to the Netherlands for a third tour, at which time he was accorded the honour of a premiere work for the Netherlands National Ballet in the Holland Festival, as well as participation in the Holland Dance Series. The dance troupe "LA LA LA Human Steps" also performed at the 1988 Holland Festival, and followed that with appearances in Amsterdam, Rotterdam, Groningen, and The Hague.

Contemporary Canadian music composers are becoming increasingly popular in the Netherlands. Peter Hannon, with a new composition, was featured in the International Recorder Series at the Ijsbreker in Amsterdam, as was SMCQ and a Canadian soprano won the top prize in the Den Bosch International Vocal Competition. Further, SMCQ was invited to return to participate in a contemporary music festival in 1990. Louise Bessette won the piano recitalist award as well as a 'best performer' price in 1988, and Gary Felljard, a country music performer, was a featured artist on Holland's top popular music program on television.

VISUAL ARTS

In the field of visual arts, The Netherlands has become an increasingly important area for Canadian artists. A Canadian owned gallery, the Rene Shand Gallery, has opened in Amsterdam, and it has featured a sole exhibition of the works of Ray Mead as well as other contemporary Canadian and Dutch artists as Ann Cary, Mark Garneau, Caje, and Don Bonham.

Ottawa-born sculptor Andrew Stonyer was commissioned to create a work for a prime outdoor space in The Hague, and Canadian artists such as Evergon and Ron Shulbrook have had works displayed in commercial gallerys in Amsterdam, while work by Brian McNealy has been displayed in the city of Oss.

During 1988, two Canadians, Tony Brown and Noel Harding were featured in a two month back to back "Canada in Middelburg" presentations, both of whom produced very large sculptures for their one-man shows. Both returned in 1989, with Harding's work on exhibit in Amsterdam (and Hamburg), and Brown prominently featured in a three month, 20 artist exhibition put on by the Kroller-Muller Museum.

In the field of video art, there continues to be a growing appreciation and interest in Canadian video productions. In 1988 Canada was featured prominently in the Second International Experimental Video Festival in Arnhem, and each year Canadian videos have been featured at the International Video Festival in The Hague, with six Canadian producers present in 1989.

There has been a steady development in the film industry with an ever increasing number of NFB films as well as CBC documentaries and features on Dutch television and commercial film releases in cinemas. Notable attention was given to the release of "I Heard the Mermaids Singing" in 1988; the return of Canadian film-maker Robert Lepage to the Utrecht Film Festival in 1989, the shooting of a 35mm feature film in Amsterdam by Rock Demers; and the possibility of a Canadian documentary/feature film festival in Amsterdam in 1989. The establishment in The Netherlands of European offices by Canadian film producers and distributors such as Atlantis Films or Command Performance Distributors should enhance the value of Holland for the release of Canadian films in Western Europe. The signing of a Netherlands-Canada Coproduction Agreement in Film and Television should provide substantial opportunities for both parties in the future.

ACADEMIC RELATIONS

Since the 1985 establishment of the Association for Canadian Studies in Holland, there has been steady growth in the field. The association has tripled its membership, and has representatives from each of the principal universities in The Netherlands; twelve courses with Canadian content are now taught at six Dutch universities, and two of those universities offer a Canadian studies multi-disciplinary course.

The Association actively assists in arranging lecture tours for Canadian academics as well as Canadian Studies Seminars. Additionally, there are now several research contracts between Canadian and Dutch universities as well as a regular exchange of professors between two of those universities.

During 1987, the Association initiated organization of an All-European Canadian Studies Conference with similar organizations in Canada and other European countries, to take place in The Hague in 1990. The conference is expected to focus on the future of Canada and Europe, which should be of particular interest as 1992 approaches. The target audience of the conference is current and potential opinion makers in Dutch and European society.

In 1988, as referred to above, the second largest university in The Netherlands established a well financed Canadian Studies Centre. The Centre has arranged exchanges of academic staff and offers a multi-disciplinary program of courses open to all general arts students. Additionally, the University of Groningen now recognizes Canadian Studies as a valid field of concentration for post-graduate students enrolled in Master's degree programs.

Closely allied to the Canadian Studies program has been a steady expansion in the availability of Canadian books, both those translated into Dutch and locally published, and those obtainable in the original French or English. One of the best known independent Dutch publishing houses regularly issues translations of Canadian literature, and has been able to obtain substantial press coverage while promoting the published material. A positive spin-off of these developments has been increased attention from the media, with two series being presented on the radio on Canadian literature.

The Canadian Secretary of State supported the publication in 1988 of a scholarly history of the Dutch in Canada, as part of the Generations Series published by McClelland and Steward: "A Bittersweet Land, The Dutch Experience in Canada 1890-1980". More might be done to promote the user of this publication in schools of Canadians Studies in the Netherlands.

OTHER EXCHANGES OF PERSONS

(a) Civil Servants

Active contact was maintained with representatives of a Dutch policy advisory council, the Welenschappelijke Raad voor bet Regeringsheleid (WRR) on a study tour of Canada. This group was responsible for the development of a comprehensive policy framework for the integration of immigrants and refugees

(Allophones) in Dutch society. Officials of the Canadian Multiculturalism Sector also met in Ottawa with the head of the Dutch National Bureau Against Racial Discrimination.

