ROBBERED CHIEF CONSTABLE
Seven Burglaries Have Been Recorded Recently in the Town of Whitby.

ONE ARREST HAS BEEN EFFECTED
Part of Stolen Property Recovered Cuts From Broken Glass a Valuable Clue.

Whitby, Nov. 12.—Burglars have been worrying Whitby with appalling frequency recently, and no less than seven cases have been reported to Chief Constable Calverley. One of these cases is proof positive that the burglars look upon the majesty of the law in anything but a serious vein, for one of the burglaries reported by the Chief was reported by the Chief himself. He took this official action because his own harness shop was entered and his nice warm overcoat, which he will need soon, his tools and other things were missing.

The burglars have been endeavoring to secure sufficient booty to stock a departmental store. They have visited Richardson's jewelry emporium, which is an evidence of their vanity. They touched Pringle's grocery proving conclusively that they respect the comfort of their inner man. They called secretly at Hatch Bros' hardware store for a few things they likely needed in their business, and with a view to their personal appearance they gave an unwelcome patronage to the Ferguson's tailoring establishment, possibly having laid friends or may-be some of the burglars were burglars, as the ladies are drifting into every line of business, they broke into Miss Morley's millinery shop. No burglars can do without shoes, so they broke into Burns' shoe store.

But what they wanted with harness is a mystery, and the audacity of a burglar, or even a score of burglars, invading the place of business of a chief constable, especially an officer who commands the respect of the town, is the essence of a series of mysteries. After such defiance of the powers that be, it naturally follows that an arrest has been made. The prisoner is James Dawse, and some of the property stolen from yesterday's burglary is traced to him. The clue was blood. Night Watchman McCourt had seen a man who looked like a burglar, and, through him, Dawse was arrested by Calverley. In the course of one of the burglaries, a window had been broken, and the robber had cut his hand so badly that there were blood stains on the glass. When Dawse was arrested, he wore gloves, and he refused to remove them. An attempt was made to remove the gloves, but with several of the crimes recently committed.

RY CONTINUES.
Increase in Number of Firms Signing Exclusive Contracts.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Before the Tobacco Commission to-day, M. E. Davis, President of the American Tobacco Company of Canada, presented a statement, showing that there had been a large increase in the number of wholesalers, who had signed the exclusive contracts in the last two years. The company tried to introduce evidence to show that such contracts were common in many other lines of business, but Judge McTavish thought the scope of the inquiry should not be widened to that extent. Four small manufacturers testified that, since these contracts came into force, their business had either declined or had become unprofitable, by reason of the extra cost of selling, owing to the necessity of employing more travelers, etc.

TRADE WITHIN THE EMPIRE.
Should Be the Motto of the Hour, Says Sir William Mulock.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—Sir William Mulock addressed the Ottawa Board of Trade to-night on trade with South Africa. He referred to the recent colonial conference, and said that if Britain would give even a small preference to the rest of the empire would fall in line.

DIED UNDER CHRISTIAN SCIENCE.
No Physician Was Called in, The Patient Had Typhoid.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Miss Louise Hope of Evanston, Ill., who has lived here for almost a month, and who has been under treatment by a Christian Scientist healer, died to-night. Miss Hope is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hope, and was the first of the First National Bank of Chicago. She came here on Oct. 17, intending to act as bridesmaid for her former school chum, Miss Ethel H. Bogart, the daughter of Dr. Samuel A. Bogart. While the wedding preparations were going on, Miss Hope became ill, and remained at Dr. Bogart's house until her death. No physician of the regular school was called in until a short while before Miss Hope died, but the patient, a portion of the time of her illness, has been in the hands of Mrs. Ellen Brown Lincoln, a Christian Scientist healer, who said to-night that Miss Hope had suffered from typhoid fever. The parents of Miss Hope are Christian Scientists, and they gave directions that their daughter should receive medical attention, if she desired, but she preferred the Christian Science treatment.

ROMANCE OF BRANTFORD GIRL.
Eloped With a Famous Sprinter and is Happily Wedded.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Nov. 12.—The elopement and marriage of Asa J. Townsend, nationally famous as a sprinter and general athlete, has just taken place. Townsend's home is in this city, but he spends very little time here.

NEW STOCK DID WELL.
Lake of Woods Put on Market and 1500 Shares Sold.

Montreal, Nov. 12.—The Lake of the Woods Milling Company's stock was quoted for the first time this morning at 110 cents, and it is believed that it should have been put upon such a bad market. The stock did handsomely, however, and under heavy investment orders some 1500 shares were put thru at 105 to 110.

