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DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY.

THE Twenty-fifth Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society was held in St. Paul's schoolroom, on Wednesday evening, the 3rd of February, 1869, and was very largely and respectably attended. The chair was taken by the Archdeacon. After singing and prayer, the Chairman addressed the meeting to the following effect:—

Ladies and Gentlemen ;

We should have been pleased to see the Administrator presiding at our meeting this evening, but in consequence of indisposition he is unable to attend. I must, therefore, ask your kind indulgence in my endeavour to perform the duties that devolve on the chairman ; and I would also solicit your favorable consideration on behalf of those appointed to move and second the resolutions.

The Report which will be read to you gives a detailed account of the work of the Church in our Island during the past year. Thus you will have an opportunity of hearing what has been done in your own parish, and also from the clergy generally what they believe to be the state of the Church in their several Missions. Combined effort is essential to the prosperity of any society, whether civil or religious. It is by united action, under God, that we must look for successful results in the work of our Diocesan Society. I cannot imagine a more pleasing duty for members of a Christian Church than

to take a deep and lively interest in its prosperity, and to extend the benefits of their common faith to others in less favored circumstances. We are sensible of, and I trust we shall always be ready to accord, our gratitude to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society, for their continued aid to our Island Church; but whilst we express our grateful acknowledgments to those two religious societies in the parent kingdom for their fostering care, we must not lose sight of the fact that their aim is to plant the tree and cherish its growth, leaving its future culture to those who eat of its fruit and enjoy its shelter. I regret to state that the work of retrenchment has already commenced, so far as it applies to the S. P. G., and I am informed that it will be general in the current year. I hope, however, that the members of our Church will awake to a sense of their Christian responsibility in this respect, that they may sustain the good work when these societies withdraw their aid. It is somewhat remarkable that people in general are more willing to relieve distressed humanity than to contribute to God's cause, and it has been often found that the claims of our poorer brethren meet with a readier response than the claims of Christ's Church. But whilst the one ought to be done, the other ought not to be left undone. In looking over the financial returns of the past year I regret to notice a diminution in the contributions from Charlottetown, whilst there has been an improvement in nearly all the other parishes. As your liberality to religious objects is so well known and acknowledged, I hope this year (D. V.) that Charlottetown will not only have resumed its former position, but that there will be an increase in its contributions to the funds of our D. C. S.

Let us look upon ourselves as stewards of God's treasury; that all we have rightly belongs to Him, who will one day require an account of the talents committed to our trust, and the Master says to each of us, "occupy till I come." My

Christian friends, let us regard everything in the light of the Judgment Day, and how lightly we shall estimate worldly treasures when our spirits hang in undecided balance between time and eternity! Let us so live and act that we may be welcomed with "well done."

I hope that our proceedings this evening will be leavened with the spirit of Christian love; that every sentiment may be an echo from the golden harp; and that all of us will be deeply impressed with the religious importance of the object we are assembled here to promote—the interest of our Diocesan Church Society—the prosperity of a branch of the Church of the living God.

The Report and the financial statement were then read by the Secretary, the Rev. D. B. Parnter, after which the following resolutions, having been ably proposed and seconded, were unanimously adopted:—

Moved by the Rector of Charlottetown, seconded by the Hon. T. H. Haviland;

That the Report now read be adopted, and printed under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by Rev. Theo. Richey, seconded by F. Brecken, Esquire;

That this meeting desires to express its sense of deep obligation to the Venerable S. P. G., and Colonial and Continental C. S., for their continued liberality in support of the Church in this Island.

Moved by Hon. Joseph Hensley, seconded by E. J. Hodgson, Esquire;

That the many mercies vouchsafed to us by Almighty God, during the past year, should encourage us to increased efforts in His cause.

Moved by Rev. J. W. Forsythe, seconded by Charles Palmer, Esquire;

That the thanks of this meeting are due to the collectors for their valuable aid in the interests of the Society; and that

the following gentlemen be the Executive Committee for the ensuing year. (For list of names of Executive Committee, see first page.)

