HON. MR. RAYMOND P. MONTAIGNE SEIZED WITH HEART FAILURE ON BUSINESS VISIT SUDDENLY SUCCEUMBS IN PARIS

Canadian Minister of Marine and Fisheries Taken Ill With Angina Pectoris and Passes Away Christmas Night—One of Quebec's Foremost Representatives in Political and Municipal Life.

PARIS, Dec. 25.—HON. RAYMOND P. MONTAIGNE, CANADIAN MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES, DIED SUDDENLY AT 9 O'CLOCK TO-NIGHT, THE CAUSE OF HIS DEATH WAS ANGINA PECTORIS.

Mr. Montaigne, accompanied by Raphael Lemieux, the Canadian, editor-general, came to France a couple of weeks ago from London, in connection with the establishment of a line of steamers between Marseilles and Canadian ports.

Soon after his arrival in Paris, the minister complained that he was suffering from heart trouble, but he continued to fill his engagements.

During the progress of a banquet given in his honor Dec. 21, he was seized with a severe attack, but this at the time was attributed to emotion while replying to a toast to his health.

The minister on Saturday visited Lillie and Quirk, but on returning to the Hotel Continental here, he was compelled to take to his bed.

At 1 o'clock to-night the administration of medicine was followed by a choking sensation. The last moments were administered and death followed immediately.

The British minister, Sir Francis Bertie, was notified by Minister Lemieux, and arrangements for the funeral of the minister were made.

The body will be taken to Montreal, Que., for interment.

In New York City Nearly 50,000 Poor Were Given Free Holiday Free.

New York, Dec. 25.—Christmas Day in New York was marked by the customary universal suspension of business and the usual family re-unions and generous outpouring of public and private charity.

At the Grand Central Palace the distribution of Christmas dinner baskets by the Salvation Army began early in the morning and continued until the needs of nearly 500,000 families, or about 2,500 persons, had been relieved.

A tragic interruption of the Christmas feast occurred at the home of Mrs. Paul Raymond, when her step-son, John Raymond, and his friend, Andrew Cannon, who had been invited to join a family reunion, were found dead in bed this morning.

Half an hour after the fire started, the room of Roosevelt Hospital, some distance away, was lighted as if by daylight. There was great alarm among both patients and attendants.

Another fatality of the day was that of the seven-year-old child, O'Neil, who was burned to death by her clothing catching fire on a Christmas tree.

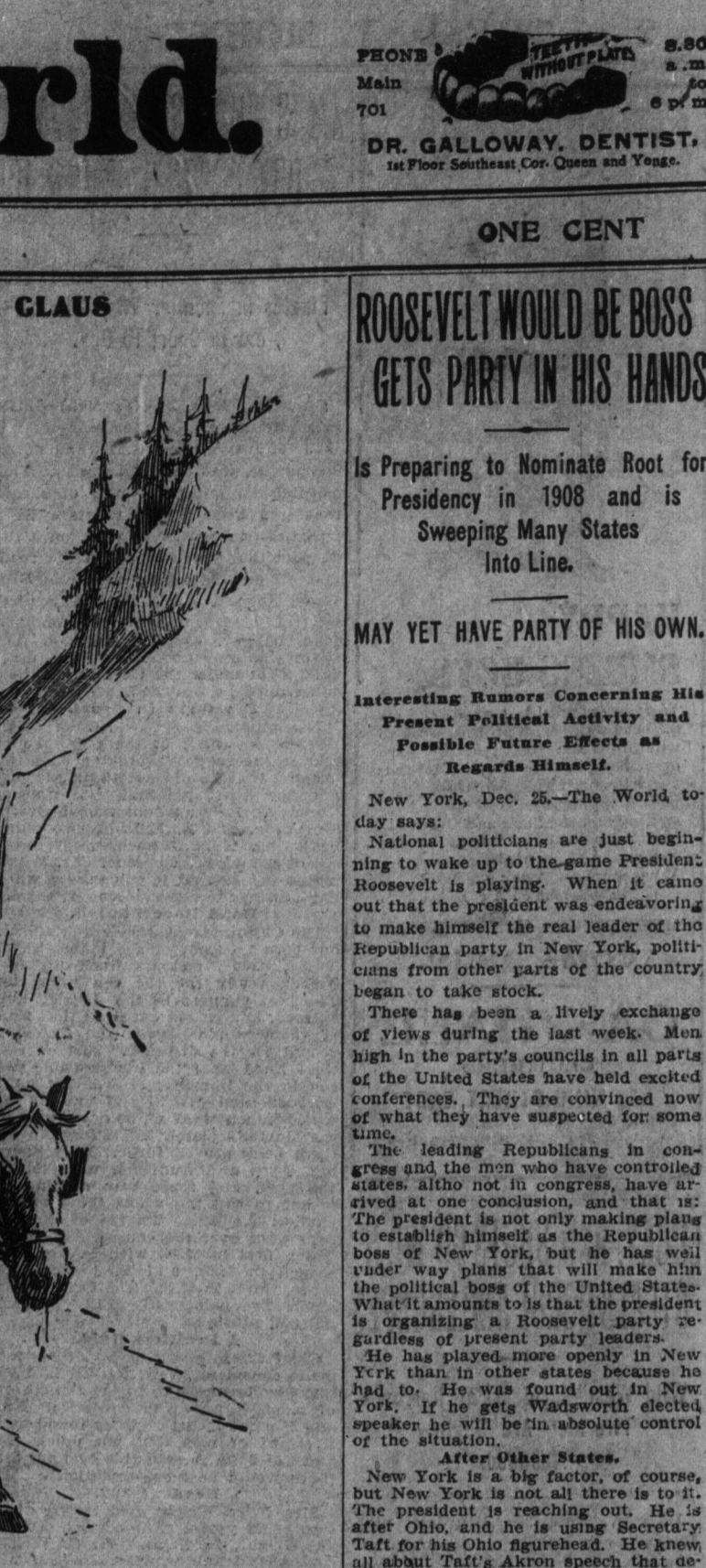
St. Petersburg, Dec. 25.—(11 p.m.) Direct telegraphic communication with Moscow was severed last night, but the government succeeded in restoring communication by a roundabout route this morning.

At the headquarters of the revolutionaries, the fighting was still going on, but the room of Roosevelt Hospital, some distance away, was lighted as if by daylight.

At an early hour this morning the inhabitants of Moscow have been forbidden to leave their dwellings after 7 o'clock in the evening.

From fragmentary accounts received from Moscow, it is gathered that the city has been brought to a complete standstill.

ROOSEVELT WOULD BE BOSS GETS PARTY IN HIS HANDS

Is Preparing to Nominate Root for Presidency in 1908 and is Sweeping Many States Into Line.

MAY YET HAVE PARTY OF HIS OWN.

New York, Dec. 25.—The World to-day says: National politicians are just beginning to wake up to the game President Roosevelt is playing.