HORSE THIEF CAPTURED.
Bowmanville, Nov. 12.—A sorrel mare, stolen from Henry Marks, Dunbarton, was identified here to-day by John Marks, while being driven thru town by a man who gave his name as Albert Denton of Albany, N.Y. The man, when questioned about the horse, made a dash for the fields, but he was followed by William Clinie, bus driver, and Marks, and taken to the police office, where he was locked up.

STUART'S SON WILL SUIT.
Ottawa, Nov. 12.—William Stuart, arrested for uttering counterfeit notes, appeared before Recorder Champagne in Hull this morning and pleaded guilty. The case was adjourned until the 18th inst.

Definite Test of the Oil Gusher in Raleigh Township by Experts and Operators.

Dropped Twice as Many Pheasants as His Royal Uncle.

Sandringham, England, Nov. 12.—Emperor William today proved his prowess as a crack shot. Clad in a light green hunting suit, he kept three loaders busier than they had ever been in their lives. King Edward, the Prince of Wales, Count Wolf-Meternich, the German Ambassador, and the other members of the shooting party who accompanied the Emperor are all good shots, but twice as many pheasants fell to Emperor William's gun as to those of the others. The large crowd who had come to witness today's drive, which was the biggest one arranged for the royal visit, had an excellent view of the sport and their after-birds dropped before the unerring aim of the German Emperor. The spectators openly expressed their astonishment and admiration, much to the Emperor's amusement. The day's bag was one of the biggest on record.

GRAND TRUNK MAY BUY IT WANTS A LINE TO PACIFIC

Senator Cox and Other Capitalists Acting in Concert With Railway Looking To the Purchase of the Mackenzie & Mann System—Would Build From North Bay to Port Arthur

The policy of the Grand Trunk would be to utilize its Toronto and North Bay branch and build a line from North Bay to Port Arthur, passing some distance from the Canadian Pacific and following the Mackenzie & Mann system to the Pacific Ocean. I believe I have discovered that Hon. Mr. Blair favors the purchase of the Canadian Northern by the Grand Trunk, although Mackenzie & Mann do not seem to be too anxious to dispose of their railway system.

Up to the present time Senator Cox has taken a more lively interest in Mackenzie & Mann's system than any other capitalist. Senator Cox and Mr. Mackenzie have met at Ottawa quite recently and have likewise had interviews in Montreal with Mr. James Ross and that the Grand Trunk is ready to enter into the arrangement.

MASAGNI LOOKS TO ROME.
Asks the Italian Government to Protect Him From Vexatious Treatment in America.

Rome, Nov. 12.—According to The Tribuna, Italy proposes to make an international matter of the arrest in Boston, Mass., of Masagni. The Tribuna says: "Masagni has been stripped Premier Zanardelli requesting the intervention of the Italian government to protect him from the vexatious treatment of which he says he has been a victim in America. Signor Zanardelli replied to the musician, assuring him of the interest taken in his case by the government and inquiring for an explanation, which he gave in a report from the Italian embassy at Washington before acting in the Masagni affair. United States Ambassador Meyer has not been asked with members of the Foreign Office the charge of apathy brought by Masagni against the Italian Consul at Boston is regarded here as without justification, and an outcome of the musician's ignorance of the fact that an Italian citizen in the United States is entirely subject to American laws."

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BANKERS ARE IN CONCLAVE

Condition of Business in the Dominion is Everything That Could Be Desired.

ADDRESSED BY PREMIER ROSS

Some Interesting Extracts From the Report of the American Bankers' Association.

All the strong banking institutions of the Dominion are represented at the present annual meeting in Toronto of the Canadian Bankers' Association. The session of the organization will continue through to-day and promises to be of the greatest importance to the banking fraternity generally.

The first session was held yesterday morning. It was opened at the legislative chamber. Among the prominent out-of-town members at the meeting were: Thomas Fyfe, Montreal; D. R. Laird, Campbellton, N.B.; H. Sticksman, Montreal; W. J. Prendergast, Montreal; George Burn, Bank of Ottawa, Ottawa; E. S. Clouston, general manager, Bank of Montreal, Montreal; E. L. Thorne, Halifax; James Elliott, Montreal; F. H. Matheson, Montreal; Thos. McDougall, Quebec; Chas. Bogert, Montreal; G. Hague, Montreal; W. Molson, Montreal, president of the association, and A. R. Doble, Montreal.

