RUSSIANS LOSE 3000.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 31.—Lieut.-General Sakharoff, telegraphing to the general staff on the conclusion of vestereday's 16 hours ipiting around Liaoyang, estimates that the Russian casualties thruout the day were 3000. The battle ende at 3 o'clock last night when many positions occupied by the Japanese were retaken and again held by the Russians. The report from Lieut.-Gen. Sakharoff is as follows:

## COLONIAL HOUSE FOR \$3,500



The house is purely Colonial in style, with heavy columns and all detail in Colonial style, both inside and out. The price given is for frame; would look very well built in brick, and to use Colonial brick for it would add to its

c.st about \$350.00. It is also very suitable for stone; its cest in stone depends on the price of stone.
 This house can be built for less in many parts of the country, as it is very simp e in style, though very stylish and fine in its eutlines. Where building is cheap, that is, both material and labor, it could be built easily for \$3000, or even \$2800. The estimate is for good plumbing and hot air heating. Hot water heating would cost about \$150.00 addition. It has a wide, fine porch on two sides; a vestibule and excellent entrance hall running all the way across the house, with easy staircase back. There is a parler and sitting room with open fire-place for coal or wood, as preferred, and Colonial mantels. These have sliding doors to hall, as has also the dining-room, which is a very pretty room with bay and open fire-place in brick. There is a lobby from kitchen with a wash-basin, and the back stairs go up from here.

The pantry is a fine one and connects dining room and kitchen. Wash-tubs and servants' toilet are in the cemented cellar. On the second floor are four excellent bedroems with old-fashioned closets, a linen closet and a
