

DULUTH, Minn., Aug. 5.—All previous records in grain handling from this port were surpassed in the crop year ended July 31, last, according to figures of the board of trade. During that period 145,184,930 bushels of all grains were received, compared with 144,552,441 in the previous record season of 1915-16.

ENCOURAGE EXPORT OF CANADIAN TOYS

Model Government Collection Secured for Display at Exhibition.

BOUGHT IN ENGLAND

Efforts to Induce Duke of Connaught to Preside Over the Opening Ceremonies.

In order to encourage the manufacture here and the export to England of the type of toys most favored there and in other sections of the empire, the Right Hon. Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce, has arranged with Sir Richard Burbidge managing director of the great Harrod Stores, for a collection of the toys most in demand abroad. They were selected by one of Sir Richard's buyers, an expert on toys. They have already been shipped to Canada and will form part of the display in the government building at the Exhibition.

The collection includes toys made in England, Germany, Austria, Russia, Japan and the United States, and as a result of their addition to the toy display, Mr. Watson Griffin, who has charge of the exhibit for the government, has written the Exhibition officials asking for more space in addition to the entire wing of the government

building already allotted to the toy show.

Duke to Attend. Every effort is being made to induce the Duke of Connaught to open the Exhibition, the last during his stay in Canada. His royal highness has already promised to be here for one or more days, but owing to the great pressure of other demands upon his time, it is not yet certain whether he can preside over the opening ceremonies on Monday, Aug. 28. President Noel Marshall has the matter in hand and will go to Ottawa, likely on Tuesday. Every governor-general since Dufferin has opened the Exhibition and in most cases they have been on hand for the inaugural day in the final year of their regime, to leave a parting message. No stone is being left unturned to induce the Duke of Connaught to follow this precedent.

OPPOSED TO SALE.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—Some of the Danish Conservative papers have opened a violent attack upon the government over the treaty with the United States for the sale of the Danish West Indies, according to a Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

SENECA MYSTERY STILL UNSOLVED

Report of Discovery of Yacht is Apparently Without Foundation.

TAKEN BY DESERTERS?

Actions of Khaki-Clad Trio Are Viewed With Suspicion.

Unless a boat abandoned at a place opposite Niagara-on-the-Lake is identified as the missing yacht "Seneca" which disappeared from her moorings at the R.C.Y.C. dock late Friday night the mystery surrounding the departure of the craft is no nearer solution this morning.

The Norwegian caretaker of the boat at R.C.Y.C. left at 5:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Niagara, to learn the identity of the boat supposedly deserted there by the thieves. Whether this yacht is the "Seneca" is problematical.

The detective department which on Saturday, in conjunction with life-saving crews and the police, instituted a search for the missing yacht, declared yesterday that the boat opposite Niagara was not the Seneca.

Jack Gordon, a member of the club, called his yacht Paramis into Youngstown, N.Y., yesterday, it was stated, and its resemblance to the Seneca caused the officials there who had been notified of the theft to believe it was the missing boat. It is the report was circulated that the Seneca had been found.

Whether Mr. Gordon's boat is the one which the Norwegian caretaker has gone to identify as a result of the mistake is another confusing detail of the search. It is contended at the club quarters that Mr. Gordon's yacht is not the one abandoned opposite Niagara.

The only theory which has been advanced so far as the reason for the theft of the yacht is that the three soldiers used it as a means to desert from the army. Attached to the club say that three soldiers on Friday afternoon hired a motor launch at the clubhouse at Centre Island and rowed to the club's dock, where their actions in approaching the different boats stationed there were regarded suspiciously.

One of them, during the course of the afternoon, vouchsafed the information that he had been to Norway seven times, and it is presumed that he was the only member of the trio who had seamanship ability.

The Seneca was last seen about midnight Friday by Capt. Chapman of the life-saving crew as she was moving thru the eastern gap. Capt. Chapman was unable to catch a glimpse of these aboard her.

The "Seneca" is probably the most widely known of the club's yachts. It lifted the Canada Cup in 1907 and lost it the following year to the Patricia. Wholly in ignorance of the leading role of a profound mystery which his craft is playing, Commodore Aemilius Lewis, owner of the yacht, which has a value at \$7,000, is in Boston, having left for that city several days ago. No wide scope of territory has been covered by the detective department in notifying the police of different lake towns that word of the missing boat is expected momentarily and with it a solution of the mysterious disappearance.

HURRIED CALL TO MEN AT BORDEN

Report of Bush Fire That Threatened Lisle Proved False.

MANY ORDERED OUT

Seventy-Five Rushed to Village on Wild-Goose Chase.

CAMP BORDEN, Aug. 6.—A fire in the neighborhood of the Village of Lisle early this afternoon was responsible for another hurried call to the military fire fighters, the message which came to Brigadier-General Logie stating that the village was in serious danger from bush fires nearby.

There was a particularly large number of visitors to the camp today, the morning trains being crowded to the vestibules with relatives and friends of the soldiers. Everywhere around the main part of the camp picnic parties were to be seen during the day, and in some battalions the visitors were entertained in the officers' messes.

Not so many of the soldiers were away on week-end leave as usual, and there was none of the trouble of last week in getting the visitors away or the men on leave back to camp.