Moved by the Hon. T. H. Haviland, and seconded by Hon. Joseph Hensley ;

That a vote of thanks be presented to the Committee of ladies who superintended the bazaar last summer, in aid of the funds for building St. Peter's Free Church, Charlottetown.

A liberal collection was made in aid of the funds, during which the Chairman offered some closing remarks. A hymn was then sung and the meeting dismissed with the benediction.

REPORT.

The Reports from the various Parishes and Missionary Stations throughout the Island give so full and favorable an account of Church matters generally, that the Committee appointed to prepare the annual summary would refer to them, rather than anticipate them by their own remarks.

The Executive Committee have endeavored so to appropriate the funds at their disposal as best to carry out the recognized objects of the Society. It would appear by the Report of 1858, that the amount raised in this Island as subscriptions to this Society, amounted to £90 16s. 10d. Our Financial Secretary is prepared to state that this year his receipts exceed £170. But shall we take credit to ourselves that we, in this particular, have done our duty; or that what we have given for the cause of God and the Church has kept equal pace with the increasing wealth of our people throughout the Island?

The effects of the yearly decrease in the grant from the Society for the propagation of the Gospel have already been felt by one of the missionary clergymen stationed here. In three or four of the reports which have been read at these annual meetings of the Society, the note of alarm has been sounded, and we have been warned that the fostering care, so long extended to this Island by the religious societies of England would gradually be withdrawn. The time cannot be very far distant when the Church will be thrown entirely upon her own resources; and hence it was that the Committee

have suggested, that Committees should be formed in the different sections of each Parish "to collect subscriptions towards an Endowment Fund"; that each district should have its quarterly meeting; that the subject of the Church's need and missionary operations might be adverted to; and every means adopted to inspire our people generally with a lively interest in the prosperity of our Church.

The Committee will detain the meeting no longer with this portion of the Annual Report, but, with the expression of gratitude to God, that the several clergymen have been spared and blessed in their labors, they proceed with the report from

CHARLOTTETOWN.

The ministers of St. Paul's report, that during the past year there have been 16 marriages, 35 baptisms, and 25 burials. The number of public services that have been held is 344, and upwards of 1100 pastoral and other visits paid. The services at the jail have been continued; the prisoners visited, and tracts distributed among them. The afternoon meetings at the West End School have also been regularly held.

The Library now contains 1596 volumes,—there being an addition, during the past year, of 30 of the most useful, as well as latest, publications of the day; 95 books—such as bibles, prayer books, and hymn books—have been awarded to the most diligent and attentive of the Sunday-school scholars, to the two best of whom, through the kindness of some genuine friends, two silver medals have been presented.

A suitable Hymnal, arranged for the different seasons, has been in use since last July, being the new and enlarged edition published by "The Christian Knowledge Society," and recommended by the Bishop; to which an appendix of two hundred selected hymns, adapted to the services of the Church, have

been added for local use, thus making it a more complete and useful book.

The afternoon service has been made more suitable to the young than heretofore, who are instructed in the proper Scripture lesson, and questioned monthly on the Catechism. In this service they are trained to take their part in the services of the Church,—singing its hymns and repeating its responses.

The number of district visitors—who have kindly volunteered their services in visiting and relieving the poor and distributing tracts, and whose labours cannot fail to be a benefit to those they systematically visit—has increased from four or five to twenty.

The debt on the schoolroom has been discharged; but a small sum still remains due on the adjoining library or classroom.

The attendance at the regular services of the Church is good, and the sacramental collections for the poor have, in several instances, been larger than those taken up on similar occasions in former years,—so that in many ways the Ministers of the Parish have to report progress, and feel encouraged in the prosecution of their labors.

The old Bog School, which was found inconveniently small, owing to the increasing number of children under Miss Harvie's superintendence, has been sold, and a site provided in a more eligible part, at the corner of Kent Street and Rochfort Square, on which, by the liberality of Christian friends, a large and handsome structure has been erected.

MILTON.

