THE QUEEN.

VICTORIA, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; only daughter of His late Royal Highness Edward Duke of Kent, and Victoria, late Duchess of Kent, daughter of Francis Duke of Saxe Cobourg; born the 24th May, 1819; succeeded to the Throne on the decease of her Uncle, William IV., June 20th, 1837; Proclaimed June 21st, 1837; Crowned June 28th, 1838; Married February 10th, 1840, to Field Marshal His Royal Highness Prince Albert Augustus Charles Emanuel, Prince of Saxe Cobourg and Gotha, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, &c. &c. &c. who died at Windsor Castle, December 14th, 1861.

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ECLIPSES.

During this year there will be four Eclipses: two of the Sun, and two of the Moon:

I. On the 17th of May, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun. Not visible in any part of British America.

II. In the evening of the 1st of June, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon. It will appear as a partial Eclipse in Canada. At the time of the Moon's rising, the shadow will appear, covering nearly two-thirds of its surface, and passing off in about 45 minutes.

III. On the 11th of November, there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun, but it will not be visible in Canada.

IV. In the morning of the 25th of November, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, of which take note, that it begins at Quebec 29 minutes past 2 and ends 10 minutes past 5; begins at Montreal 21 minutes past 2 and ends 38 minutes past 5; begins at Kingston 9 minutes past 2 and ends 30 minutes past 5; begins at Toronto 57 minutes past 1 and ends 18 minutes past 5; begins at London 45 minutes past 1 and ends 10 minutes past 5.

PLANETS.

Until September 28th, Venus will be evening star, and the rest of the year morning star. Until October 2nd, Mars will be evening star, then morning star the rest of the year. Jupiter will be morning star until April 12th, evening star until October 31st, then morning star the rest of the year. Until March 28rd, Saturn will be morning star, evening star until October 2nd, then morning star the rest of the year. Mercury will be visible in the West soon after sunset, about January 22nd, March 16th and Sept. 12th; also, in the morning in the East just before sunrise, about March 11th, July 9th and Oct. 29th. Venus will be brightest on the 22nd of August, being then an evening star, and again, while morning star, on the 5th Nov.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., but if posted unpaid are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island the rate is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., with optional pre-payment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom will be,

By Canadian Packet, 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

By Cunard " 17 " "

If a letter exceed 1 oz. in weight, it will be liable to *four* rates, as, after the first ounce, fractions are not recognized, the rate progressing by the ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d sterling on arrival in England.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction—"by Canadian Packet" or "by British Packet"—

and in that case they are kept over for the Packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail" by whatever Packet forwarded.

Letters for British Colonies and possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

The rate on Letters for the United States, (except California and Oregon) 10 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

" " for California and Oregon, 15 c. per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

" " British Columbia, 25 cts. to be prepaid.

The rate on Letters for the following destination, per Canadian Ocean Steamers, is 23 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., and must be prepaid:—

Africa (West Coast of), Australia, (including all the Colonies embraced in this general name,) Buenos Ayres, Cape of Good Hope, Ceylon, Egypt, Gibraltar, Gold Coast, Hayti, India, Liberia, Malta, Mauritius, Monte Video, Natal, New Zealand, St. Helena, Sierra Leone, Spain, Tasmania, West Indies (British).

For the principal German States, the rate is 29 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

For France and Algeria, 17 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

On Letters to the above destinations forwarded by the Cunard Line of Steamers, an additional charge of 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. becomes necessary.

Registration Charges.—For the Registration of a Letter addressed to any place in British North America the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a Letter to United Kingdom, $12\frac{1}{2}$ c.

" " " United States, 5c.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, an amount equal to the postage.

Miscellaneous Charges.... The charge on Parcels, by Parcel Post, to any place in Canada is 25 cents per lb., (with 5 cents additional if registered).

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charge upon Books, &c., by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding 4 ounces in weight; $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents on $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. packets; and $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. These charges must be prepaid.

Book Post with France.... For a packet of Printed Matter, or single Newspaper, Book, &c., not over 2 oz., 4 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 oz., and not over 4 oz., 8 "

Ditto, " 4 oz., " 8 oz., 17 "

And so on; increasing 17 cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb.

The Book Post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers....Transient Newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the Office of Publication, and American or British Papers posted or re-posted in Canada, must be prepaid one cent each, by Postage Stamp, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British Newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers and News Agents,--- such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States....Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet Mails are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers, brought by Mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

Periodical Publications....The rate on Periodical Publications, is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent; over 3 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by Postage Stamps from the Office of Publication, Periodicals, *published in Canada*, weighing over 2 ounces, may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, *printed in this Province*, other than Newspapers when specially devoted to the Education of Youth (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of Science, and addressed directly from the Office of Publication, to be transmitted to any Post Office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Transient Periodicals, including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the Office of Publication, nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical Publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Postage Stamps, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in the Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

Postage Stamps .. Postage Stamps of the respective values of 1 cent, for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet, are provided for sale to the public.

Letter Envelopes, impressed with Modallion Stamp, and equivalent to the prepayment of Postage to the amount of 5 and 10 cents res-

pectively, are furnished for sale to the public at the following rates :
 The 5 cent Envelope, at the rate of \$5.50 per 100, or 66 cents per dozen ; the 10 cent Envelope, at \$10.50 per 100, or \$1.26 cents per dozen.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause :

To inclose a letter, or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of Newspaper Publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their Subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.

Money Orders on England, Scotland and Ireland.—Money Orders, payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in sterling, the Commission chargeable being for £2 and under, 25cts. ; from £2 to £5, 50cts. ; from £5 to £7, 75cts. ; from £7 to £10, \$1.00. No order can be drawn for more than £10 ; but any number of orders for £10 each may be procured.

