



LONDON, July 24.-James E. Sullivan, the United States Commissioner to the Olympic games, has received the following letter from the secretary of the Amateur Athletic Association in reply to the American protest against the decision given yesterday in the 400 metre race, which was declared void on the allegation that J. C. Carpenter, Cornell University, had fouled Halswell, the English runner:
"I have the honor to inform you that the judges have considered the running of the 400 metre race, and after taking the full evidence of the umpires, together with what they saw them-selves, they declare that the race is void, and that it shall be re-run to-morrow, Saturday, at noon, without J. C. Carpenter, he being disqualified. In order to avoid any further difficulty the judges order that the course be stringed, and they have decided further that the matter of Carpenter's running be reported to the Amateur

Athletic Association." Several of the papers assert that a close watch was set on the track because in the Olympic games at Athens n 1906 Halswell was made the vic-tim of almost identical methods. Both the leading sporting papers employ the strongest language in con-nection with the incident.

NOBEL PRIZE WINNER DEAD. Sir William Randal Cremer Passes From Scene.

LONDON, July 24.—One of the earliest advocates of peace among nations, Sir William Randal Cremer, member of parliament from Hagger-ston since 1885 and for 37 years secre-tary of the International Arbitration tary of the International Arbitration League, is dead.

mentary conferences, which have met since 1838 at Rome, Paris, London, Berne, The Hague, Budapest, Brussels, Christiana, Vienna and St. Louis. The Nobel Peace Prize, amounting to \$40,000, which he received in 1903, he handed over to the International Arbitration League as an endowment. Last year he was knighted.

At the ceremony of investiture before the King on July 15, Mr. Cremer created something of a sensation by refusing to wear court dress. As the court costume included a small court sword he would not don it. He pleadsword he would not don it. He plead-ed that his conscience would not allow him to wear a weapon of any sort. The King therefore granted him per-mission to be knighted in a frock coat.