THE ARCHDEACON, in reviewing the state of the Church in his mission during the past year, is thankful to Almighty God in being permitted to report its moral and spiritual progress. Judging from the congregation—their marked attention and liberality—he would say, that the well-appointed services of our Church are appreciated by a kind and grateful people. Whilst the attendance at his four stations is good, there is a decided improvement at the Sunday evening service at the Temperance Hall, which is generally well filled, sometimes crowded. The earnestness in listening to the read and preached word, with the heartiness in singing—would it could be added in *responding* also—is most cheering. The increase of the number of communicants, from ten to sixty-six; the prosperity of the Sunday-schools, together with continued support to Church objects, and the many proofs of goodwill and affection to their clergyman, encourage him to hope that the work of Divine Grace is exercising its blessed influence in the hearts and lives of his parishioners. May the great and good Shepherd add to his Church daily the saved, whose religion consists, not in faith only, but in good works also, the fuel of the spirit without which all Christian profession is but a name.

In the year that has just closed, he has performed 166 full services; visited his parishioners 560 times,—adopting the rule established at one of our clerical meetings, “that no

visit is to be considered pastoral unless a word has been spoken for God." In prosecuting his clerical duties, he has been enabled by Divine help to travel 2833 miles in the year, which has involved much fatigue both to man and horse.

During the last three years, Milton and Rustico have contributed to the Diocesan Society's funds £77 12s. 11d., being £25 8s. 3d. more than any Parish out of Charlottetown has given to that object during the same period. If all our people would awake to their Christian responsibility as stewards to whom God has entrusted talents to be employed by him, much more might be done for the cause.

The new Free Churches at Charlottetown and Alberton are progressing towards completion, and they will probably be ready for consecration at the Bishop's triennial visit in the summer. Thus two additional tents will be spread, in which, under God's blessing, we hope large and earnest congregations will be fed and strengthened with the scriptural teaching of our reformed and Apostolic Church; and he humbly prays, to use the words in our report of 1867, that "each may prove a birthplace of many a soul to God."

ST. ELEANOR'S.

THE Rector of St. Eleanor's and Summerside, in reporting to the Diocesan Church Society, begs to state that the usual routine of work has been carried on throughout the year. There have been three full services on Sundays; the Holy Communion has been administered fortnightly upon Sundays, and occasionally upon week days; Sunday-schools have been in operation at St. Eleanor's and Summerside, at Richmond and at Wilmot Creek; and the greater part of

nearly every week has been spent in the pastoral visitation of the several districts of the Parish,—the clergyman engaging the several families upon some religious subject and joining with them in a short service of reading and prayer. Scarcely does a day, thus spent, pass away without affording ample testimony to the benefit to the people attending this part of the missionary work. Cases of sickness or distress, which otherwise might not be known to the clergyman, are brought to his notice; doubts upon important religious matters are removed; careless persons, more frequently in this way than by a sermon, are stirred up to seek after a better way of life; the young and old are more interested in spiritual things; sympathy is enlisted in the work of the mission, while, on the whole, it is continually producing a better and more devout attendance upon the services of the Sanctuary and the Holy Table.

A good cabinet organ has been provided for our Sunday-school at St. Eleanor's, and a short time is to be spent weekly in teaching our little children something of Church music. They will thus have a new and useful attraction to attend the Sunday-school, and be better able to take their part in the solemn service of the earthly Sanctuary, and we trust be made more meet to join the choir of the Heavenly Temple when God is pleased to call them thither to sing forever the praises of their Creator.

The Rector adds, that in the prosecution of this work, he has had many grounds of encouragement, for which he cannot feel too thankful. The services at St. Eleanor's—especially the afternoon service—are better attended; the congregation at Summerside is gradually increasing in number and influence; the Sunday-school in the latter place is much improved; the congregation at Kensington has this year, for the first time, contributed a fair proportion to the salary of the minister; several new communicants have been added to the former number, and the people, as he has gone from house to house, have received him more as a son than a minister: and besides having paid the largest part of his salary, joined in presenting

him (in connection with the offertory on Christmas day) with the handsome sum of £57 in gold, accompanied by very kind and encouraging words on the part of each congregation.

PORT HILL.