Secretary Knight was president, and the business was largely confined to routine affairs of the association. It was a general meeting and all questions of business were in order. A large number of the Toronto bankers were present. W. M. McPherson addressed the meeting, among others.

The meeting was not public. The general expressions were along the lines of the singular prosperity all over the Dominion. Different members asserted that the past year had been profitable in many ways and new banks were being organized. The condition of the banks in the Dominion was everything that could be desired.

Will organize Bankers' Club. Mr. E. L. Desautels of the Bank of Commerce announced that there would be a meeting this afternoon at McConek's of all the local bankers with the purpose of organizing a club exclusively of bankers. The proposition was submitted to the different executive boards of all the banks of Toronto. This proposition has been discussed for some time and gentlemen interested are inclined to think it can be put thru easily.

After an all-day session the bankers met around the banquet table at 7.30 at the Toronto Club. The dinner was a splendid affair. The guests of honor and responded to a toast. HAMILTON NEWS

MRS. BOOKER IS PRESIDENT

About 250 Members of Women's Baptist Missionary Society Meet in Hamilton.

AFTER COUNTY COURT CLERKSHIP

Three Liberals Already in the Field—Stuart of S. H. Ghent—Stuart Boys Better.

Hamilton, Nov. 12.—The annual convention of the Women's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Society of Ontario opened here this morning. About 250 delegates were present. Mrs. T. M. Harris presided. An address of welcome was read by Mrs. St. Clair Balfour, and was replied to by Miss Martha Rogers, Toronto. Satisfactory reports were read. The election of officers took place this afternoon. The results are as follows: President, Mrs. Booker, Aylmer; vice-presidents, Mrs. Freeman and Mrs. Aris, Toronto; Board of management: Mrs. McKay and Mrs. Parker, Toronto; Miss Brody, Grimsby; Mrs. Dodson, Paris. The evening missionary address was given by Miss McLaurin, India, and Miss Grace Scott, China.

Stinson Bank Business.

Matters in connection with the James Stinson estate are proceeding slowly. In the United States government appeal against the finding in favor of Stinson in the Wisconsin lands suit, the receiver, M. S. Bright of Superior City, sought to have the estate placed under a receiver, but Church, McCurdy & Sherman, the Chicago lawyers, who are acting for the receiver, have been successful in arranging for the appeal to be heard next month. In a letter from Chicago, received by J. A. Culham to-day, further interesting information is given. The receiver filed a special report on the claims sent in, which represent about one-third of them. Of the one-third, which included most of the Hamilton claims, the receiver allowed the greater part of them, being those put in since Feb. 17, 1900, the date of his appointment. If the estate carries all right and there is money enough to pay more than the claims, the interest will be paid.

The firm also refers to a matter of vital importance to those who have not agreed to attend to their affairs. At the public meeting held some time ago most of the bank depositors retained Church & Co. to act for them. The lawyers advise Mr. Culham that where they have not got retainers they have threatened French commerce.

DEPUTY ADVISES FOLLOWING EXAMPLE OF GREAT BRITAIN.

Paris, Nov. 12.—Eugene Etienne, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, speaking at a banquet at the Union Coloniale this evening, declared that the forming and operation of the international Mercantile Marine Company very gravely threatened French commerce and especially France's trade with her colonies. He said the best means of meeting this danger was to abolish the thousand and one formalities at present fettering France's colonial trade and to examine the example of Great Britain as exemplified in the case of the Cunard Steamship Company and to submit the Company to the General Transatlantic Conference to enable it to meet successfully the competition of the Morgan steamship company.

COLUMBIA PROFESSOR DEAD.

New York, Nov. 12.—Professor Nicholas Rod of Columbia University died to-day at his home in this city, of pneumonia. He was head of the department of physics, and held the position for thirty-eight years. In 1851 he was a member of the National Academy of Sciences of the American Philosophical Society of Philadelphia, and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences of Boston.

Universities and Their Students.

What is the university doing for them? Not what it ought to do, says the educational reformer. It does nearly what it might do both for them and for the nation generally. Perhaps he is right. But is it doing something. It is storing their minds with the "enchantments" of the middle ages; it is fascinating them, as fascinated the hard-headed millionaire who recently linked his name with Oxford by the spell of beauty and antiquity and time-honored associations. Educationally speaking, there may be something to be said for the university, much that is lacking in an Oxford or Cambridge career. Some of the students are of the type who object in coming to the university is social rather than educational; to have a good time, get a degree with as little trouble as possible, and go out into life with the hallmark of a university man. For these and to those the university reformer preaches in vain. But even these are being educated in a very real sense. The life of the university, with its varied companionships, its free intercourse among men from every kind of home and with every variety of prospective life, and even its temptations to idleness or extravagance, is a training for the larger world. No one, however much he has wasted his time and substance, leaves the university entirely uneducated.