Household Furniture and Effects, that have been in actual use for one month or more, of persons coming to settle in this Province, and in charge of the owner.

Household Effects, Personal, not merchandise, of subjects of Her Majesty domiciled in Canada, but dying abroad.

Machinery, Models and Patterns of, provided the same be not put to actual use.

Military Clothing, for Her Majesty's troops or militia.

Military Stores, and material for Military Clothing, imported for the use of the Provincial militia, under such restrictions as may be passed by the Governor in Council.

Packages, containing *free goods*, in which they are usually imported.

Packages; viz., bales, trusses; cases covering casks of wine or brandy, in wood; cases and casks, containing dry goods, hardware, and cutlery; crates or casks, containing glassware or earthenware; cases, containing bottled wine or spirits; and other packages, in which goods of the kind imported in them are usually imported, and which do not necessarily or generally accompany such goods when sold in the Province.

Packages, of all other kinds, to pay same *ad valorem* duty as the goods they contain, unless the duty exceeds 30 per cent.; in which case, the duty on the packages to be 30 per cent.

Packages containing specific goods, 20 per cent. *ad valorem*.

Tools and Implements of Trade of handiercraftsmen arriving in Canada, when accompanied into the Province by the actual settler, and brought in by such settler for his own use, and not for sale; machinery excepted.

Table of Prohibitions.—The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found:—Books, Drawings, Paintings, and Prints, of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

Free for Use of Her Majesty's Army in Canada.—Silver or Plated Ware, Glassware, China Ware, Table Linen, and Cigars, for the use of any regimental mess of officers serving in Canada.

The phrase, "All importations for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the public uses of the Province," is, by the last Act, interpreted to mean, that such importations are only free when the duty, otherwise payable thereon, would be borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or this Province.

All goods not hereinbefore enumerated, subject to 20 per cent. duty.

COUNTY COURTS.

Presided over by a resident Judge in each county. The jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to £100. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of Law. These courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

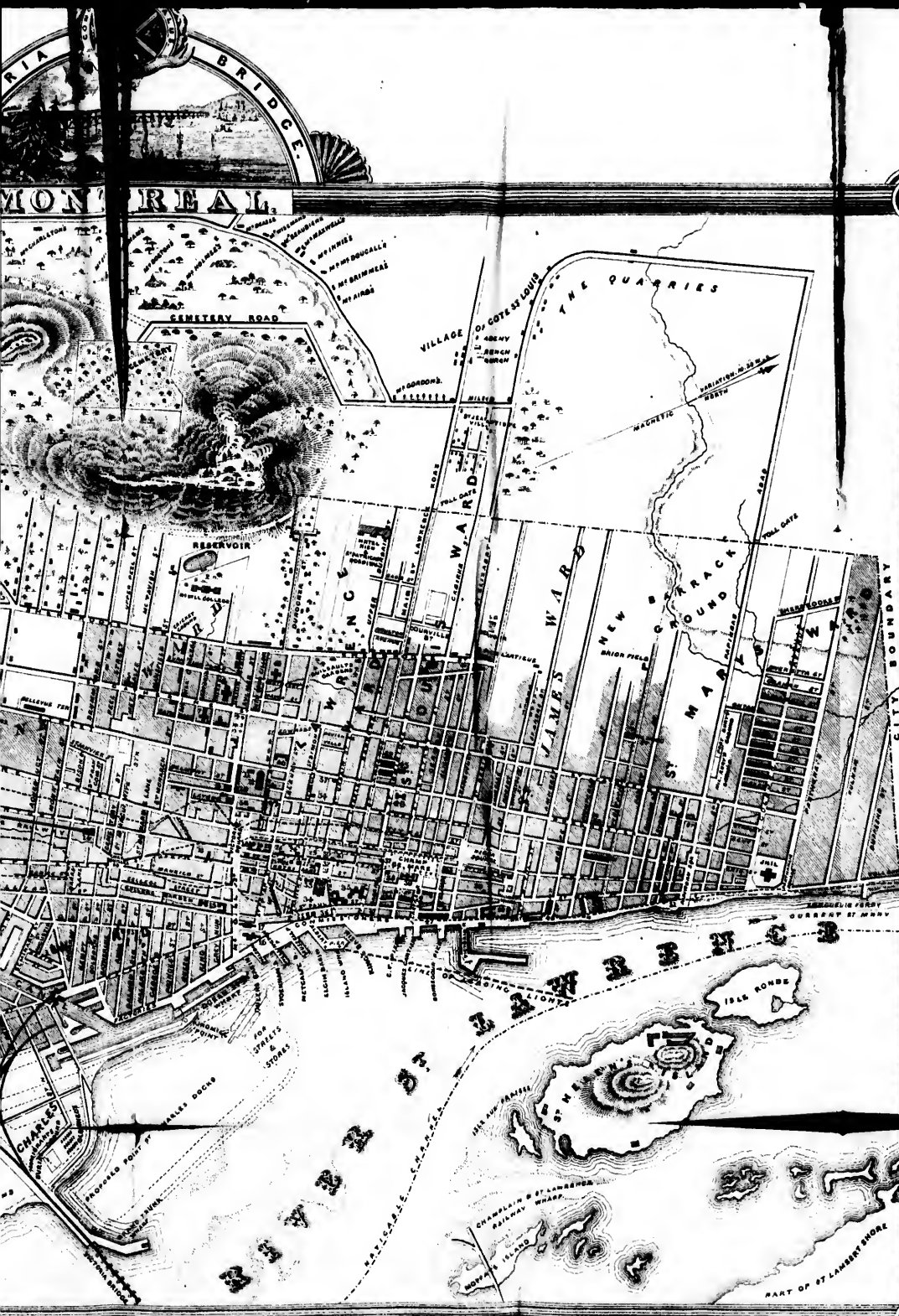