THE Rev. Mr. Swabey regrets that he has nothing to report which will be particularly interesting to the Society. He would mention, however, that, for reasons doubtless satisfactory to themselves, the Committee of the S. P. G. have thought proper to reduce their annual grants to the mission of Port Hill and Lot 11; and he presumes that, for the future, any clergyman officiating here will receive £75 stg., instead of the £100 stg. paid to this Parish for the last twenty-two years. He is officially informed, that "Financial Pressure" is the cause of this reduction; and may mention that, to the best of his belief, his very small parish has been the only one in the Island in which this reduction has been made. It is supposed that the parishioners are in a position to make up the deficiency from "local sources," which is very far from being the case. It is quite clear from this and other facts which might be adduced, that if we wish the Church of our fathers to be maintained in its integrity in our midst, those among our fellow Churchmen who have means at their command must not only provide for their own, but cast their superfluity into the treasury of the Lord, remembering that they are but

stewards of the good things which they possess. Mr. Swabey adds, that, in conjunction with others, he has endeavored to shew long ago that the Church in this Island will be seriously affected unless an Endowment Fund be created.

In the past year, death has deprived them of two of their most influential parishioners, the Honorable James Yeo and Mrs. Yeo. They are not only sincerely mourned by the members of their own family, but they are a very great loss, in various points of view, not only to their minister, but to the Church generally in this neighborhood.

Our Sunday-schools are in a tolerably flourishing condition. Miss Annie Warburton, in particular, takes a very great interest in the one attached to St. Peter's Church, Lot 11; and there is no doubt that the young people under her care have received benefit from her intelligent and unremitting instruction. Unfortunately, these schools must of necessity be closed in the winter; but in this, as well as in other things, it would be well if the minister and people could always act and speak as under the immediate eye of Him who said, "She hath done what she could."

NEW LONDON.

The Rev. J. Cox reports, that by God's blessing he is enabled to speak favorably of his mission. More than a year has elapsed since he took charge of the mission of New London, and he can truly say, that he has endeavored not to neglect any means in his power to advance the spiritual interests of the Church and people. These efforts, he believes, have produced the effect of leading many to take a more lively interest in the great subject of religion; to be more frequent in their attendance on Divine worship, and more attentive to their religious duties. Services have been held regularly at the Parish Church, and at Burlington, Irishtown, on nearly every

Sunday; with special services on some holy-days, and occasional services in schools and private houses.

Sunday-schools have been organized and well maintained during the summer, especially the one at Burlington, conducted by Mr. W. J. Profit and Mr. W. P. Evans, the Church Wardens of St Stephen's Church. The congregation of that Church has raised the sum £6 for the purchase of Sunday-school books, which have added much to the interest and benefit of the school. During the summer, the congregations at both Churches were large and attentive, being partly composed of Presbyterians who unite with us in a friendly manner. Bible-classes have been maintained in different parts of the parish, and the attendance at Long River schoolhouse, especially, has been very creditable.

Much time has been occupied in visiting the sick and reading the Scriptures, with prayer, from house to house; and this he believes to be the great means of gaining the affections of the people, and of success in the work of the ministry. Books and tracts have also been distributed. Some necessary repairs have also been put on the parsonage; but much more needs to be done, which, if attended to immediately, would prevent further injury and expense. A good well has been dug and stoned, and the old schoolhouse on the Church grounds removed to the parsonage land, and is found to be a convenient acquisition. Nothing has yet been done towards repairing the old church, a difference of opinion existing whether to repair the old structure, or to build a new one. The graveyard has also had some labor expended on it.

GEORGETOWN.

The Rev. Mr. Richey reports, that the past year has been to his parish one of unprecedented affliction and sorrow—two wardens and three vestry-men having fallen by the hand of death, weakening sadly the little flock in this parish. The names of those whose familiar forms we miss from the ranks of the Church Militant are: Messrs. J. E. W. Alleyne, A. W. LeBrocq, F. P. Norton, James Hegggs and Thomas Owen, Esquire, our late Postmaster General. Mr. Richey, in company with Mr. Aldous, lately visited the Church in Murray Harbor, which they found in a state of great dilapidation, but containing several articles of church furniture in a state of good preservation, and which may be removed. Among others, there are thirty to forty good open seats, and also two Tables of Commandments.