(b) Sports

- ° Ontario hosted a visit of the Youth Soccer team of Ajax Amsterdam in 1987.
- * The Ontario-Canada Games team trained in Holland in May 1989.
- A proposal for Holland to host a further training visit by an Ontario team in 1990 is being considered.

(c) Translation

During the period 1986-89, three Dutch students came to Canada to obtain on-the-job experience of translation techniques and documentary and terminological research in their language combinations. At the same time, the Canadian side has benefitted from the practicums by obtaining knowledge of new developments in Dutch terminology and usage.

DUTCH CULTURAL EVENTS IN CANADA

There were several major Dutch cultural events in Canada during the past three years. Holland Festival was held in Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal from June to September 1987. It included shows such as "Boulevard of Broken Dreams", the Netherlands Danz Threater, a film festival and various other activities. The Festival, one of the largest foreign artistic events ever produced in Canada, was attended by Princess Margriet and enabled the Canadian public to discover many Dutch artists. The exhibit "Sweetest Spring", prepared by the Royal Netherlands Army Museum and officially opened by Queen Beatrix, has been shown at the Museum of War in Ottawa since May 1988.

AUDIO-VISUAL RELATIONS

Canada and the Netherlands agreed during the last cultural consultations to prepare a film and television co-production agreement. This agreement, signed on October 18, 1989 constitutes an important event in our cultural relations, as it will provide Dutch and Canadian film and video artists with the means of producing joint works in this field. As a result, the Canadian film-maker the Demers, of Productions La Fête, is now doing a television feature film on the life of Van Gogh for younger audiences. Shooting started in Amsterdam last October.

In the aftermath of the adoption of the European Community Directive on crossfrontier television, Canada hopes that the Single European Market will provide additional opportunities for Canadian co-productions with Dutch and other European partners. Canada participated in the Utrecht Festival of Animation Films with five short films (Dog Brain, Waddles, Black Hula, Dance on my Head, and Lupo the Butcher).

Description:

The purpose of a "bank" is to provide an avenue for exchanges of persons in the academic and cultural fields and to promote activities not included in existing programs by making possible all types of visits (contact, research, lecture tours, etc.) in all academic and cultural sectors and disciplines.

The bank constitutes a quota expressed in terms of visit-days offered reciprocally by each party in the course of a calendar year.

Terms and Conditions:

- Each party shall provide the other party with a "bank" totalling 120 visit-days per calendar year for mission-visits: the per diem for the living expenses of the Dutch visitors shall be \$100 while the per diem for the living expenses of the Canadian visitor to the Netherlands shall be ;
- No mission shall exceed 21 days;
- The terms and conditions of financing shall be as follows: cost of international travel to the farthest point in the receiving country to be paid by the country of origin; living expenses and local travel costs to be paid by the host country;
- Mission projects must be complete and detailed and whenever possible must contain the mission program, the specific itineraries and lists of persons whom the visitors wish to meet and the organizations that they wish to visit;
- Plans for missions or visits shall be submitted first by the person or organization interested to the authorities in his country of origin (not to the embassies or through the host organization);
- Once it has given its approval, the sending country shall inform the host country by diplomatic channels, normally four weeks in advance; thus the host authorities are approached (for the living expenses and local travel costs) solely through the embassy of the visitor's country of origin;
- The visitor, the authorities of his country of origin or the host organization are responsible for planning and organizing the program for the mission or visit; the role of the host country's authorities is limited to supplying information or coordination, or both, when necessary.

Other Considerations:

- The main responsibility for deciding whether to take action on an application by one of their nationals lies with the authorities of the sending country; once the application is sent to it, the host country reserves only the right to suggest any changes that would assist in conducting the mission or visit or would enrich the program content;
- In view of this division of responsibilities, each party shall inform the other of the names and addresses of the authority to whom their respective nationals must submit an application.

During the period 1986-89, three Dutch students came to Canada to obtain on-the-job experience of translation techniques and documentary and terminological research in their language combinations. At the same time, the Canadian side has benefitted from the practicums by obtaining knowledge of new developments in Dutch \terminology and usage.

DUTCH CULTURAL EVENTS IN CANADA

There were several major Dutch cultural events in Canada during the past three years. Holland Festival was held in Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal from June to September 1987. It included shows such as "Boulevard of Broken Dreams", the Netherlands Danz Threater, a film festival and various other activities. The Festival, one of the largest foreign artistic events ever produced in Canada, was attended by Princess Margriet and enabled the Canadian public to discover many Dutch artists. The exhibit "Sweetest Spring", prepared by the Royal Netherlands Army Museum and officially opened by Queen Beatrix, has been shown at the Museum of War in Ottawa since May 1988.

AUDIO-VISUAL RELATIONS

Canada and the Netherlands agreed during the last cultural consultations to prepare a film and television co-production agreement. This agreement, signed on October 18, 1989 constitutes an important event in our cultural relations, as it will provide Dutch and Canadian film and video artists with the means of producing joint works in this field. As a result, the Canadian film-maker Roch Demers, of Productions La Fête, is now doing a television feature film on the life of Van Gogh for younger audiences. Shooting started in Amsterdam last October.

In the aftermath of the adoption of the European Community Directive on crossfrontier television, Canada hopes that the Single European Market will provide additional opportunities for Canadian co-productions with Dutch and other European partners. Canada participated in the Utrecht Festival of Animation Films with five short films (Dog Brain, Waddles, Black Hula, Dance on my Head, and Lupo the Butcher).