BRITISH WORKINGMEN CALL FOR REPRISALS

Execution of Capt. Fryatt Inspires Big London Demonstration.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—One of the biggest demonstrations by workingmen that has occurred during the war took place in Trafalgar Square today. The great gathering demanded reprisals for the execution of Capt. Fryatt of the British steamer Brusels by the Germans in Belgium.

SETTLEMENT IN SIGHT FOR STRIKE AT NEW YORK

Mayor Mitchell Holds Satisfactory Conference and May End Dispute.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Settlement of the street car strike, which resulted again tonight in the complete abandonment of all surface car service, is probable tomorrow, according to a statement issued by Mayor Mitchell. The announcement came after a day of conferences. At these meetings, it was said, a basis of settlement had been reached which would be submitted tomorrow to the board of directors of the New York Railways Co. and to the striking employees.

Other British Regiments Also to Fore With Australians.

A NOTABLE SUCCESS

Germans Used Liquid Fire, But Failed in Three Attacks.

(Continued from Page one.)

one of the attacks, by the use of liquid fire, he temporarily forced us back along one of the trenches we had captured, but later we recovered all but some forty yards of the ground thus lost.

"In the other attack the enemy was repulsed with loss. In the afternoon we made some progress along the trenches east of Pozieres, in the direction of Martinpuich. Considerable artillery activity was reported near Carency and Loos.

"South of St. Eloi we raided enemy trenches, causing many casualties. The improved weather enabled useful work by our artillery in connection with the operations, and we destroyed several gun emplacements. In fighting along the Somme front in northern France last night, the British made an additional slight advance at High Wood, according to the official announcement this afternoon.

"The Germans actively shelled various portions of the front during the night, says the statement which follows:

"The enemy's artillery was active during the night, shelling various areas on and behind the front between the Ancre and the Somme. A little further progress was made by us at High Wood.

"Northeast of Arras the enemy apparently alarmed by one of our patrols, opened a heavy bombardment which lasted 14 minutes. The situation is unchanged.

Extended Gains Made.

The British official communication, issued at 10 o'clock last night, reads: "Including the capture of the German trenches reported this morning, during the last two days, pushed forward our line north and west of Pozieres some 400 to 600 yards over a front of about 5000 yards.

"Troops from Australia, Kent, Surrey and Sussex participated in this operation and consolidated the position won, despite the shell fire, which was especially heavy near the Focieres-Bapaume road.

"Our artillery shelled La Courcellette and Miramont, causing large explosions in both places. Ten gun emplacements and three ammunition stores were destroyed. The enemy attempted to seize a crater near Souches, but was repulsed with bombs.

"There was some artillery activity between St. Eloi and St. Eloi, where the enemy exploded a small mine, but no movement followed.

"The enemy's aircraft showed little enterprise. Eight of their machines were destroyed when engaged by three of ours.

"An enemy patrolplane Saturday morning, near the coast of Flanders, after a long chase, was forced to fight by one of our seaplanes and was destroyed.

SIR ARTHUR MARKHAM IS CALLED BY DEATH

He Was Member of British Commons and Wealthy Mine Owner.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—The death of Sir Arthur Basil Markham, M.P. for the Mansfield division of Nottinghamshire and wealthy coal mine owner, is announced.

Sir Arthur had been ill for months and told friends recently that he had six months more to live. He suffered a sudden relapse yesterday morning. He was born August 25, 1856.

BRILLIANT OFFENSIVE.

PARIS, Aug. 6.—A despatch to La Liberte, dated north of France, says: "The latest British advance north of Pozieres was the result of a brilliant offensive begun on the night of Aug. 4-5, after an artillery preparation of great intensity. Since the Australians captured Pozieres, the enemy has not ceased his furious counter-attacks against the village, in the outskirts of which he had succeeded in keeping some ground.

"The British commander resolved on Friday to clear the village by taking the principal supports of the second line of the German defense, made up of a series of small works extending from Bapaume road to that of Thiepval, on a front of about three kilometers.

Began at Daybreak. "The bombardment began about daybreak and continued unceasingly until night. It destroyed the defenses, leveled entrenchments and rendered shelters uninhabitable. At 11 o'clock a night, the work of the artillery having been deemed sufficient, the order to attack was passed to the units grouped in the Village of Pozieres. While the Surrey and Kent troops pushed on in an assault against the positions on the Bapaume road, the west of Pozieres, they carried also a large work situated at the intersection of the Thiepval and Moquet roads and continued their victorious progress east of the Leipzig redoubt in the direction of Thiepval.

"The operation, in the opinion of observers, was one of the most brilliant since the beginning of the offensive on the Somme, and was carried out with rapidity and certainty which was aided by the precision of the fire of the British batteries.

Little Resistance. The British troops advanced thru entrenchments, which had been completely destroyed and machines and defenders buried, and at certain points not the slightest resistance was encountered.

The Germans, moreover, seemed to have been taken by surprise by this attack, on which they had evidently not counted at so early a date. Decided hesitation was observed in the decisions of the German commander, which resulted in delaying the bringing up of considerable reinforcements. More than four hours after the British had attained their objective counter-attacks occurred, but they were easily repulsed.


man salient," said an officer who suffered in the Ypres salient. "I feel avenged. We have never had a worse one."