The regular routine of Sunday services has been sustained through the year without interruption, and the festivals of the Church have been duly observed. The practice of catechising the children of both Trinity and St. Alban's Churches has been continued with much apparent profit. The hour of evening prayer at the parish church has been changed from 4 to 7, which seems to afford general satisfaction and to draw a larger attendance.

SOUTHPORT.

The Rev. W. Stewart reports that he has nothing of interest to communicate from his parish ; but trusts that the work is progressing, and that many are benefitted by his ministrations. The work that appears of most importance in his mission is that of Sunday-schools. The attendance at Cherry Valley has been remarkably good, the number of children during the summer being forty, which nearly comprises all the children in the district. He is always present at the Sunday-schools, and instructs a class, and then addresses the whole from a passage of Scripture, or catechises them in a portion of the Church catechism. Although Mr. S. preaches but twice each Sunday, he considers the duty performed at the Sunday-school quite equal to a third service. The Sunday-school is continued during the winter. On Sunday the 24th of January, there was an interesting examination of the school, and the distribution of rewards to the most deserving ; and Mr. Stewart thinks that there are few children who are more capable of committing more useful lessons to memory than those of his school. Some of the girls can repeat correctly the catechism, the historical catechism, Watts' Divine songs, all the collects in the Prayer Book, with portions of Scripture varying from twenty verses to five chapters. The Sunday-school at the Barrens numbered about twenty during the summer. At his monthly visit to that place, he addresses the Sunday-school as at Cherry Valley.

Through the kind assistance of Charles DesBrisay, Esq., the services at Bedford Church have been kept up during the greater part of the past year. From ill health and other causes, he has been obliged to discontinue the services at Southport for a few Sundays, but they have been again resumed and, for the future, will be continued. In the discharge of his duties during the past year, he has travelled 1200 miles, paid

150 visits, and preached 85 times ; had 10 baptisms, 2 marriages, and 1 burial.

CRAPAUD & SPRINGFIELD.

Mr. Sterns reports, that during the past year the usual services at Crapaud and Springfield have been held, and the congregations have continued to attend regularly. The Sunday-schools have also been well attended, and great progress has been made by many of the scholars, who were greatly encouraged by the reward books which were distributed at Crapaud to the amount of over £5. A bible-class is also held every Thursday evening. The exterior of the Church at Crapaud has been greatly improved by two coats of white paint, but the interior still requires painting and whitewashing. At Springfield we are endeavoring to have the church painted, and to put up a fence around the burying ground. Contributions from any disposed to assist us in these good works will be thankfully received.

ALBERTON.

IN reference to the mission at Cascumpec, Kildare, and Tignish, the Rev. Mr. Dyer is happy to say that though the past year has had its hardships and trials, it has had its encouragements in the field of missionary labor, inasmuch as it has brought forth in some the fruits of sure conversion unto

God. One who, for many years, had rejected the gospel of the grace of God has become sincerely penitent, and another who formerly thought lightly of the Christian faith died in peace rejoicing in the Lord.

The new church at Cascumpec is not quite finished. It is plastered and made comfortable in regard to warmth. The seats are being made open without doors. It is hoped that the church will be ready for consecration by the end of the summer.

The congregation has varied but little from former years ; but has enjoyed the regular means of grace in the preached Gospel and the Sacraments of the Lord.

The Sabbath-school has been opened, and in operation during the past summer, and they who have attended have made good progress. The services of the Church at the Capes and Tignish have been regularly kept up during the past year, and the congregations have been regular, large, and attentive. At Montrose and the French Village the services have been regularly performed and encouragingly attended by persons of different denominations, of which these congregations are generally made up. During the past year a new station has been opened in the district of Bloomfield, Western Road, where there is a week-day service which is well attended, and promises to be encouraging. The services, lectures, and prayer meetings at all the other week-day stations, viz. : Hill's River, Western Road, Kildare River, Upper and Lower Kildare, have been well attended, and it is trusted seasons of refreshment to many.