Carry Lord Cranborne.

Lord Cranborne, who enters on his 42nd year to-day (Oct. 23), is a striking example of the superiority that follows from the exercise of care and discernment in the choice of a father. If he had not so wisely selected the Marquis of Salisbury it is absolutely certain that he would not be Under Secretary of Foreign Affairs to-day, and it is even doubtful whether he would be an M.P. at all. He has no platform presence, he makes no pretence to oratorical eloquence, his contributions are a series of loose, jerky sentences, his diplomatic knowledge is limited, and his blazings and numerous, but all these points count for nothing in comparison with the strong character displayed at the outset of his mortal career. His younger brother, Lord Hugh, is the "brains" man of the family, but in our "governing families" it is the heir apparent, however innocent of brains, who must always be pushed to the front.

REPEAL OF MINEWORKERS' DEMANDS

Operators Make It Evident They Will Resist Attempts to Secure Union Recognition.

WAGES BETTER THAN IN OTHER LABOR DENY UNIONISM IMPROVES THE MORALS AND DISCIPLINE OF ITS MEMBERS.

Scranton, Pa., Nov. 12.—The answer of the independent operators of the mine workers was made public to-night.

In response to the demand for an increase in wages they say that the present wages are such as to enable the diligent and skilful to earn more per hour than any other class of labor, skilled or unskilled, in the town in which their mines are located, and amply sufficient to allow him not only to maintain an American standard of living and educate his children, but to lay aside something for his old age. That some miners' wages are small, it is stated, is because they choose to exercise their option to work only a few hours a day. In answering the contention that mining is extremely dangerous and unhealthy and tends to shorten life, the operators set forth a petition recently circulated in the interests of a candidate for mine inspector, which contained the names of 95 employees of one mine, 66 of whom were more and in the mine for 20 years or more and 29 for 40 years or more and 5 for 50 years or more.

The demand for the weighing of coal instead of by the fictitious ton of 2750 or 3000 pounds, is characterized as a thinly disguised attempt to increase wages. The answer asserts that 2750 pounds of coal as it comes from the mine produces a 2240-pound ton of prepared coal.

Regarding the declaration of the mine workers that they will not accept of the operators' offer to improve the morals and discipline of their members, the operators say that when applied to the miners' union it would be tantamount to a declaration of war. They introduce evidence showing that prior to the advent of the United Mine Workers of America any miner who attempted to exercise his constitutional right to sell his own labor for what he could get, was liable to imprisonment and beatings during the past few months show that the teachings of the United Mine Workers have brought about such moral obliquity that its members believed themselves justified in the acts of these atrocious acts. We believe we will be able to prove such tremendous losses of life and property by the use of methods of this particular union as to convince your honorable committee that the repeal of the laws which may contribute to its continued existence."

Resist to the Utmost.

WILL HOLD HER COLUMBES.
Portugal Will Not Give Up Territory
to Germany or Britain.

New York, Nov. 12.—The Herald's Paris
correspondent says: With reference to the
report of Germany and Britain acquiring
Portuguese East Africa, M. de Souza Rosa,
the Portuguese minister to France, in an
interview said:

"There is not one word of truth in the
report, and believe me, if I consent to make
such a categorical declaration it is not be-
cause similar reports with regard to the
Portuguese colonies deserve a contradiction.
On the contrary, they refute themselves,
their very extravagance is sufficient proof
of their insincerity, but I contradict them
emphatically and unequivocally solely for
the purpose of putting the public upon their
guard, as I am convinced such reports are
put into circulation for speculative pur-
poses."

"Portugal has not the slightest intention
of parting with her colonial possessions,
nor any portion of them, either to Britain
or to any other power."
"Furthermore, to prevent any possibility
of error or misunderstanding, I may assure
you that the British government has never
made any proposition, directly or indirectly,
concerning Portuguese territory in Africa."

KEEP OUT STANDARD OIL.
British Bar Company From Pros-
pecting in Burnham.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Upon complaint
of representatives of the Standard Oil Com-
pany that the English government has pre-
vented that country from prospecting in
the oil fields of Burnham, Mr. Hay, Sec-
retary of State, has directed Ambassador
Clouston, at London, to inquire of the British
government the cause.
